The Vote on Measures

OREGON voters in Tuesday's general election evidently followed the old theory on direction legislation: if you aren't sure, vote no.

On the liquor measures, particularly, the tendency to vote negatively on confusing measures was in evidence. There the proponents of state liquor control not only voted against repeal of the liquor control law, as was to be expected, but they defeated a measure to strengthen liquor control. We refer to the club regulation bill, which had been sponsored in the legislature by the liquor commission. It went down on a referendum.

Before the election, Governor Sprague charged that the opponents of strong liquor control had sponsored the referendum and the liquor control repeal bill together with the idea of confusing the voters and defeating the club control bill. The scheme worked.

The only measure which came close to passage was that providing for increased legislative pay. Oregonians talked for bigger pay for the legislators, but as usual voted against it. We have the satisfaction, however, of knowing that while Oregon's legislature gets the poorest pay in the United States, it is one of the best legislatures in the United States.

Oregonians turned thumbs down on a gambling legalization measure that was probably pretty well understood. While giving a third term for President Roosevelt their approval, the Oregon voters refused to remove the ban against third terms for the secretary of state and the state treasurer, a peculiar contradiction.

The defeat of the tax base change and repeal of double bank liability was probably due to slight understanding of these measures. Milk control repeal and the September primary measure, on the other hand, must have been quite clear in the public minds and the decision on these, at least, should stand for several years without further revival of these issues.

Move Toward Unity

A WORTHY movement toward national unity has followed the presidential election.

Americans, with traditional good will, have put aside the bitterness of the campaign, and are joining together as Americans in voicing their patriotic loyalty to Franklin D. Roosevelt as president of the United States for another four years.

The majority has spoken, and in this country that means something. It is the expression of the will of the people, which must continue to rule America.

It does not mean that the minorities no longer have voice. It is just as important in America that the minorities shall continue to have free expression of their views as it is that the majority must decide a presidential election.

But now the election is over, we can move forward toward constructive aims. For the time, at least, the major goal should be to keep America out of foreign war. Both sides in the recent political ruckus pledged their efforts toward that end. One side has won, and we pray that the pledge is kept.

Hoover Offers Congratulations To Winners

PALO ALTO, Calif., Nov. 7 (UP)—Former President Herbert Hoover last night congratulated President Roosevelt and Vice-President-Elect Henry A. Wallace for their triumph in Tuesday's national election and urged "full cooperation" of both parties in the "vital purpose" of keeping out of foreign wars.

In a prepared statement, the only living ex-president of the U. S. said:

"Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Wallace are to be congratulated. Mr. Willkie and Mr. McNary made a good fight. When the people speak, theirs is the voice to be obeyed."

News Behind THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Next big struggle of the war will be for Africa—the whole of it—and that is where the British will want us to come in.

Now that the campaign lid is off here, discussions are developing among military men on the piecemeal official information picked up about the recent Hitler-Mussolini conferences. Clearly it indicates conquest of the African continent is the basic grand strategy of the dictators' 1940-41 campaign.

It has already started. German fifth columnists have been sitting into all British and French colonies there at a rate more rapid than was apparent in Norway and Holland before they were crushed. A report from Kenya colony (British) on the southeast African coast pictures the activities of various political parties there now as "worse than in Berlin."

This ultimate goal is confirmed by open axis dickering with Spain and the effort of Mussolini to clear the Grecian flank for a German invasion of Turkey. First step was the seizure of Dakar.

The idea is sound from the German standpoint. The war has become a struggle for economic existence. With all the raw materials of Africa, the axis will control the economic resources of two continents to fend off exhaustion.

BRITISH KNOW
The British well know what is afoot. In fact our information probably comes through them. But they rather like the new battleground. It offers a possible future opening for a military defeat of Germany where none exists now. Invasion of Europe would be just as difficult for the British now as invasion of England has proved for the Germans. If the Germans, however, string out their military forces through two continents, committing themselves constantly to an ever-widening front, they will thin their army out. Britain, too, will have full freedom of movement in the seas off the African coast. In the end the British might right back up to Berlin by any path the Germans could cut to Africa, across the Dardanelles and Gibraltar.

For such a campaign, the British would need every ounce of military might they can muster. They must keep large forces at home to meet the threat of invasion which will be kept constantly before them. Up to now they have not been able to use more American help than they have been getting. But they will be able to use it then. Pressure for American participation

HITLER'S GRIP

Don't expect anything from the French merely because 90 per cent of the French people are assumed to favor Britain.

The secret of all French governmental actions heretofore and hereafter is that Hitler has 1,800,000 French prisoners of war in German camps. If any German suffers slightly ruffled hair in France, Herr Hitler has let the French know it will be taken out on the prisoners. The French dare not do anything hereafter except by German bidding.

Hitler has been keeping a distance away from the Vichy government to give it a deceptive appearance of minor independence. Don't let that fool you. Hitler has perfected a system of running every detail of Vichy activity from a distance and without direct communication. He works through the armistice commission which is a continuing body functioning daily.

What he wants Vichy to do is communicate by his German commissioners across the table in Paris to the French commissioners who relay it to Petain.

The British lost all chance of even hidden help from France when Petain failed to get the 1,800,000 French hostages released from Hitler's prisons.

LAKE COUNTY GOES BOURBON FOR 1ST TIME

LAKEVIEW (Special)—Lake county, traditionally republican, voted democratic for the first time since ballot records have been kept here, it was revealed late Wednesday when complete returns were received from the county's 19 precincts.

Features of the general election, which also drew the heaviest voting in history, were a tie of 1107 ballots apiece for Bruce Spaulding and I. H. Van Winkle in the attorney general race, and a neck-and-neck battle for sheriff which finally went to Henry A. Casidy, democrat.

Casidy New Sheriff

The tied vote in the attorney general election is subject to correction if a canvassing of the ballots reveals errors in the first tabulation.

In the sheriff contest Casidy, with a total of 1318, edged out Harry Angstead, republican incumbent, who polled 1197.

Marshall Cornett, who carried the senatorial district by a comfortable margin over Marius Petersen, trailed in Petersen's home county in the state senate race. Complete returns for Lake gave Petersen a total of 1307 and Cornett 870.

Confidence Voted

For the joint Lake-Deschutes representative office, Bert Snyder, who received both the republican and democratic nominations in the primary, snowed under Russell Galbraith, independent, by a huge margin. Snyder polled 1952 and Galbraith 412.

Lake voters gave the Roosevelt - Wallace ticket a vote of confidence in the presidential race, with 1414 ballots against 1121 for Willkie and McNary. Aiken polled 12.

Walter Pierce won the congressional race over Rex Ellis, 1632 to 844. Sears received 58. For state treasurer, Lake voters favored Scott over Brown, 1147 to 1084.

Gunlock Named Second District Assemblyman

William I. Gunlock apparently was elected assemblyman from California's second district Tuesday over McMurphy, his republican opponent. Returns from 196 out of 290 precincts gave Gunlock 14,593, and McMurphy 12,653.

Gunlock, an Olson-supported candidate, won the democratic nomination from Clinton Fulcher in the California primaries in one of the closest races in recent state history. Results were unknown for several days.

Fulcher, a democrat, had swept the republican primary vote but was eliminated when

he failed to win his own party's nomination. McMurphy was appointed to oppose Gunlock.

his club here congratulating his opponent and thanking voters for their support.

Lamar Townsend, Petersen club secretary, said the Lake county man was warmly gratified at the large number of votes he received in the district.
