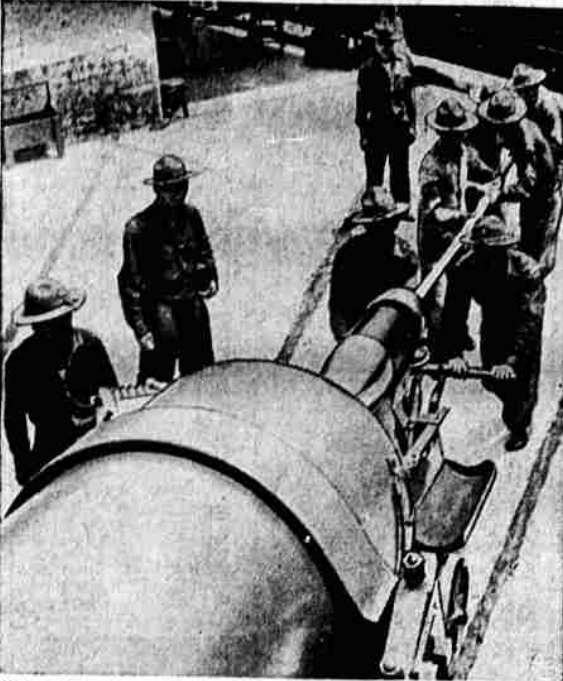

KLAMATH AREA AGAIN LEADING RECRUIT LISTS

The Oregon recruiting district sent local records topping again last month with the enlistment of 454 young men for the regular army, according to Lieutenant Colonel B. H. Hensley, new district recruiting officer. Klamath Falls again topped the list of district sub-stations with 38 enlistments. Eugene and Medford followed with 34 and 30, respectively.

The 454 joining the ranks of the regular army were enlisted for the usual three-year period. Only once in the history of the Oregon district have local recruiting sergeants come close to the new record, that when 447 enlistments were credited to the Oregon district last July. The colonel explained, however, that the district had twice the present personnel on duty at that time, and it was also credited with the enlistments from part of the state of Idaho for July.
