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for territory in Thrace which would give the Bulgars their long-desired outlet to the Aegean sea.

Some observers said the public was so thoroughly opposed to war that an ultimatum to Greece might cause serious internal disorders. On the other hand, it was believed that Bulgaria, especially if a new government were formed, might accede to any German request for passage of troops.

Cabinet May Quit
It is believed the present Sofia government may resign after the passage today or tomorrow of a new anti-semitic bill, agitation for which has puzzled the tolerant Bulgarian public. The new government would be presumed to be flatly pro-axis.

(In Bucharest, observers noted Berlin dispatches to the Rumanian press hinting at "a final reorganization of all southeast Europe" and "a great military offensive against Greece, Egypt and Africa by Germany and Italy.")

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would be necessary. Boris may not only have been "requested" to provide passage for the German troops; he may now be expected to make use of his own army against the Greeks.

In return he would get for Bulgaria a passage in the Aegean in the "new order" of things which Hitler, with Mussolini's acquiescence and apparently with Russia's cautious consent, is endeavoring to build for Europe.

Bulgaria is predominantly pro-Russian, by tradition a trustful and hopeful "little brother" of the giant of the east. Therefore, Hitler probably also found it convenient to draw a picture for Boris of the role which the axis has assigned to Russia in the "new order" whatever reservations Russia herself may have on the subject.

This Russian role, as outlined in Berlin, appears to be one of persuading Turkey to take no hasty action in eastern Greece if Bulgaria becomes a willing and helpful roadway for the German troops.

The communiqué said the raiders machine-gunned their targets and dropped high explosive and shrapnel bombs "hitting all objectives."

It acknowledged British bombardments of the Libyan ports of Tobruk and Bardia; Salum, an Italian-held position in Egypt and Agordat, Corondil, Buna and Gherille in east Africa, but said there were no "serious results" except for three persons killed and five injured at Salum.

American Reporter Killed in Crash Of British Plane

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—The state department was notified today that Ralph D. Barnes, correspondent for the New York Herald Tribune, was among four persons killed in the crash of a British bombing plane on a mountain side in Yugoslavia yesterday.

The information came from Arthur B. Lane, the American minister to Yugoslavia. Barnes was an American citizen and had been abroad several years for the Herald Tribune.

Lane said the plane was carrying a large number of bombs and the bodies of the four occupants were found over a radius of 300 meters from the wrecked plane.

He said he was sending an official of the legation to make an investigation at the scene of the crash.

His information on Barnes' identity came from the Yugoslav war office, Lane said.

GREECE APPEALS FOR MORE PLANES

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Greek mountain troops at 1 a. m. today—3 p. m., PST, Monday.

Greek military sources, however, made no immediate claim of capturing the strategic crossroads city 10 miles inside Albania, but a government spokesman declared last night that fascist defenders in the Koritza sector had given up counter attacks and called upon their dive bombers to cover their withdrawal to positions farther back.

Even this, it was reported, failed because of counter action by Greek and British warplanes in which, the Greek high command said today, nine Italian planes were shot down, to two Greek planes lost.

The spokesman reported that "we continue to crush successfully the enemy lines" in a squeeze to cut off the Italians' road of retreat.

Navy Investigates Blaze on Warship

BOSTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—A midnight fire aboard the half-completed destroyer Gwynn at the Boston navy yard—the second fire at the yard in three days—was investigated today by naval officials.

They asserted the Gwynn was not damaged and that flames which sent smoke swirling about the aft smokestack, were confined to scaffolding. Officers said they believed the fire started when waste material came in contact with hot metal.

A fire Saturday on the top floor of a storage building near the Gwynn and three other destroyers under construction was said by investigators to have been caused by spontaneous combustion in stored life preservers and that the loss was \$500.

Last night's blaze was extinguished in about half an hour.

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turn by the AFL and the Shaw Lumber company. Festivity by witnesses for the CIO generally supported the company's stand.

As a possible outcome, the NLRB may order an election, which, if held, would be the second NLRB election within recent months at the Shaw operations.

The first election, conducted last summer, resulted in a "no union" vote. Afterward, the AFL claimed that representatives of the CIO "raided" a pre-election meeting and influenced the balloting. The vote was considered at the time a defeat for the AFL. The CIO had earlier withdrawn, leaving AFL affiliation or "no union" the question to be voted upon.

Outcome of the hearing will be important to other lumber organizations of the Klamath country inasmuch as it will tend to set a precedent for similar labor problems.

In another case of a somewhat similar nature, the NLRB decided that woods employees of the Pelican Bay Lumber company comprised a proper bargaining unit without mill employees. In this instance, however, it was pointed out by representatives of the Shaw Lumber company that the woods employees are physically separated from other parts of the organization, whereas at the Shaw operations woods employees and other employees work and live in one location.

Gulf Warships Held American

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 19 (AP)—A Mexican gunboat captain has reported officially, said dispatches from Tampico Monday, that United States neutrality patrol vessels, and not "enemy" warships, caused a German merchant captain to scuttle his ship and frightened three other Nazi vessels back into Tampico harbor Friday night.

The Mexican naval officer, Lieut. Cuauhtemoc Perez Zavala, was said also to have advised the Mexican navy that one of the United States ships—all destroyers—had entered Mexican territorial waters.

MAN HELD AT EUGENE FOR THEFT OF KLAMATH CAR

David Kendry is held in jail at Eugene on charges growing out of the alleged theft in Klamath Falls of a pickup truck belonging to Theodore Brown.

A charge of larceny of an automobile has been filed against Kendry here, but it is understood that he may be prosecuted instead at Eugene on charges of possession of stolen property.

District Attorney L. Orth Sisemore's office here was notified by Lane county authorities that Kendry and another man were arrested when "stripping" the truck.

DANTE BOMBARDED
LONDON, Nov. 18 (AP)—British light naval forces were reported today to have bombarded oil tanks and coastal and anti-aircraft batteries at Dante, in Italian Somaliland.

The naval C-2, a non-rigid dirigible, once flew 2200 miles from New York to Cape Charles Light and returned in 33 hours and six minutes.

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
