

KLAMATH FOOD STAMP SYSTEM GIVEN AIRING

Klamath retailers Friday night were introduced to the food stamp plan, surplus marketing administration brainchild which November 1 was scheduled to begin operation in Klamath county.

The meeting, pronounced a success by Evans Porter of the SMA, drew a representation from approximately 75 per cent of the county retail firms.

The plan, which will affect most of the retail food firms in the county, was outlined in detail by Porter. Roy Carter, chairman of the county food committee, and Mrs. Altha Urquhart of the county welfare office.

It was described as a new way of distributing surplus foods operating under the U. S. department of agriculture in cooperation with the state public welfare commission, the WPA and local food merchants.

The plan, according to Porter, will be open to all residents of the county who are certified as eligible to receive any form of public assistance from the state public welfare commission through direct assistance, old age assistance, aid to dependent children, aid to the blind, or those who are certified workers on WPA projects.

Participation in the plan is entirely voluntary, but it was pointed out that participants are able to obtain \$1.50 worth of food for \$1.00.

Food-order stamps must be purchased from the state public welfare commission.

Under the plan participants are able to get two kinds of stamps. The orange stamp is good for any food for internal human consumption except wine, beer, liquor, tobacco in any form, or food usually eaten on store premises. Purchase of anything except food with stamps makes purchasers liable to revocation of stamp privileges.

Blue food stamps are good only for foods listed as surplus by the secretary of agriculture. A surplus list will be posted in all participating stores.

Each stamp, whether blue or orange, will have a value of 25 cents. Under the stamp plan, participants will receive one blue stamp free with every two orange stamps purchased.

of the quotation in question and confirmed it through a Philadelphia reporter who said he heard the McCracken address.

"When I arrived in Philadelphia many persons reported to me this quotation Mr. McCracken is alleged to have made," Krock said. "I then read the quotation in the Philadelphia Record. Then I checked the language of the quotation through Joseph Miller, political reporter for the Philadelphia Inquirer who told me he heard the address and confirmed the language as published."

In his letter to Krock, McCracken continued:

"What I did say was that in view of the tremendous issues of this campaign . . . I could not understand any thinking American voting for a continuance of the present administration except those included in three classes: first, those unfortunate who saw no way of obtaining tomorrow's breakfast except by going to an office and drawing down \$11, \$13 or \$15 per week relief funds, which they believed came from the administration's beneficence . . . this latter group, I said, had by this system been placed in the position of paupers — people regularly subsisting on public charity . . .

"The second group to which I referred were the federal employees, vastly increased in number during the past seven years, holding positions commanding salaries of \$3000, \$5000, \$7000, even \$10,000 per year. I said that many of these people had never earned over \$1200 a year in private employment, and that if they lost their present positions they might have to again seek employment at some such wage. Of course, these people do not want a change of administration. They want to keep their jobs. They will vote for the reelection of the president . . . Other than that I said nothing about people who earn less than \$1200 per year . . .

"I then said that the third class was very small. It consisted of the president and the members of his family . . .

FORMS MAILED FOR SKILLED LABOR COUNT

Census forms for listing available skilled defense workers are being mailed to 15,000 employers this week from the Salem offices of the board for the mobilization of labor.

The packets received by employers contain complete instructions for reporting such of their employees as may have had experience in 370 defense occupations. The work-sheet filled out by each skilled employee will be retained by the employer. Only the firm's completed tabulation will be returned to the board's central offices.

"Not until a defense emergency exists will these men be called," declares Director L. C. Stoll, of the Oregon State Employment service, whose organization is cooperating with the board in taking the inventory of skilled labor. "No man will go into defense work unless he is able and willing."

"We are taking this census so as to build up defense industries in Oregon. Only by having an actual listing of skilled labor can we justify plant expansion in this territory. In this way men will not be forced to migrate far from their homes to share in the defense program."

"In our belief that this program will be least likely to disturb the orderly economic life of every community, we are backed up by the national defense council and by leaders in every walk of life."

More than 300 representatives of labor, industry, veterans and the public have been named to co-operating committees in dozens of communities throughout the state. By prompt action in completing the actual inventory, the board of the mobilization of labor hopes to be prepared for any emergency in national defense preparations that may arise.

CRATER LAKE SNOW UNFIT FOR SKIING

Rangers at Crater lake national park reported by telephone Saturday that snow has reached a depth of 14 inches at government camp and 20 inches at the rim, but is so wet and loosely packed that skiing is impracticable.

The falling flakes were mixed with rain Saturday afternoon and the layer was not even enough or of sufficient depth in most localities to cover the hazards, rangers said.

Duck hunters reported excellent shooting Saturday morning in the Klamath area, many finding the birds flying extremely low through the falling snow. Enough hunters were out in most sections to keep ducks and geese in the air.

Reports were received from Timberline lodge on Mount Hood that a heavy snowfall there allowed ski enthusiasts Saturday to open the winter sports season. Skiing was reported good in Pucci's glade and the lift was in operation, with a run staked out from the chalet to the lodge.

irresponsible act of his own secretary in kicking in the stomach a negro policeman who was only doing his duty," Willkie said. "I utterly condemn the alleged utterance of that Philadelphia lawyer, just as the third term candidate should condemn the act of his secretary."

"The whole purpose of the third term candidate's speech was to stir up class hatred and divide our people. That was the tactics of Lenin, the strategy of Hitler and the preaching of Trotsky."

Willkie heard the president's speech by radio on his campaign train, parked on a siding at Manhattan Transfer, N. J., only a few miles from New York.

Just before Mr. Roosevelt went on the air, Willkie broadcast from his private car a talk contending that "neglect and abuse" of the aviation industry by the new deal would prevent American factories from producing 50,000 planes annually "for a period of years."

Similarly, he contended, it will take years to fill orders for British planes in the United States.

"We must arm Britain with planes, not disarm her with political speeches," he said.

"I can't think of one concrete thing that President Roosevelt has done for us, except to sabotage and betray us."

The address was met with mingled boos and cheers.

BUILDING FOR OCTOBER TOPS \$84,000 TOTAL

New residences contributed to the \$84,316 spent in construction within the city limits of Klamath Falls during the month of October, according to figures prepared by Harold Francis, city building inspector.

October permits, of which there were 64, showed a gain of \$44,641 over October, 1939, and a gain of \$11,911, over September, 1940.

There was also a gain of four permits over September of this year, and a gain of 35 permits over October last year.
