PORTLAND, Nov. 16 (AP)—King Winter held tight to eastern Oregon today, but relaxed his grasp slightly in the western part of the state.

The weatherman forecast little change in temperature in the next 24 hours, but said the coast could expect unsettled weather Sunday while fair weather was in prospect for eastern Oregon.

Coldest point in the state last night was Baker airport again with a minimum of 19. Pendleton had 21, Bend 29, Lakeview 26, Hood River 22 and Burns 24. Minimums rose slightly on the west side of the Cascades with Portland registering 33, Roseburg, 42, Eugene 31, Medford 31, Newport 44, and North Bend 41.

THANKSGIVING DAY ANNOUNCED BY F. R.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—President Roosevelt includes a prayer from the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer, the same he read to the nation election eve, in his Thanksgiving proclamation.

The text of the proclamation: "I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, president of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, the twenty-first day of November, 1940, to be observed nationally as a day of Thanksgiving."

"In a year which has seen calamity and sorrow fall upon many peoples elsewhere in the world may we give thanks for our preservation."

"On the same day, in the same hour, let us pray:

"Almighty God, who hast given us this good land for our heritage; we humbly beseech thee that we may always prove ourselves a people mindful of thy favor and glad to do thy will. Bless our land with honorable industry, sound learning, and pure manners."

"Save us from violence, discord and confusion; from pride and arrogance, and from every evil way. Defend our liberties, and fashion into one united people the multitudes brought hither out of many kindreds and tongues."

"Endue with the spirit of wisdom those to whom in thy name we entrust the authority of gov-

ernment that there may be justice and peace at home, and that through obedience to thy law, we may show forth thy praise among the nations of the earth. In the time of prosperity, fill our hearts with thankfulness, and in the day of trouble suffer not our trust in thee to fail; Amen."

WHEAT RALLIES TO CLOSE CENT HIGHER

CHICAGO, Nov. 16 (AP)—Wiping out an early loss of almost a cent, the wheat market rallied strongly in late trading today and closed with gains of about a cent.

Much of the upturn was associated with covering purchases against previous short sales and weekend evening up operations. Traders said there were reports of expanded mill purchasing on the early break, which was partly in sympathy with weakness of securities.

Outstanding strength of soybeans, which shot up 3 1/4 to 4 1/4 cents a bushel to \$1.04 for December delivery, highest of the season, contributed buying power to grains. Good demand for beans from shippers and indus-

tries and continued small farm marketings bolstered prices.

Wheat closed 1-1/4c higher than yesterday, December 89 1/2c, May 88 1/2c; corn 1-1/4c up, December 64 1/4c, May 63 1/4c; oats 1-1/4c higher.

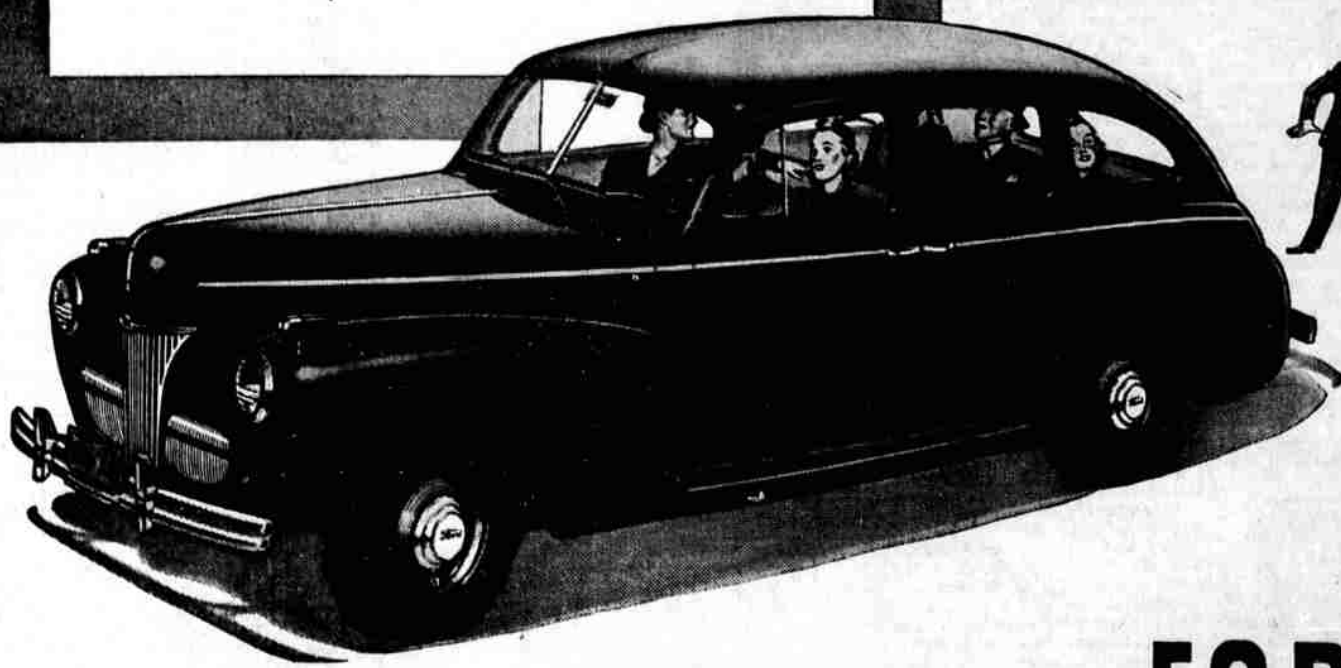
