CHASE ON ENDORSEMENTS
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (To the Editor)—In the matter of endorsing candidates I wish to make the following observations: I am not unmindful that the endorsement of candidates by labor groups and others have a certain amount of weight with certain groups of people who are accustomed to listen to political groups within their own organization. I know that I have the respect and confidence of the great majority of laboring people, both organized and unorganized. I concede the right of the Central Labor council to endorse any candidate whom they may desire, but in my case the reasons given in the Central Labor News are not sufficient for the action taken.

In the matter of the small cottage built at the fair grounds with WPA labor, and mostly out of second hand lumber, I wish to say that this small cottage would not have been built at all nor otherwise available to organized except in the manner which it was built, and neither or any of us could do anything about it in any other way; be-

sides certain parts of this work, like plumbing, etc., were paid for at union scale prices.

In the matter of construction of the caretaker's cottage at the county shop site, this was built so that the county shop hostler who looks after the servicing of our machinery, could live right there at the shops and also act as night watchman of the property at a saving to the county of \$720 per annum. All material was union made.

The labor performed was done by our bridge crew, who were laid off on account of high water at the Crystal Springs bridge and had nothing else to do and we desired to keep them busy. They drew almost union wages and when we employed them it was understood that they were to have as nearly steady employment as it was possible to give them. Judge Reeder will bear me out in this statement, I am quite sure.

All the above reasons for criticizing me as a county commissioner is pretty far fetched, if you will take into consideration that we were just finishing up the county infirmary building, all of which was done at union labor scale, involving an expenditure of around \$50,000 for labor and materials.

I further wish to emphasize the fact that as your county commissioner I am supposed to represent all interests, not only those of labor in general but the taxpayers and employers of labor. This I have striven to do and if re-elected I shall continue to do to the fullest extent and to the best of my ability.

SPRAGUE SUPPORTS WAGE INCREASE FOR LEGISLATORS

SALEM, Nov. 1 (AP)—Governor Sprague declared yesterday that "the present wage of \$3 per day for (state) legislators, limited to a 40-day session, is inadequate and unjust."

He urged passage of a proposed constitutional amendment fixing the pay at \$8 daily for a 50-day session.

"The present rate was fixed when the constitution was drawn up in 1857," the governor added. "The proposed revision is a belated recognition that a change should be made by way of fair treatment to men and women who serve the state in the legislature."

PHONE COMPANY TO SUPPLEMENT LINES

An Associated Press dispatch from Washington, D. C., stated Friday that the federal communications commission authorized the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company to supplement existing telephone facilities between Redding and Weed, Calif., at an estimated cost of \$1,344,100.

Local telephone company officials said the project will consist chiefly of rerouting long distance lines around the area to be covered by the water behind the new Shasta dam. About 73 miles of the line is to be shifted. A large part of it will be underground cable.

Don Smith, chief engineer from San Francisco, stopped in Klamath Falls recently en route to the scene of the project. Local officials said the service in Klamath Falls will not be affected by the relocation job.
