Pabco said the discovery "may be another step for American industry toward achievement of economic independence from foreign raw material sources."

The Pabco laboratories are the technical division of the Paraffine Cos., Inc. Company spokesmen estimated a \$20,000,000 business "will be handed over to American farmers and American manufacturers when the new formula is nationally accepted."

CORFU RESIDENTS LIVE IN CAVES TO ESCAPE DUCE BOMBS

ATHENS, Greece, Nov. 20 (UP)—The entire population of Corfu, exposed island in the Ionian Sea, have been forced from their homes by continued Italian bombing raids and now are living in caves, Alma Godfrey, 28-year-old English governess told King George at an audience Tuesday.

Miss Godfrey, who just arrived from Corfu, said many dead still lay in wrecked homes throughout Corfu city and food had been left to rot in the stores, after the hasty evacuation.

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from their overlords, for the terms of the Berlin-Rome-Tokyo alliance provide for "joint" technical commissions to implement the treaty.

Turkey Big Step
As in the case of today's alliance, "representatives of Hungary will be called in for commission conferences." Called in! It does not require much imagination to see how such a commission can become in fact the government of the small "ally."

Hungary is important, of course, largely as a model. However, there have been indications that something like this was really needed, from the German standpoint, in Hungary—for example, the recent troublesome coal strikes and their internal political repercussions, something that scarcely could occur in a truly totalitarian state.

Now it is up to Rumania, Bulgaria and Turkey, probably in that order.

Rumania, with perhaps a quarter million German troops already in her shrunken borders, ready to move on south, has no choice at all. Bulgaria has very little. Bulgaria may have to pay for her alliance very shortly by using her own army to attack Greece and help out the Italians.

Turkey is the real nut to crack: Turkey, with her British alliance, her possession of the land bridge to the near east, her clutch on the Dardanelles. But the nazis are counting on the passive influence of Russia and the overwhelming weight of the "new order" to the north to bring Turkey smartly into parade formation.

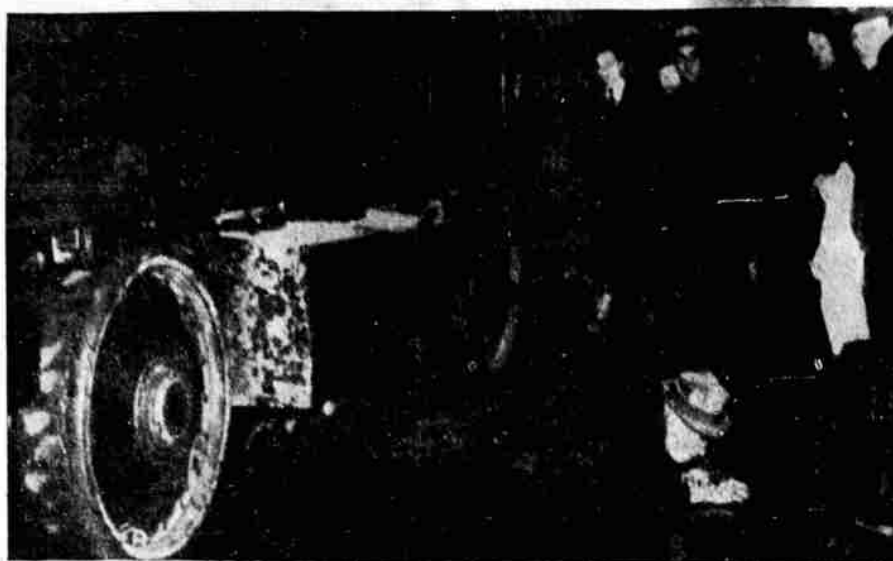
PILOT INJURED

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dropped more than 1,000,000 pounds of bombs, the high command said today.

Five hundred planes dumped bombs, some of them of the greatest size, hour by hour on the armament and supply industries of Birmingham, informed military sources said.

Ports Bombed

The high command's communique reported that London, Liverpool, Southampton and other ports and airfields came in for additional attacks.

Among airports bombed were Marham, Norwich-Latton and Cranwell in eastern England, where hangars and shelters were fired, the high command said.

A "small submarine," an apparent reference to the "baby" submarines reported built in large numbers for attacks in the narrow waters about the British Isles—was declared by the communique to have sunk four merchant ships totaling 23,500 tons, bringing the total of this one undersea boat to 61,500 tons.

The high command said the attacks on Birmingham were made by "strong combat units" from the commands of two field marshals, Kesselring and Sperrle, in "retaliation" for British raids on "retaliation sections" of Hamburg, Bremen and Kiel. Informal sources said the attacks were from varying heights and directions, which made the British defense ineffective.

GREEKS CONTINUE TO BATTER TOWN, FORCE RETREAT

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The Greeks were trying to drive past the Italian emplacements.

ROME, Nov. 20 (AP)—Strong Greek attacks on Italian forces southeast of Koritza in Albania and on both sides of the Kalbaki highway in Epirus, north-west Greece, have been repulsed with heavy Greek losses, the Italian high command claimed today.

Striking at the Suez Canal, eastern gate to the Mediterranean, Italian bombers Monday night attacked a seaplane base and ships in the harbor of Great Bitter Lake, wide basin in the canal itself, the high command said. Also attacked was Ismailia, a large port midway the canal.

Fires Reported

Stefani, the Italian news agency, reported that a violent fire broke out on one merchant ship in the lake, and large fires occurred at the seaplane base.

The high command said a bombing attack was made on the Port of Alexandria, British warship base; on docks on the island Ras-El-Tin, near Alexandria; and on railroad installations at El Hamman, southwest of Alexandria.

A Cairo dispatch reported 52 civilians killed and 79 wounded at Alexandria Monday night by

five successive waves of Italian planes

British planes which attempted to raid the east coast of southern Italy were driven off by anti-aircraft fire without dropping their bombs, the communique said.

Cooperating with the land forces at Koritza and in Epirus, Italian planes bombed and machine-gunned Greek troops, the high command added, hitting roads, barracks and troop concentrations.

Claims Conflicting

Besides three "enemy" planes reported yesterday to have been shot down, the communique said, five others were brought down "in flames." One Italian plane failed to return, it was stated.

(A British announcement said British fighters shot down nine Italian planes yesterday without any British losses.)

In North Africa, the high command reported, Italian planes attacked British armored cars southeast of Sidi Barrani, Italian advance post in Egypt, and inflicted "considerable losses." Italian "fast columns" then overtook fleeing British tanks and engaged the unit "decisively, forcing it to fall back," the high command asserted.

Attacking British planes on patrol, Italian planes shot down six Gloster fighters, the high command said.

called in for conferences on questions touching her interests.

It was the second time that Hungary had linked herself recently with a Rome-Berlin-Tokyo agreement. The first was when she joined the anti-comintern pact February 24, 1939.

By joining up, Hungary became a party to what has been regarded in the United States as an attempt to check American aid for Great Britain.

U. S. Indicated

Since no European power save soviet Russia ever could think of attacking the totalitarian triumvirate—a combine of 250,000,000 people—and specific reservation are made concerning Russia, the United States is the only power envisaged by the pledge of mutual assistance, it was said here.

Russia and Germany are bound by a 10-year pledge of non-aggression, signed at Moscow August 24, 1939, and the original treaty stipulated that the "political status which exists now" between each of the contracting parties and the U.S.S.R. is in no way affected.

Peace Plan

That Hungary, indebted to Germany for getting her northern Transylvania back from Rumania, became a treaty partner was no great surprise since she long had been considered in full harmony with the German nazi rule.

Her purpose, she announced, is to help promote peace.

"Germany, Italy and Japan," said a Hungarian government declaration issued here, "concluded the alliance to call a halt to further expansion of the war, which is severely burdening humanity, and thus give the world as fast as possible a lasting and just peace."

It emphasized the aid of Rome and Berlin in the recovery of Transylvania "without" spilling blood and through peaceful means.

"Hungary, thrown to the ground through the unjust, demoralizing Paris peace dictates and during two decades," it said, "turned for help to those powers which were suffering from an equal fate and the same injustices and were fighting for their vital rights."

LABOR PEACE NOT LIKELY, UNION SPEAKER CLAIMS

"Uniting the CIO and the AFL is a remote proposition at the present time but has the moral support of the rank and file laborers," it was stated here Wednesday at the labor temple by Joe Willis, laborers' business agent for local 1078.

"The movement for amalgamation of the two groups, starting from the top, is weak as yet and has little support in the rank and file," Willis said.

He said the average union working man wants to see the two unions join hands again because the aims of labor cannot be achieved without united action.

National leaders toyed with the idea of bringing the organizations together during the early stages of the national labor conventions in the east.

Nazi Raider at Coventry During Mass Funeral

COVENTRY, England, Nov. 20 (AP)—While anti-aircraft guns barked at a lone German raider over this bomb-devastated city, 172 of some 300 persons killed in last Thursday's overnight attack were buried today in a common grave in the red clay of Coventry cemetery.

Two Spitfires finally chased the raider from the vicinity of the burial ground as hundreds of mourners for those killed by others of his kind in a single night of horror laid wreaths along the 200-foot long trench dug for the flag-decked coffins.

The coffins, bearing shipping tags in lieu of the conventional name plates, were laid three deep in the trench. Some had been carried there last night.

One after the other the rest were lowered into the earth in a silence broken only by the weeping of men and women.

GUARDSMEN NOT EXPECTED HOME FOR HOLIDAY

National guardsmen from Klamath Falls encamped at Camp Clatsop are not expected to receive leaves of absence for the Thanksgiving holiday, according to word received here by parents and friends.

Although some of the men might be given leaves at the last minute, as was the case for the Armistice weekend, it is believed that most members of both local outfits, Battery C and Battery A, will be kept in camp for Turkey day. Their next furloughs will probably come around Christmas, with some possibly being granted leaves before that time.

For Armistice day about 35 of the local boys made the trip home in two busses, arriving here unannounced.

Officers said they believed all participants in the difficulty at Bonanza had been drinking. John, when brought to the hospital here by Deputy Sheriff Dan Warner, was intoxicated and on one occasion denied he had been shot.

The bullet, however, tore through his abdomen and surgery failed to save him. He was on the operating table Tuesday afternoon and died a few hours later.

The state took over the case, despite the fact it involved two enrolled members of the Klamath tribe. District Attorney Sisemore explained that the fact the shooting occurred outside the reservation made it a case for state courts.
