"Breathless Moment" Slated To Mark Gas Tax Milestone

On Friday, November 15, motorists, truckers, service station operators and others interested in highway transportation, will pause for the "Breathless Moment" of 1940 when the nation's gasoline tax bill passes the billion-dollar mark, according to Ralph A. Coan, Portland, treasurer of the Oregon State Motor association.

The motor association official said that the motorists of Oregon will have footed the bill to the tune of \$14,259,773. Of this amount \$11,524,168 represents state tax on the motor fuel and the remainder — \$2,735,605 — will have been paid as federal tax on motor fuel.

"The red-letter day on the automobile owners' calendar will move up one whole month because of the enormous acceleration of gasoline tax collections

in 1940," Coan said. "Gasoline tax payments this year will increase by approximately \$130,000,000 over 1939 and bring the nation's gasoline tax bill for 1940 to an estimated record-breaking amount of \$1,162,000,000, an increase of about 12 per cent." The "breathless moment" was on December 15 in 1939.

The club treasurer attributed the speeding up of gasoline tax collections to (1) the additional federal gasoline levy for defence purposes, (2) a substantial increase in the number of automobiles operating on the highways, and (3) greater individual use of motor vehicles by their owners.

Gasoline consumption in Oregon for 1940 has increased about eight per cent over the 1939 use and car registrations are up around five per cent.

PAYROLLS UP 18 PER CENT, LEVY SHOWS

SALEM, Nov. 13 — Oregon's payrolls for 1940 are running nearly 18 per cent ahead of last year, if the contributions to the state's unemployment insurance fund are to be taken as a guide.

Administrator Silas Gaiser announced today that taxes this year now totalled \$6,010,664 as compared with \$5,603,150 at this time in 1939.

A new high of \$10,141,258 in the unemployment trust fund also was revealed in the week's figures. Despite a recent transfer of \$590,392 to the railroad retirement fund, the new figure is now more than half a million above the previous top last August and more than \$2,000,000 over the amount on hand a year ago.

Jobless benefits in October were \$194,153, an increase of \$20,284 over the previous month and \$13,127 more than October, 1939.

For the year to date \$3,078,335 has been paid to the eligible unemployed. The first ten months of last year saw payments of \$3,591,288, while the same period in 1938 accounted for \$5,233,997 in benefits.
