SPECIALTIES LEAD STOCKS IN N. Y. LIST

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—Specialties gave a fairly good account of themselves in today's stock market but steel and a number of other industrial leaders wavered. Transfers were around 1,100,000 shares.

The majority of the rails, copper and utilities held to a narrow range.

Brokers still maintained that set-backs were principally the result of a "correction" of the recent brisk recovery. Drying up of selling was interpreted as encouraging.

Favorable dividends and earnings figures helped such stocks as Pennsylvania Railroad, Phelps Dodge, Hiram Walker and a number of others.

Prominent on the offside the greater part of the day—some came back at the finish—were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, Douglas Aircraft, American Smelting, Westinghouse, International Harvester and Montgomery Ward.

General Steel castings preferred jumped several points to a new year's high. In front most of the time were Budd Mfg. preferred, Armour, Wilson & Co., American Woolen preferred, Climax Molybdenum, International Paper common and preferred and Evans Products.

WHEAT PRICES IN LAST MINUTE RISE

CHICAGO, Nov. 13 (AP)—Wheat and corn prices were slightly lower through most of today's grain market session but they rallied just before the close and finished fractionally higher than yesterday.

Late buying was associated with purchasing credited to mills while light corn receipts and cold weather influenced the feed grain market. A report that the United States may be asked to help supply Spain with wheat attracted attention but was not confirmed by agricultural officials in Washington.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1c higher compared with yesterday, December 87 1/2-88c, May 87 1/2-88c; corn 1-1c up, December 62 1/2-63c, May 64 1/2-65c; oats 1-1c higher.

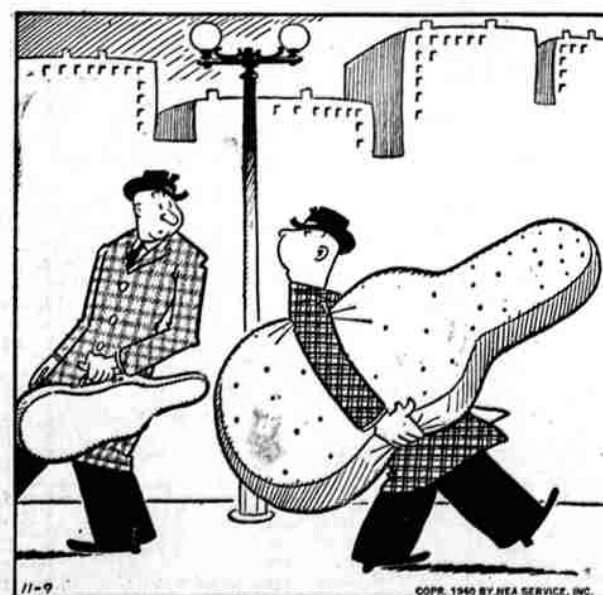
WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, Nov. 13 (AP-USA)—A few inquiries for wool were being received today by some wool houses in Boston. Interest centered chiefly in original bag lots of fine and half blood territory wools. Bids were generally lower than dealers were willing to accept, but occasional lots of original bag fine territory wool moved at around \$1 for lines running largely average to short French combing length and around \$1.03 for lines running bulk good French combing length.

OREGON FARM INCOME SEEN ENDANGERED

Expected general improvement in farm purchasing power next year will probably be temporary even though prices of most farm products except those in the "export type" group are likely to be moderately higher, according to the current report on the agricultural situation issued by the OSC extension service. The report reviews the general outlook in Oregon for farm income, costs and family living.

"Looking beyond 1941, the temporary improvement in the exchange value of farm products expected next year may be lost in 1942 or later, owing first to advances in the cost of farming and farm family living, likely to be followed by a more rapid decline in farm prices than in any other prices when war and defense spending drops off," the report states.

The report contains much additional data and comment on agricultural and industrial conditions and prospective trends, with sections on domestic and foreign demand, the general price level, food requirements and surplus removal measures, farm production, price and income prospects, farm and living costs and brief outlook reviews for "export-type" farm products versus "domestic-type" and "import-type" farm products. The market outlook ahead is said to be less favorable for "export-type" commodities than for products which are on a domestic basis.

The long-time trend of international trade conditions in farm products has been against the United States for 40 years, except the period affected by the first world war, the report shows. Thus far the present world war has been destructive of export demand for Oregon's principal export farm products, such as wheat, apples, pears and prunes.

The prospects are that export outlets for principal Oregon farm products will remain poor while the war lasts and the United States remains neutral, according to the outlook circular. Even looking further ahead, the foreign demand outlook is not encouraging for farmers in this country.

CRESTED WHEAT SOWN ON LAND IN JEFFERSON

MADRAS—Farmers of Jefferson county planted an unusually large acreage of crested wheat grass this fall, reports County Agent K. W. Sawyer. Approximately 13 tons of seed had been distributed to the growers by the end of October, from a pool purchase made through the county agent's office. Aaron Hale, a farmer of the Ashwood community, has seeded 100 acres of former crop land which he intends to use in future for grazing.

SNOW SURVEY WORK EXPANDED BY SCS

Snow survey work throughout Oregon followed by water supply forecasts will be continued under the division of irrigation of the Soil Conservation Service the same as for the past several years, according to word from R. A. Work, federal engineer stationed at the Medford branch experiment station and in charge of surveys for the past several years.

Because the task of gathering information on winter sports area snow and weather conditions has been turned over to the weather bureau, many have the impression that the snow survey work has been discontinued, says Work. W. W. McLaughlin, chief of the division of irrigation, has just issued a statement assuring all inquirers that the survey work is even being extended to additional water sheds and to more consideration of ground water conditions.
