Father Kenny, a member of the Paulist Fathers at Portland, who has an enviable reputation as a preacher, was born at Brechin, Ontario, Canada, where he received his preliminary education. From there he went to the Catholic university at Washington, D. C. from which institution he graduated in 1931. Having studied theology at the Sulpician seminary, Washington, D. C., he was ordained to the priesthood in the Church of St. Paul the Apostle, New York City, June 15, 1935. Since then he has been stationed at St. Peter's church, Toronto, where he was engaged in missionary and parochial activities until his transfer to Portland recently.

Fr. Kenny comes to us with rich experience gathered from his contacts with several of the larger parishes in the east and we rest assured he will conduct a most fruitful mission here.

All, both members of the church and those who are not members but are interested, are welcome and are invited to attend the evening services during the coming week.
