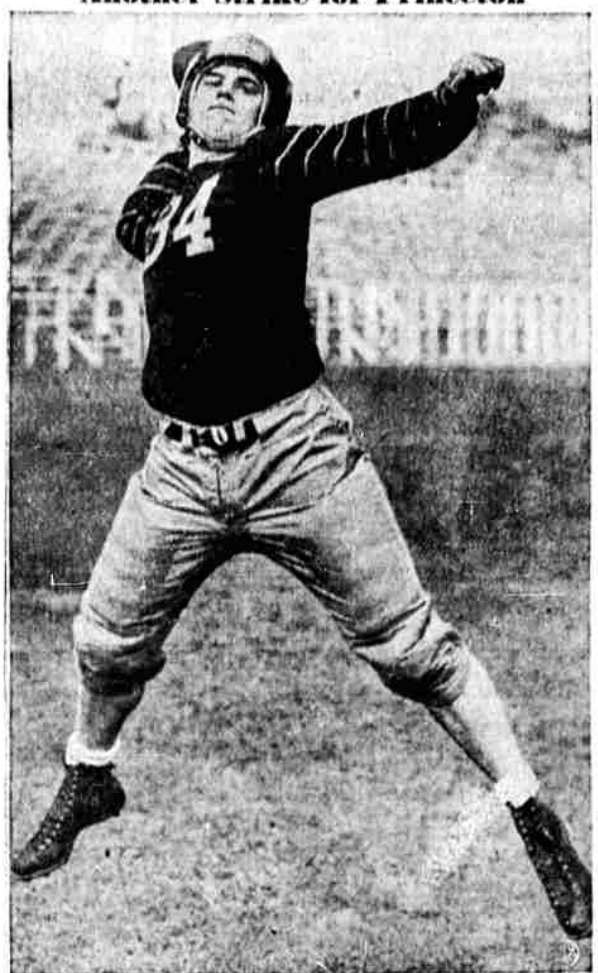


DAVIS BARRED FOR FOULING FRITZIE ZIVIC IN RING

FIGHT ENDS IN FRENZIED RING BRAWL

NEW YORK, Nov. 16 (UP)—In New York's most riotous ring brawl in years, young Al Davis was disqualified for repeated fouling Friday night in the second round of his scheduled 10-round non-title bout with welterweight champion Fritz Zivic.

Zivic won the fight on the disqualification.

When Referee Billy Cavanagh pulled the gladiators apart, after berserk Davis had landed seven or eight palpably low blows, and motioned Davis to his corner, the Brooklyn blond became almost insane with rage at the disqualification.

He tore after pain-wracked Zivic, and despite the referee's warding arms, started to beat Zivic about the head and body—with Fritz desperately trying to fight back. Zivic's manager, Luke Carney, rushed out of the corner and joined in the fray, and then two uniformed policemen leaped into the ring, as newspapers, magazines and penny bags showered into the ring.

It seemed for a moment there would be a general riot at the ringside, but the disturbance was quelled quickly although the booing of the 15,000 angry spectators continued for more than 10 minutes.

Chairman John J. Phelan of the New York boxing commission announced that Davis' purse will be held up until after a commission meeting Tuesday.

The disqualification came at 2:34 of the turbulent second round—a session in which Davis, Brooklyn's "bad boy," desperately was shooting the works after Zivic had given him a terrific beating in the first round.

In the opening session, Zivic of Pittsburgh—who wrestled the 147-pound crown from Henry Armstrong on October 4—battered the floundering Davis about the ring and hit him so hard with a right to the chin that Davis half sank to the canvas, supporting himself on his gloves, with one knee also touching the canvas. Davis was up without a count.

In the second round, Referee Cavanagh warned Davis at least four times he would disqualify him if he continued fouling. But Davis just kept pegging away with his steaming left hook at the champion's groin. Again and again, Zivic was doubled up in agony. The fans were screaming "Foul, foul. Throw him out." And that's what Cavanagh finally did.

Davis' fouling was so flagrant Bill Brown, member of the boxing commission, declared, "I can't talk about rules now because Davis threw them all out the window. We won't need Al Davis any more in New York."

Commissioner Brown was referring to the New York state rule which prevents a boxer winning a fight on a foul. Of course this rule did not apply to tonight's bout because the perpetrator of the fouls was disqualified.

Dr. William Walker, physician to the boxing commission, said Zivic appeared to be injured severely in the groin and suffering intensely.

Zivic told reporters, "The first two low blows didn't hurt much because my protector caught them. But the third was an uppercut that hurt terribly. I tried to fight back but about every third punch was right down in my groin. I was almost paralyzed."

Davis, who weighed 147½ pounds, the same as the champion, was desperate tonight because this was a big betting fight in which he had entered the ring an underdog at 1-2. It was Davis' big chance. Had he beaten Zivic tonight in the non-title bout he would have got a title shot at the winner of the return Zivic-Armstrong championship battle, slated for January 17.

Davis was still furious in his dressing room. He declared "that Zivic is a quittin' bum, he gave me the works and then deliberately stepped into my body punches to make them appear foul. I hit him in the belly and he quit."

18 Hoop Squads Will Compete In New Loop

Eighteen hoop squads, largest number of teams ever to comprise a local casaba circuit, will be included in the Klamath Falls Basketball conference whose schedule for the 1940-1941 season gets underway Monday, December 9.

The league will be divided into two groups, a Commercial league of 10 clubs, including three out-of-town quintets, and Church league of eight aggregations. The whole unit will be under one head governed by a board of directors led by Bob Howard, secretary-treasurer of the conference. Spec Murray, city recreation director, will act as ex-officio member of the board of directors, conducting the greater part of the league's business from his office in the city hall.

Roy Rakestraw of the First National Bank and Gino Carnini of the Tik Tok were unanimously elected to directorships of the Commercial league at a meeting of that group held this week at the city council chambers. Two other directors, to be selected from the ranks of the church teams, will be named next week to complete a five-man ruling body of the Klamath Basketball conference which will have Spec Murray as an advisory member.

The Devil Dogs tallied four touchdowns in the first quarter and two in the second canto, but thereafter the Grizzlies took charge of the game and scored once in the third quarter and twice in the fourth.

Sensational play of the game was the 93-yard return of a punt by Jack Emigh, Montana half-back, to score, in the last 30 seconds of the final quarter. Emigh's progress downfield was behind expert blocking by End Coley Vaughn.

MEDFORD, Nov. 16 (AP)—Medford high's football team will play a Thanksgiving day game against either The Dalles or Astoria, Principal L. P. Mayfield announced. The Peapickers' opponent will be named by an Oregon High School Athletic association committee.

SEATTLE, Nov. 16 (AP)—Sixty-one and sixty-three foot leaps on the indoor ski jump at the Seattle Civic arena Friday night gave Alf Engen, of Sun Valley, Idaho, the national ski jumping champion, leadership in the Pacific Northwest ski jumping championships.

Engen collected 218.7 points, compared with 205.6 for Howard Dalsbo, Seattle, and 201.4 for John Litchfield, Sun Valley. Olav Ulland, Portland, who won the first night's jumping Thursday, fell on his first jump and dropped far behind with a night score of only 162.2.
