

### APPROVAL HELD BY TULELAKE COUNCIL

TULELAKE—Approval of installation of the pipe lines, hydrants and valves installed by Harvey Conner, Redding contractor for the city water distribution system, was held in abeyance by the city council until arrival next Monday of Edward K. Hussey, city engineer.

The construction crew, completing the initial unit of the system, left Tuesday. Painting of the storage tank is being completed this week and the tile pump house which will protect the turbine pump is under construction. Installation of the pump will also get under way this week and sterilization of the system and tests will be completed within thirty days.

Manuel Smith, contractor for construction of the sewer system, appearing before the council Monday night, stated that work on the system will begin by November 26.

The council in session Tuesday night at an adjourned meeting accepted the resignation of C. F. Eschwig, city judge, to become effective next Monday night at which time his successor will be appointed. Books of the city judge and chief of police were presented for auditing.

### KLAMATH SCHOOL MUSICAL SLATED

The first city school music concert will be presented in the Fremont school auditorium Friday, November 29, with the afternoon performance slated for 3 o'clock, and the evening concert at 7:30 o'clock. It was announced Thursday by Lillie Darby, supervisor of music.

Both the advanced and beginners' bands will be featured, with a brass quartet, flute duet and flute and clarinet duet to be presented. Children from all city schools will take part. Miss Darby will present a boys' chorus from Pelican school, a girls' chorus from Fairview, and a clarinet ensemble of 15 boys and girls from various schools.

Soloist of the evening will be Charles Martin Jr., who will appear in several piano numbers. There will be a small charge made for both performances, the money to go toward the music department.

### PENDLETON ROUNDUP COSTS STAY UNDER BUDGET

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 21 (AP)—The pledge of the Pendleton Round-Up board to keep within the budget for the 1940 show was kept, it was revealed at the stockholders' annual meeting last night, when Lowell Stockman, treasurer, read a report showing the actual cost was \$28,943, compared with a stipulated budget of \$30,300. He said that, following total receipts and disbursements, there was \$859 on hand.

The guarantee of \$6008, subscribed by Pendleton people prior to the show, has been refunded, Mr. Stockman said.

The financial report showed total gate receipts, grandstand and bleachers, of \$28,415. After the deduction of \$2777 for federal taxes, the sum was \$25,638, and to that was added \$694 accrued from concessions. Also added was approximately \$2500 from the \$5000 pari-mutuel race betting fund, the other half having been used, with other funds, to clear up the deficit from the 1939 show.

### Naval Bases Assume Great Importance in Drive for America's Two-ocean Fleet

(Editor's Note: The first duty of the navy is to see that no enemy gets close enough to menace the United States, and of great importance in this respect are the outlying bases. These are the eyes of the fleet, the supply and repair points. They are the subject of the following article, the second in a series of six on the new navy we are building.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP) Outside of its navy yards on the Pacific and Atlantic coasts, the United States has just two bases well enough equipped to do all a base is supposed to be able to do to every kind of a ship from rowboat to oversized battleship.

These are at the Canal Zone and at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. Next to them rank the base at San Juan, Puerto Rico, which will handle limited numbers of all kinds of craft except battleships, and that at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, which provides a deep anchorage and splendid operating facilities. It is a little short of facilities for repairs.

The defense drive and the fleet expansion program has sent a throb of activity pulsing far out into the Pacific islands and down into the Caribbean. But even that will not be enough if the United States is to aim for defense of the western hemisphere.

For a battleship without fuel and injured a long way from home cannot be handled in the same way as a man would deal with a dry gas tank and a blow-out on a lonely road.

If the United States fleet is to operate effectively far down toward the pear shaped tip of South America, it must have facilities there, or the use of facilities borrowed or leased from South American neighbors.

In the new defense drive the navy is developing and expanding a network of naval stations through the islands of the Pacific, along the trade routes to the orient and moving with all speed with plans to use the new sites acquired in the Caribbean from Great Britain.

Many of these are being fitted out to handle naval planes and submarines, for the smaller craft that do patrol duty. But they can serve as fueling stations, too.

These are sprinkled through the Pacific from Alaska far out to the Philippines and to the southward, flanking shipping routes, outposts to warn of any danger that might threaten Hawaii, the Pacific coast and the Panama canal.

They are rising at Kodiak and Sitka, Alaska, at Dutch Harbor, with further developments at Olangapo and Cavite in the Philippines, and on the islands of Midway, Wake, Johnston, Palmyra, Tutuila, Samoa, and at Guam, the latter an outpost of tremendous strategic importance which the navy has been trying to do something about for 40 years. But congress has been hard to sell.

One English authority says that the United States for less than the price of two battleships could throw such a chain of naval bases across the Pacific as to give its fleet entire command of the situation. Guam

would be an integral part of such a system, he said.

Geographically, Guam controls the western Pacific. It is virtually undefended. Plans for its development were about to be put into effect in 1919 but were scuttled by the treaty that grew out of the Washington arms conference. The United States agreed not to fortify Guam and Japan not to fortify certain other Pacific islands.

Most of the other spots in the Pacific are air bases. None of them reaches anything like the proportions of Pearl Harbor. Some of them have ammunition depots. Some have air and submarine facilities.

The station at Pago Pago, Samoa, one of the best natural harbors in the south seas, is without yard facilities or fortifications. That at Cavite is potentially excellent but antiquated. It can dock and repair small ships but the harbor is not well fortified.

Pearl Harbor is the most important overseas base of the navy. The yard is on the south shore of the island of Oahu, 5 miles from the sea and 11 miles from Honolulu.

One of the most important items of a base is a drydock. It takes two years to build one. To handle the biggest ships, a dock must be 1100 feet long, 133 feet wide and 45 feet deep over the entrance sill.

The navy has three drydocks in the Pacific outside of those on the mainland. Two are at Pearl Harbor and the third one, at Cavite, is small. It has another at Panama canal, but on the Atlantic side.

The destroyer trade for bases put sites into the hands of the navy which experts say are the equivalent of five new battleships. They provide a network of outlying defensive outposts which have the double value of flanking trade routes and blocking off any enemy from the canal entrances.
