

CHIEF CLAIMS GREECE WILL BE DEFEATED

against Italy for her invasion of Ethiopia.

Indications of new axis plans came meanwhile from Berchtesgaden, near Adolf Hitler's Bavarian mountain retreat, as the Nazi fuhrer arranged to meet with Italian Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano and Spanish Foreign Minister Ramon Serrano Suner.

Diplomatic circles in Bern, Switzerland, often an accurate sounding-board, heard that the conferees would discuss axis plans for a gigantic "squeeze play" on the Mediterranean through Gibraltar and Greece.

These sources envisaged a double-barreled assault through Spain against Gibraltar, which guards the west end of the Mediterranean, and through Bulgaria to out-flank and crush the Greeks.

A five-car party of German official photo and press experts—reputedly the same group which filmed and reported the Nazi blitzkrieg through the Low Countries and France last spring—was reported to have arrived at La Linea, near Gibraltar, ready for developments.

Only a few in number, drawing only 100 men from the sixth corps area and 1630 from the eight far western states comprising the ninth corps area.

And practically all of these men are "selectees"—as the army classified them—who have volunteered for training now, rather than wait to be called under ensuing quotas which will swell the draft forces to 800,000 men by next June.

Starting today, this week will be devoted to inducting the "selectees" into service and starting them on their way to regular army posts.

At induction centers, the men—who already have been given preliminary physical examinations in their home communities—will be rechecked by army doctors, fingerprinted and, after taking the oath, be sent on to regular army recruiting points.

WAVELL OKAYS PREPARATIONS ON GREEK ISLE

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 18 (AP) — General Sir Archibald P. Wavell, commander in chief of British forces in the middle east, returned Friday from an inspection of Crete and declared he was satisfied with the progress of intensive work going on to make that Greek island a new wartime stronghold for Britain in the eastern Mediterranean.

Wavell made the journey abroad in a Sunderland flying boat of the royal air force. This correspondent and Alan Moorehead of the London Daily Express were permitted to accompany him.

Not even the pilot knew Wavell was to be a passenger until he stepped aboard the craft in an Egyptian port. A short dash across placid bay and we were winging over the blue expanse that Premier Mussolini calls Italy's sea.

Guns were alert at their posts in the machine-gun turrets and we carried a batch of bombs in case any of 11 Duce's airmen or ships tried to press that claim. They didn't stop us though we passed within 20 minutes flying time of an Italian base in the Dodecanese islands.

We did, however, sight a small sailing vessel and the big Sunderland swooped down to investigate. The four sailors showed their freight when the plane circled above them like a great hawk ready to pounce. Finally, they signalled that they were only fishermen.

Later we descended again to inspect four large French merchant vessels headed toward Syria, presumably to carry French Near Eastern troops back to France.

Soon we saw the rugged hills of Crete, and crossed over the island, looking down on shepherds peacefully tending their flocks in the valleys. If the trip had been made 3000 years ago, the scene would have been much the same.

Grange Considers Farm Proposals

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Nov. 18 (AP)—The National Grange considered today two proposals designed to maintain farm price levels and to "allocate equitably" to each farmer in the nation a share of the domestic crop. Shortly after Harry B. Caldwell, master of the North Carolina State grange, proposed creation of national bargaining agencies to secure fair prices for all farm crops, Ervin King of the state of Washington urged a federal board to set state and county quotas of all crops.

King, whose proposal, along with Caldwell's, was to go before the grange convention in the form of resolutions, asked that county committees of farmers allocate to each producer his share of the county quota, presumably based on production capacities.

with their pay checks, a written statement announcing an open shop policy. The board held this was an unfair labor practice.

The circuit court had ruled the acts of the union constituted an unlawful secondary boycott designed to "destroy the business" of the dairy. A secondary boycott is not directly against the producer of a product but against those who sell the product to the public.

No dissent from Justice Black's opinion was announced.

Also, the tribunal declined to review a decision holding that the labor board may certify as a collective bargaining agency a labor organization which received a majority of the votes cast in an election, even though less than a majority of those eligible to vote had participated.
