

JOE KIRK MAY FIGHT CHARGE IN COURT HERE

Joe Luther Kirk, Klamath Indian, is expected to plead innocent and fight the murder charges brought against him in the fatal shooting of Leonard Monte John, another Indian, at Bonanza Tuesday morning.

Kirk is not expected to deny that he fired the bullet that killed John, but he may deny that the shooting was done with malicious intent and disclaim blame for what happened.

After Kirk gave himself up at the county jail Thursday morning, his father, Clayton Kirk, indicated he would obtain legal counsel for the young Indian.

District Attorney L. Orin Sisme more went to Bonanza Friday to make further investigation of the shooting. He and Sheriff Lloyd L. Low and deputies have been working on the case from the time they were notified of the gunplay.

Among those who have been questioned is Gladys Jackson, said to be Kirk's common-law wife, who left the scene of the shooting with Kirk. It was at first reported she said Kirk got out of the car near Dairy and disappeared, but later officers said they believed she and Kirk rode in the car through Hildebrand and in the direction of Chiloquin.

Kirk came in Thursday from the Chiloquin district with his father.

Officers said they had been told trouble developed between Kirk and John when the latter and Nathan Copperfield criticized Kirk for alleged treatment of Gladys.

key follows events, ready to defend herself with all her might."

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Nov. 22 (AP)—The Bulgarian government was reported by a high source today to have been advised by Soviet Russia not to join the three-power axis alliance.

Official quarters and the government-supervised press made no reference to the reported advice as this little nation apparently continued to seek avenues of avoiding involvement in the war.

Leftists Oppose
Bulgarian leftists, representing a large section of the country's public opinion, also are quietly but firmly opposing complete capitulation to the axis.

They argue that so long as Russia stays out of the tripartite pact and so long as the soviet position in the international picture is not perfectly clear, Bulgaria, too, should stay out.

Informed persons said King Boris might hesitate to fly in the face of this opposition, risking real internal trouble. This does not mean, however, that Bulgaria will refuse other demands which Hitler is reported to have made on Boris at their conference last Sunday.

BERLIN, Nov. 22 (AP)—Rumania's premier and foreign minister arrived today and immediately were received by Adolf Hitler for talks expected to lead to Rumanian adherence to the Rome-Berlin-Tokyo axis.

The Rumanians, General Ion Antonescu and Prince Costin Sturza, engaged in lengthy conversations with the fuhrer at the chancellery, where they were accorded military honors by a Nazi guard before proceeding to Hitler's private quarters, the official DNB news agency announced.

It was taken for granted Rumania would join the anti-British totalitarian bloc, as Hungary did Wednesday at Vienna. Bulgaria and Slovakia, little remnants of nazi-dissolved Czechoslovakia, are expected to follow suit soon.

(In the Rumanian capital, the Bucharest Tageblatt printed a dispatch from its Berlin correspondent quoting authorized German sources as saying that the axis alliance "implies that 'passive consent' is given for the passage of German troops through any signatory country if the necessity should arise).

istrator and councillor, and as an industrial statesman."

As he stepped down as head of the organization he helped organize, Lewis declared the CIO had built up "a proud record of accomplishment."

"It has demonstrated to the American people," Lewis added, "that it can advance the well being of its members and yet protect the privileges and the rights of every other American."

The choice of pro- and anti-Lewis groups, Murray in his acceptance told the convention he stood before it "humble in the sight of God."

No Illusions
"I have no illusion about the mighty honor this convention has thrust upon me," he said. "I have no illusions about the weighty responsibilities entailed in becoming president of the great organization."

Murray and Lewis had worked together 30 years, both as leaders of the United Mine Workers of America and as CIO executives. Lewis recently said he had an "affection bordering on actual love" for the man he chose to succeed him when Wendell L. Willkie, supported by Lewis, lost the presidential election.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 22 (UP)—The Congress of Industrial Organizations last night gave its probable new president, Philip Murray, what some of his advisers considered a mandate to purge communists from the ranks of its paid employees.

The convention adopted a resolution declaring that policies "emanating from totalitarianism, dictatorships and foreign ideologies such as nazism, communism and fascism... have no place in this great modern labor movement."

Lewis Attacks F. R.
The anti-labor resolution and a new attack on President Roosevelt by CIO President John L. Lewis featured the brief Thanksgiving day convention session, and apparently cleared the way for election of Murray by acclamation at 10 a. m., EST., tomorrow.

Murray has not publicly changed his declaration that he is not a candidate for and does not want the presidency. Lewis is retiring because he backed Republican Presidential Nominee Wendell L. Willkie in a losing fight and said he would consider Mr. Roosevelt's reelection a repudiation of himself.

COURT CONTINUES STIFF SENTENCES

Justice of the Peace Joseph Mahoney indicated Friday there will be no relenting from the stern policies he has adopted on drunken driving cases.

Judge Mahoney gave Charles Wesley Jones a sentence of 10 days in jail and a \$100 fine when Jones admitted he drove on South Sixth street while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

Theodore McKinley Walker pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while his operator's license was suspended, and was sentenced to a fine of \$50 and 10 days in jail. Walker pleaded innocent on a charge of drunken driving, and bond was set at \$500 property or \$250 cash.

Judge Mahoney has recently been giving jail sentences on drunken driving cases, as well as fines. He said Friday that hereafter, when an offender wants to "lay out" a \$100 fine instead of pay it, it will take 50 days to do so. Previously, the judge made the fines \$100 or 30 days.

GREEKS CLAIM ADVANCE ALONG ENTIRE FRONT

(Continued From Page One)

reached the army general staff here at noon, and a short time later it was spread to the public by the newspapers.

Crowds marched through the city's streets, cheering. Premier John Metaxas was given a great ovation when he paused on the steps of army headquarters and announced the news to hundreds gathered before the building.

There were no details of the fate of the Italian forces which defended Koritza, but it was reported that a large number were captured.

(Yugoslav border reports said the Greeks met no resistance in the city, the Italians having retired to the west overnight.)

Planes Drop Food
A government spokesman said that before the day is over there may not be "a single Italian left in Greek territory."

So swiftly and so deeply were the Greeks said to have followed the receding wave of Italian invasion that their trucks could not keep up in the Albanian mountain wilderness and Greek and British planes dropped food to the Greek vanguards.

Aerial observers reported the Italians were abandoning Koritza along roads covered by Greek mountain guns and other reports said Italian resistance before Argirocastro was so shattered the advancing Greeks virtually were unopposed. The collapse was attributed to several demoralizing breaks through the fascist southern front.

Supplies Taken
At both these menaced centers the Italians had amassed huge stores of supplies for their armies.

"All over the front, fighting continued throughout the day and our troops scored further successes," a general headquarters communique early today described yesterday's action.

"We took 15 guns, of which seven were heavy artillery pieces, four anti-aircraft guns, dozens of machine-guns, many howitzers and all kinds of material, also foodstuffs and fuel depots."

"Our aviation carried out successful reconnaissance flights and bombing of battlefields."

BITOL, Yugoslavia, Nov. 22 (AP)—Spreading guerrilla warfare against the Italian army by bands of Albanian mountaineers was reported today in private advices reaching the Yugoslav border.

Leftists bearing the name of King Sog, Albanian ruler whom the Italians ousted last year, calling on his countrymen to revolt were said to have been dropped by British planes and to have brought new recruits to the rebels.

The fall of Koritza to the Greeks today was reported to have encouraged the guerrillas to greater activity.

These attacks, however, had not taken on the character of a general uprising, the reports emphasized. The rebels were said to be cooperating with Greek irregulars who slipped into Albania in advance of the Greek army.

Greek and British warplanes, following up the capture of the Italian base at Koritza, harassed Italians retreating westward with repeated bombing and machine-gunning attacks.

The Italians themselves sent over waves of planes to pound Koritza in an effort to slow up the Greek ground forces smashing at the heels of the fascists. These attacks started a few hours after the Greeks marched triumphantly into the town, 10 miles from the Greek frontier.

"But we are not going to move against innocents," he repeated.

Publisher Sees No War in Pacific
HONOLULU, T. H., Nov. 22 (UP)—B. W. Fleisher, former owner and publisher of the Japan Advertiser of Tokyo, today said Japanese Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka had told him he was "determined there shall be no American-Japanese rupture."

Fleisher, who is en route to the United States aboard the liner Yawata Maru, said Matsuoka explained to him that the Japanese alliance with the axis powers was a step made in hope of restraining the United States from warlike moves in the Pacific.

"It is my own opinion that there will be no war in the Pacific," said Fleisher. "That thought will not be welcomed by the big-navy men, who naturally are promoting bigger and better navies."

NAZI PLAN
BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 22 (UP)—The newspaper Critica today described an alleged nazi-fascist plan for division of Buenos Aires into four districts controlled by a hierarchy of nazi officials as a step toward rapid dissemination of totalitarian ideas in Argentina.

DUBINSKY, FAY IN BRAWL AT AFL CONCLAVE
NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 22 (UP)—David Dubinsky, president of the International Ladies' Garment Workers union, who has been seeking a purge of American Federation of Labor "racketeers," engaged in a fist fight yesterday with Joseph Fay, vice president of the International Union of Operating Engineers.

Subsequently Fred F. Umphrey, executive secretary of Dubinsky's union, fought in the hotel lobby with an unidentified AFL convention delegate.

Dubinsky finally asked a police guard be assigned to his wife and daughter.

Fighting Mad
Dubinsky is sponsoring a resolution which would give the AFL executive council power to oust union heads convicted of crimes. While they have denounced racketeering some AFL leaders have contended this was a matter for the unions themselves to cure, since they hold autonomy over their own affairs.

Dubinsky was fighting mad tonight about another matter. He charged that the AFL executive council, in its report to the convention, repudiated a pledge it made to the ILGWU convention in May, 1940, and that members of the group were agitating secretly to break a second promise. He said his union had returned to the AFL, after deserting the CIO, because of these commitments.
