COLORADO, DENVER PLAY 3-3 DEADLOCK

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 22 (UP)—University of Utah Thursday ended its football season with a 13-6 win over University of Idaho Vandals as Denver and Colorado universities handed the conference title to the Utes by playing to a tie in Denver.

Played on a snow-swept field before a meagre crowd of 3000 spectators, the Ute-Vandal game threatened to end in a victory for Idaho, after it got all the advantage in both breaks and weather in the first half to hold a 6-0 lead at intermission.

But it was a different Utah team which took the field at the beginning of the second half and drove to two quick touchdowns before the last period was well under way.

Idaho's score came on a freak play midway in the first quarter when George Nixon, halfback, threw a deflected pass that bounced into the arms of Ute Guard Rex Geary, then out again. Coming up fast, Rudy Franklin, Vandal fullback, took the ball before it dropped and ran from the Ute 40 for the touchdown. The conversion placekick was blocked.

DENVER, Nov. 22 (UP)—The Universities of Denver and Colorado battled to a 3 to 3 tie in their traditional Thanksgiving day football game Thursday and handed the University of Utah the 1940 Big Seven conference gridiron title.

Both teams scored field goals in a hectic last quarter before 28,000 fans who gathered to watch the 36th meeting of the rivals. Denver's field goal came in the final minute of play, and as the ball sailed squarely between the uprights Utah U. became the undisputed Big Seven champion.

Had either team won today's game it would have finished the season as co-champion with Utah. The tie gave Utah its 2nd title in three years, left Colorado U., 1939 titlist, tied with Denver in second place.

KANSAS DROPS 45-20 SIZZLER TO CHRISTMAN

NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (AP)—The Thanksgiving football turkey, a lean but succulent dish, was picked to the bones Thursday and the nation's fans are going to get a bigger and better grid menu Saturday.

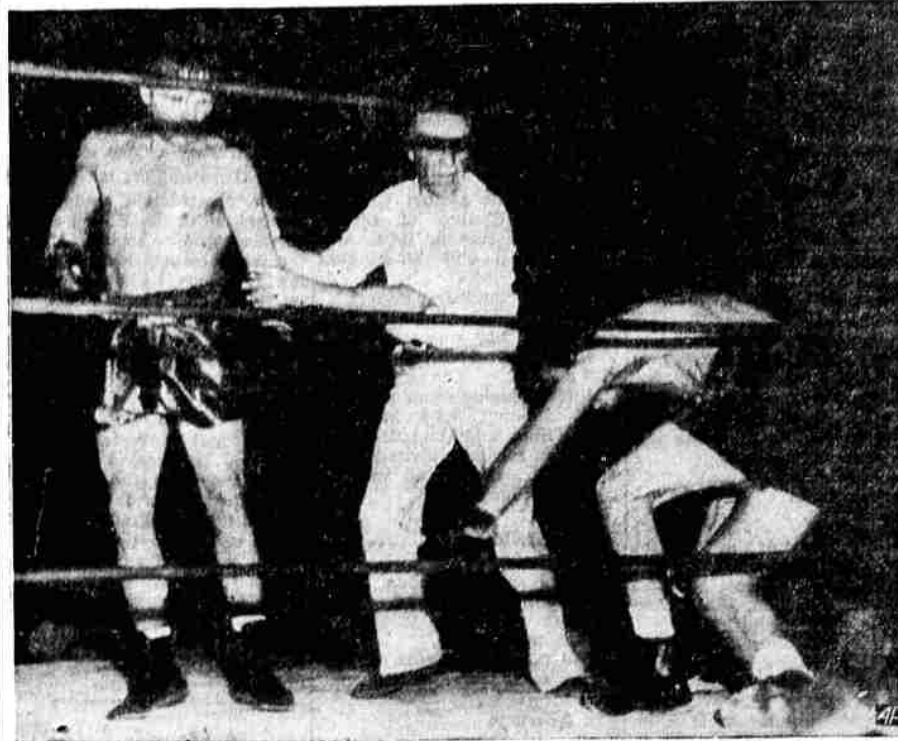
The day's best spectacle from the fans' viewpoint was Missouri's 45-20 sizzler with Kansas. Paymaster, making his last appearance in a Tiger uniform, ran for two touchdowns, pitched his famous passes for another and set up all but one of Missouri's other tallies.

The biggest upset was Maryland's 14-7 rout of Rutgers, which previously had lost only to Princeton and undefeated Lafayette. William and Mary surprised some people by smashing the University of Richmond 16-0 for the Virginia state honors and knocked the Spiders out of a slim chance to tie for the Southern conference title. Virginia Military vanquished Virginia Tech 14-0.

Otherwise form received softer treatment. In the east Fordham's once-beaten Rams raided Arkansas by air 27-7 and Marshall helped its galloping Jackie Hunt to an all-time scoring record by wallowing West Virginia Wednesday 67-0. Hunt scored four touchdowns to bring his total for the year to 27 for 162 points. Twenty-six touchdowns was the old mark. San Jose (Calif.) State ran its victory string to ten straight by stopping South Dakota 40-7 in a "Prune Bowl" game. San Jose's only loss in two years was this season's opener.

CHICK-KRUSE BOUT SIGNED FOR TUESDAY

Broccoli Bob Kruse, the Oswego farmer, will return to Klamath Falls next Tuesday night for a coast tournament clash in the semi-final with Dude Chick, Promoter Lillard announced Friday.

The big Oswego, undefeated so far in the tournament, is expected to hand the Wyoming whirler, loser to Jesse James last week, a hard battle. With one defeat against him, Chick must win to stay in the tournament.

In the opening engagement Bulldog Jackson will clash with Eddie Marcus, New York Jewish grappler, in a tussle which will mean elimination for one of the two contestants. Each has one loss against him in tournament standings.

In the headline bout, Pete Belcastro, Italian ruffian, will clash with Jesse James of Greece. This scrap, considered the greatest "natural" of the year, will bring the fury of the Greek-Italian war to the local arena. Considerable ill-will has worked up between the two matmen. James is undefeated, after edging out Dude Chick last week, and Belcastro has one loss against him.

Cavemen Wallop Corvallis Team

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 22 (AP)—The Grants Pass Cavemen closed their best season in years on Thanksgiving day in defeating Corvallis 19 to 0.

The lighter locals scored once in each of the first three quarters, first by blocking Knoll's punt back of his own goal line, second by a long pass from Captain Bill Davis to Aggie Martin, and lastly on Davis' 15-yard smash through center.

The aroused Spartans stopped a fourth touchdown drive in the final period and then threatened repeatedly. The game's last play was a pass into the Grants Pass end zone falling by inches.

Corvallis tallied six first downs to five, 77 yards by scrimmage to 91, and 10 yards in the air to 24. There were many fumbles.

The game gave Grants Pass six victories, one tie, and one defeat for the season. A game next week with Ashland has been cancelled.

STAGG MEN TROUNCE NEVADA, 24-6

STOCKTON, Calif., Nov. 22 (UP)—College of Pacific, capitalizing on blocked kicks, Thursday trounced U. of Nevada, 24-6, in a Thanksgiving day football game before 4000 persons.

After Nevada scored in three plays from the opening kickoff, Pacific came back strong with two touchdowns in each of the second and third periods to win.

Nevada ran back the opening kickoff to the COP 27, and on the third play of the game Halfback Elwynn Triger took it over with a 16-yard jaunt.

In the second period College of Pacific marched 55 yards to tie the score, with Quarterback Tom Olacta getting the last five yards. COP then recovered a Nevada fumble on the Nevada 25 and the COP passing combination, Bill Thomas to Martin Procher, clicked off four successful passes for another score with three seconds left in the first half. COP took a 12-6 lead into the dressing rooms at halftime.

In the third period COP got possession on the Nevada 31 and Thomas reeled off 28 yards to the Nevada 3, from where Jack Frizholz ran it over. A few minutes later COP blocked a kick on the Nevada 32 and worked it down to where Frizholz scored again.

FRESNO, Calif., Nov. 22 (UP)—Fresno State college Thursday overwhelmed Colorado School of Mines, 28-0, in a Homecoming football game before 7500.

Scoreless in the first period, Fresno got started when Halfback Lester Terry skipped 18 yards down the sidelines to a touchdown. In the third period Terry repeated with another 18-yard gallop to score and Ray Patterson, fullback, went nine yards for another.

CHICO, Calif., Nov. 22 (UP)—Fumbles gave the California Aggies a 12-6 victory over Chico State Thursday in a Thanksgiving football game. The Aggies recovered a Chico fumble behind the Chico goal in the first period and another in the second period on the Chico 25, from where they passed to a touchdown. Chico marched 80 yards for its only score in the second period.

SAN JOSE, Nov. 22 (UP)—Coach Glenn Schober "Pop" Warner's tricky San Jose State football team trounced the University of South Dakota, 40-7 Thursday in Spartan stadium before 6500 fans. It was San Jose's 10th straight win.

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 21 (UP)—Kenny Washington led his Hollywood Bears to a 20-6 victory over the Oakland Giants Thursday in a Pacific Coast professional football league game.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (AP)—Texas Lew Jenkins, who's a stubborn kind of guy, is going to try to prove tonight that lightning can't strike twice in the same place—and particularly his chin.

He puts his world lightweight championship on the line in Madison Square Garden against the bid of the choir boy from Chicago and Gary, Ind., Pete Lello, with a hoped-for crowd of about 15,000 sitting in.

Pete flattened Lew in Chicago about 20 months ago, and, regardless of what Lew says about how it happened, Pete really put the old ringer on him. The referee counted the full ten that night, and could just as well have counted thirty or forty.

Since then the Sweetwater swatter has won the 135-pound throne, as recognized in New York, California and various other spots, and in recent weeks has maintained that the fight with Lello was just one of those things. He explains he was a hungry kid, fresh out of a job as an army horseherd at that time, that he arrived in Chicago somewhat worse for wear and that he wasn't right. He's betting Lello couldn't do it again with a tommy-gun in each hand.
