Enlisted voluntarily April 7th, 1917—the day after the U. S. declared war. Attended First Officers' Training Camp, Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind. Commissioned 1st Lieut., Infantry, Aug. 15, 1917, and assigned to active duty. Served with Battery F, 325th P. A., 84th Division, Camp Zachary Taylor, Ky. Assigned to special duty at Infantry School of Arms. Commanding Officer Battery F, 325 Field Artillery. Attended School of Fire for Field Artillery, Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, graduating from War Course, for Light Artillery. On duty with 325th P. Artillery at Field Artillery Firing Center, West Point, Ky. Served overseas as Battery Commander and battalion adjutant—44th Division, from Sept. 9, 1918 to Feb. 15, 1919. Honorably discharged Feb. 25, 1919, as Camp Quartermaster.
