

EMPLOYERS TO ANSWER LABOR CENSUS QUIZ

Klamath's employers of four or more persons on Friday will receive questionnaires from the state board for the mobilization of labor, to be used in a census of skilled manpower to be taken in the cause of national defense.

L. Orth Sismore, secretary of the Klamath committee on this program, this week has been explaining the work to groups of employers and businessmen. He spoke to the joint assembly of Kiwanis and Rotary members Thursday noon.

Sismore pointed out that the government has information on the source of raw materials and the location of industrial plants. The next thing is to find out where the skilled labor is located, particularly those men who are trained in a skilled trade but are not now working in that trade.

Employers will receive questionnaires to be filled out by employees. One report will be placed in each employer's file, and then a master report will be sent to Salem for filing with the state board.

Sismore emphasized that the cooperation in this program by employers and employees is voluntary, but is important to the national defense effort.

The purpose, he said, is to learn where skilled labor is available and at the same time to prevent disruption of present industry by finding skilled men not now engaged in their skilled trade, rather than taking men already doing this specialized work.

Browder's Wife To Be Deported

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (P)—The justice department today ordered deportation of Mrs. Ralissa Berkman Browder, wife of Earl Browder, general secretary of the communist party in the United States, on the ground that she had entered this country illegally.

The order signed by Attorney General Jackson also denied application for suspension of the deportation order on the ground that Mrs. Browder's "evasive testimony regarding her relationship to the communist party had created doubt as to her eligibility for leniency."

OFFICERS SEEK DARING HOLDUP ROBBER HERE

One of the most daring holdups reported to city police this year was revealed Thursday while officers continued their search for a man who recently made off with \$200 in currency from the Safeway store at Main and Home avenue.

According to the story told police by Ralph Shoulders, Safeway clerk, a roughly dressed man entered the store about 7:30 o'clock at night while Shoulders was on duty alone. The man, described as being between 30 and 35 years of age, 5 feet 9 inches tall, weighing about 175 pounds, heavy stubble beard, and wearing an old brown rubberized zipper jacket, dark felt hat, pulled low over his eyes, picked up a sack of onions and in so doing shoved a note across the counter as the clerk approached him. The man's right hand was in his right jacket pocket apparently holding an object which the clerk surmised was a gun.

The roughly pencilled note contained the words: "Take the money out of both cash drawers and don't be foolish. I'll shoot rather than be caught. Put the money in a paper sack and hurry."

The clerk did as instructed and then the man advised him he only wanted "paper money, no silver." The man then motioned Shoulders to walk to the back of the store which he did. The thief left the store hurriedly and the clerk immediately called police and the store manager.

No trace of the man was found by police, they stated.

PLANS FORMING FOR "TRAFFIC SAFETY WEEK"

Plans were being laid Thursday by heads of the Klamath county board of commerce for the annual "Traffic Safety Week," which will get underway with a parade here November 2 and continue through November 9.

President Sam Mushen has appointed Dick Miller Jr., as chairman. The safety week, designed to impress the public with the need for caution in traffic, has been sponsored locally for the past six years.

"Stop it at 10" has been adopted as the junior chamber's slogan. Every effort is to be directed toward making the public traffic-conscious in an attempt to halt the year's excessive auto fatalities in this county. The total deaths last year was 19.

The week will get underway with a "parade of wrecks" Saturday down Main street, in which tow cars will haul wrecked automobiles. Commercial trucks and cars with endorsements of the campaign will also be entered.

Starting Thursday of next week and running for the last three days of the campaign, the junior chamber will sponsor a checking station, in front of the city hall on Fifth street.

All drivers of the community are invited to have their autos checked free of charge for defects in lights, horn, windshield wiper, tires, brakes, wheel alignment and visibility.

All cars found to be okay will be given appropriate stickers. Drivers of cars with defects will be in no way be obligated to correct them except through their own conscience.

A sound truck will circulate through traffic during the week correcting errors in driving and pointing out safety rules.

Henry Semon Asks Klamath Vote As Farmer in Race For Representative Post

Henry Semon, democratic nominee for re-election to the state legislature from the thirty-second district (Klamath county) on Thursday made public his campaign statement:

"Henry Semon, who was first elected to the legislature in 1932, is the only one of the four present candidates for the legislature in this district who resides in our farming section. He is asking voters of both city and country districts to give him, as a farmer, one of their two votes for state representative at this election.

"Semon has been chairman of the agricultural committee of the house of representatives at three sessions, and despite his affiliation with the democratic party, he was appointed chairman of the agricultural committee at the last session by the republican speaker.

"Klamath county, with an agricultural industry worth \$10,000,000 annually, needs strong and informed representation in the legislature. As Semon has farmed Klamath county soil for 30 years, he feels he understands farm problems which may require legislative action. As he has served in the legislature eight years, he feels he is qualified to make that action favorable to Klamath farm interests.

"He was chairman of the all-important ways and means committee of the house of representatives for two regular and one special session and was a member of ways and means at the last session. He thoroughly understands the financial problems confronting the state government. He also has been a member of the emergency board for the past six years.

"It has been his legislative policy to treat all interests in fair and impartial manner and to listen with an open mind to any constituent interested in legislative matters."
