Principal need is for bedclothing, underwear for men, women and children, coats, dresses, men's outer garments and towels and face cloths.

The Army is caring for thousands of residents of London, rendered homeless in the constant air raids that rattle the city.

## KALINA AGAIN ELECTED TO BE MALIN MAYOR

MALIN — A. Kalina, since 1922 mayor of Malin, unopposed in the city election, will again guide the destiny of this south end town for the next term of office. Mr. Kalina, who came to Malin with the first group of settlers has served every term with the exception of one year, 1926, that he spent in Europe. A total of 162 votes were cast in the two precincts in his favor. Two write-in votes, one for John Reber, winning candidate in the county commissioner race and one for Clyde Van Meter were cast for mayor.

In the council contest John Brothanek, Mervyn Wilde and Jerry Rajnus were nosed out by Clinton G. Williams, Clyde Van Meter and Conrad Johnson. Williams polled 103 votes; Van Meter 148 and Johnson 115.

Holdover members of the city board were Everett Jones with 153; James Ottoman 129; B. H. Pichett 146. Brothanek totaled 60 tallies, Rajnus 73 and Wilde 99.
