

UNEMPLOYMENT OFFICE MOVES TO NEW SITE

The Oregon State Employment service will move about December 1 from the Elk Hotel building to new quarters at Third and Main streets, Manager Jack Almeter stated Wednesday.

Remodeling of the building at the southwest corner of the intersection at Third and Main streets, is now underway. The employment service will occupy quarters formerly occupied by a grocery store, cafe and barber shop.

These quarters will consist of one large room, with office space partitioned off in the rear.

Alder said the new home will be a great improvement over the old quarters, which were designed for store purposes. There will be three entrances instead of one.

The employment service force now consists of 12 men.

ALIENS MUST SIGN UP BY DECEMBER 26

Alien registration will end on December 26 and all non-citizens who have not yet registered are warned that severe penalties will follow failure to comply with this federal law.

All aliens, 14 years of age and older, must register in person and be fingerprinted.

Alien children, under 14, must be registered by their parents or guardians.

Registration takes place at the postoffices.

There is no charge of any kind connected with alien registration.

The department of justice warns aliens to beware of racketeers.

The postoffice department and the department of justice will willingly assist the alien in every possible way.

Earl G. Harrison, director of Alien registration of the department, suggests that those aliens who have not yet registered do so as soon as possible and avoid the Christmas rush at the post-office.

All aliens are also warned that, having registered, they are required to report any change in their permanent residence address within five days to the immigration and naturalization service of the department of justice in Washington. Forms for this purpose are obtainable at all postoffices.

No alien need be unprepared for the questions he will be asked. Sample registration forms which show him exactly what information he will need at registration are available in all post-offices.

China Says Jap Withdrawal Only Basis for Peace

CHUNGKING, Nov. 20 (UP)—Any effort Japan may be making to end the Chinese-Japanese conflict on a basis other than "complete and unconditional withdrawal of Japanese forces from all China" is doomed to failure, competent Chinese sources said today.

The foreign office would not comment on the Japanese "peace offensive," presumably because nothing is known "officially" about it, but informants let it be known that Foreign Minister Dr. Wang Chung-Hui considers the Japanese move as designed to "create a false atmosphere beneficial to Japan's immediate purposes."

REFUGEES CLAIM RUSSIA CANNOT GIVE NAZIS FOOD

HONG KONG, Nov. 20 (UP)—Russia is "half starved" and cannot spare supplies for Germany, British refugees from Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania said when they arrived here Tuesday.

The refugees, numbering 180 men, women and children left Riga three weeks ago. Members of the party said Russian apprehension over German aggression is acute throughout the soviet union.

REFUGEES ARRIVE FROM ORIENT WAR

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20 (AP)—Navy wives, missionaries, authors and more than 80 children arrived here Tuesday as veritable refugees from the war-torn orient.

They brought varying emotions—thankfulness at escape, loneliness for relatives left behind, and fears for the future of their faraway homes. But for the time at least, relief seemed to predominate.

Some slept in lounges and smoking rooms on the long trip, so crowded was the President Pierce—with its more than 300 passengers—most of whom were classed as evacuees.

The passenger with the most dire prediction probably was Harrison Foreman of New York City, author and lecturer.

His recent stay in the orient led him to believe "Japan has the nerve to risk national suicide, now. She tasted white blood in French Indo China, and found it surprisingly easy. She will move into the Dutch East Indies by spring; despite our warnings, and we'll be at war unless we back down."

Amos Burg, of Portland, Ore., explorer and writer who has been making films in the orient under supervision of Columbia university and said he was in 25 bombing raids, saw the Chinese capital Chungking leveled last August and commented that "the Chinese started building immediately. Their spirit will be hard to beat."

Mrs. Jo Agerton, wife of Lt. Com. A. A. Agerton, of the U.S. navy at Shanghai, and her blonde, curly-haired daughter, Mary Jo, 2, were en route to Coronado, Calif. "I'm really an American flag-waver, I'll tell you," Mrs. Agerton commented, "and I'm glad to be out of the orient—as most of us are."

LADY ASTOR TELLS 'EM OFF IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

LONDON, Nov. 20 (AP)—Lady Astor told 'em off again Tuesday in the house of commons.

The occasion was a request by Sir William Davidson for a more musical warning to replace air raid sirens, about which he said numerous women had complained because "they are more depressing than bombs."

"The women are showing more courage than their men," the American-born Viscountess responded, "and I beg Sir William not to listen to a few nervous letters from a few nervous women."

The ministry of home security has held that the wailing raid sirens are the best type warning devices.

BRITAIN'S DAILY

LONDON, Nov. 20 (AP)—Britain's war expenditures dropped to a daily average of \$9,500,000 (\$38,000,000) last week, against an average of \$12,000,000 (\$48,000,000) the previous two weeks, exchange figures disclosed Tuesday.

The report showed a deficit of \$47,775,074 (\$191,100,296) for the week for all government expenses with revenue of only \$19,844,048 (\$79,376,192) against expenditures of \$67,619,122 (\$270,476,488).

IEU URGES WAGES UPPED FIVE CENTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 20 (UP)—Directors of the Industrial Employees union who claim to represent 6500 members in the lumber industry of the west coast, Tuesday advocated wage increase of not less than five cents per hour throughout the industry.

The unionists reaffirmed their loyalty to the constitution and American institutions, repudiated communism and all other "foreignisms," and declared their willingness to cooperate with all constituted authorities.

Officers of the union announced nine new locals were formed which are distributed throughout the fir and pine regions of the Pacific northwest. They outlined proposed legislative action regarding changes in unemployment compensation in regard to seasonal restrictions and adopted accident insurance free for IEU members while in military training for national defense.

A. D. Chisholm, IEU president, presided at the sessions.

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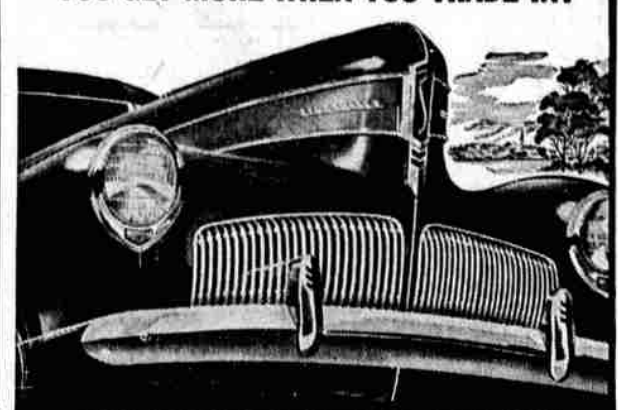


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
