RARE FOX FURS PUT ON DISPLAY

A display of rare platina fox furs will be held at Cummings Fur shop all day Thursday, according to Sam Goldstein, owner of the fur shop, and Klamath people who are interested in furs are invited to come in and see them. The platina fox was developed in Norway about six years ago, and these furs are part of a shipment of 900 furs which reached New York shortly after Norway was invaded. The furs are very rare and require extensive selective breeding and it is not expected that many more will come out of Norway in the near future due to the war.

Most of the shipment of skins was sold in New York at tremendous figures, one skin alone bringing \$11,000. Another was auctioned off by Ripley for \$2300, which went to the Norwegian relief fund. The skins shown locally are valued at about \$1250 a pair.

ANDREW CORNISH DIES ON TRAIN

Andrew W. Cornish, 60, 531 Conger avenue, for the past 15 years a resident of Klamath Falls, died en route to Klamath Falls north of Woodland, Calif., Monday evening at 11:30 o'clock returning to his home with Mrs. Cornish following a visit at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Asahel Bush, Salt Lake City.

Mr. Cornish was born in Stayton, Ore., June 20, 1880, the son of William C. and Ann Stanton Cornish, pioneer residents of the Willamette valley. With the exception of several years spent in California, Mr. Cornish resided in Oregon his entire lifetime. During his residence here he was an employee of the California Oregon Power company.

Just a month ago Mr. and Mrs. Cornish paid a visit to the Bush home and while there Mr. Cornish suffered a heart attack and was confined to his bed for several weeks. The fatal attack occurred two hours out of Woodland. Mrs. Cornish reached Klamath Falls Wednesday morning from the south, and Mrs. Bush arrived here on the train from Salem. She flew from Salt Lake City to Portland.

In addition to his wife, daughter and granddaughter, Margaret Bush, Mr. Cornish is survived by three sisters, Mrs. William Rabens of Sublimity, Ore., and Mrs. Richard Knight and Mrs. Jake Wourms of Stayton. Funeral services will be held from the Earl Whitlock Funeral home at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon with Rev. Arthur Charles Bates officiating. Remains will be shipped to Stayton Friday evening and interment will take place in the family plot there. Mrs. Cornish and Mrs. Bush will return here this weekend.
