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refugees seeking safety in the country.

The awful experience of the night before was written in the pinched white faces that peered at the minister's limousine from trucks, wagons and automobiles.

Royal air force pilots took fire hoses from the hands of firemen reeling with fatigue, and played streams of water on the smouldering heaps of rubble which are all that remain of some of Britain's finest examples of Tudor architecture.

Bodies Removed

Two policemen, Fred Rollins and William Timms, were among the hero dead of the night before. They worked for hours amid falling bombs, rescuing women and children trapped by debris, survivors said.

At dawn factory workers from night shifts burrowed into the smoking wreckage of their homes, shouting the names of their wives and children and calling, "We're coming... We're coming!"

One young man recovered a body and then tunneled into the wreckage, his hands torn and bleeding, to pull out another—his wife.

Four persons literally numbed by the shock of the explosions were found in an air raid shelter and told that they were officially "missing." They nodded vaguely and continued to sit there, despite the pleas of welfare workers that they come out.

While the fires still crackled late this afternoon, German raiders returned to the onslaught against the industrial midlands.

Scores of public and private buildings including hospitals, shelters, the cathedral, police station and postoffice, were demolished or damaged.

The population was officially described as having gone through an "ordeal with great courage" and heroism.

The city, with a population of about 190,000, is one of England's most important industrial cities and is located about 95 miles northwest of London.

It has been one of the Germans' most regular targets in bombing raids on England.

Throughout today widespread attacks ranged from the southern coast across the midlands, Thames estuary, London and northwest.

Twice London's defenders turned back raiders after the sky had been laced with the telltale twisting vapor trails of planes in battle.

Stephen Foster Named to Hall of Fame, First U. S. Musician to Win Position

NEW YORK, Nov. 15 (AP)—A song writer who died penniless, obscure and broken in spirit at the age of 38 has just been elected to the Hall of Fame.

A commemorative tablet and bust honoring his memory will be placed among those of 72 other great Americans next spring.

The name on it will be "Stephen Collins Foster."

He's the first musician ever named one of America's immortals.

He wrote down-to-earth, folksy, easy-to-sing songs. He wrote them to pay the rent, to buy a few meals. And for most of them, he got only a few dollars each.

He wrote never-to-be-forgotten songs. Such as "Old Black Joe," "Old Folks at Home," "Jeannie With the Light Brown Hair," "My Old Kentucky

Home," "O Susanna," and "Massa's in de Cold, Cold Ground."

At the age of 14, he wrote "Tioga Waltz." From then until his death in New York City January 13, 1864, he turned out more than 200 songs, a dozen instrumental compositions and several musical arrangements.

Last night, Dr. Harry Woodburn Chase, chancellor of New York university and director pro tem of the Hall of Fame, announced that Foster was the only one of 141 nominated candidates to receive the required three-fifths vote of the 110 distinguished Americans who comprise the college of electors. It was the first time, since the founding of the Hall of Fame in 1900, that only one nominee was selected.

The song writer who died thinking he was a failure received 86 votes.

DOG MEAT LEGAL FOOD IN GERMANY

BERLIN, Nov. 15 (AP)—A new law, effective January 1, today legalized the meat of dogs, foxes, bears and beavers for human consumption, but observers doubted the measure would greatly augment the reich's food supply.

The law subjects these meats to the same rigid health inspection as beef and pork.

Easier in Germany

It indicates that such meats have been on German menus, probably in larger amounts recently as people find that the weekly pound meat allowance in Germany is not sufficient.

Most observers here surmise, however, that the second war winter, hard as it may be, will treat Germany easier than almost any other country in continental Europe.

Even such a domestic animal as the horse is far from a common dish in Germany. If there is more than one horse restaurant in Berlin it is not well known.

French Hard Hit

Neutral observers in Germany suspect that the hardest hit of any European people will be the French, whose northern food provinces were largely depopulated by the war during much of the growing season.

Denmark, Holland, Belgium and Poland are on a restricted diet, and in Holland and Denmark many cattle, pigs and chickens are being slaughtered to meet feed shortages. But the Germans say that food supplies in these countries are large and that only Norway may be expected to have difficulties with the bread ration.

Occupied France's situation, however, already is known to be difficult with so important a crop as sugar beets estimated not to exceed 20 to 25 per cent of normal and grain production expected to be only 75 per cent of normal. Hay also is short in France and other sections.

Secure for Winter

The extent to which food supplies in the occupied areas is being drained into Germany is not known outside official circles. The Germans say it is being held down strictly. They concede that some wheat flour was taken from France but was replaced by rye flour usable by the occupying armies.

As for Germany's supplies, Adolf Hitler has asserted that food for the coming winter is assured. The wheat crop is reported to be but 2 per cent under the 1934-1939 average. The potato crop, it is estimated, not only will take care of the usual 18,000,000-ton household consumption but also leave a balance for livestock feed.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (AP)—President Roosevelt formally recognized today that a state of war exists between Italy and Greece and extended the provisions of the neutrality act to that conflict.

ROME, Nov. 15 (AP)—The high command reported today that 13 planes of French, British and Polish type used by the Greek air force had been downed yesterday in violent action on the Greek battlefield, during which Italian aircraft were said to have blasted at objectives behind the enemy lines.

At the same time the Italians identified as a battleship of the Ramillies class the British warship which they reported Tuesday as having been torpedoed and "probably" sunk by an Italian submarine in the central Mediterranean.

There was nothing to indicate that the policy of "collaboration for the peace of Europe," developed in talks between Laval and Adolf Hitler last month, was dead, but the policy thus received its first public check.

In stopping travel from the occupied to the unoccupied zones, the Germans were reported as saying that only "extremely exceptional" requests for passes would be honored.

Arrests Made

Marshal Philippe Petain, chief of the French state, prepared to make an official trip to Lyon Monday to greet the Alsace-Lorraine refugees.

Meanwhile, French police in the occupied zone arrested 871 militant communists, Paris dispatches said, closing 35 establishments printing subversive tracts.

After officially protesting the German expulsion action yesterday, the French stood pat waiting the next German move.

Greeks reported encircling 15,000 Italians—indicating they are fighting rings around 'em.

U. S. Protests Spanish Seizure Of Tangier Zone

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (AP)—The United States has made representations to the Spanish government over the recent establishment of military control of the International zone at Tangier, overlooking Gibraltar.

The state department said today that American Ambassador Alexander W. Weddell made the representations at Madrid on the basis of an old American treaty concerning rights in the international zone.

Great Britain also has made representations.

Snow Follows Cold In Eastern States

Snow ranging up to six inches fell over parts of northeastern United States today while the deep south shivered through an early record-breaking preview of winter.

The snow struck much of the area that earlier this week was buffeted by gales which veteran Great Lakes sailors described as the worst in their memory.

Farther west, in the great plains, warmer weather was moving in although some stations continued to report sub-zero readings.

Six inches of snow blanketed southern Ohio and the state's low reading was 15 above at Bowling Green.

A record-breaking Nov. 15 snowfall occurred in Chicago where 4.8 inches piled up. Crews were kept along transportation routes in the city to keep traffic moving.
