reduction from last year. The Klamath Falls rate is composed as follows:

In general outside areas, the combined rate was sliced from 36.8 mills to 35.1 mills. These properties contribute to the state and county, county unit elementary district, and county unit high.

Big Chilquin Cut
The rate in the suburban areas near Klamath Falls was cut from 44.1 in 1939 to 43.4 mills in 1940. The combined rates for these districts are composed of the state and county rate, the rate for the county unit elementary and the Klamath Union high school district No. 2.

Biggest rate cut for any unit was at Chilquin, where the new rate is 52.6 mills as against 66.6 last year. Chilquin's tax rate is made up as follows:

Assessor Mack said that Chilquin is raising taxes for debt service, only, this year. He stated that income from the water department and the Chilquin liquor store, only municipal beer store in Oregon, has been sufficient to meet the town's operating expenses.

AMIRAL LEAHY TO BE FRENCH ENVOY

heavily on him as chief of naval operations. Leahy will succeed Bullitt, who submitted his resignation on Nov. 7. Hassett said he did not know whether the resignation had been accepted formally, but that it is "safe to assume it will be."

Mr. Roosevelt had offered the French post to General John J. Pershing, but the World War AEF commander declined it on advice of his physicians.

There was no indication of who might succeed Leahy as governor of Puerto Rico nor was any word forthcoming as to Bullitt's future.

Admiral Leahy, 65 years old, is a native of Hampton, Va., and a graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis in 1897. He attained the rank of rear admiral in 1927, serving as chief of the bureau of ordinance for four years. For the next two years he was commander of the destroyers scouting force, then became chief of the bureau of navigation. In 1936-37, he was a vice admiral, commanding ships of the battle force, then he was named admiral commanding the battle force.

He was chief of naval operations from 1937 until his retirement on Aug. 1, 1939. He was named governor of Puerto Rico early this year.

He served in the Spanish-American war, the Philippine insurrection and in the Boxer uprising and in 1912 was chief of staff of the Nicaraguan occupation. He held the same position in the Haitian campaign in 1916. He holds the navy cross.

BRITISH FINANCES SHRINKING, CLAIM

"American assistance was not enough." (At Hyde Park yesterday President Roosevelt said that everything possible to aid Britain was being done at the present time and that it should not be taken for granted that consideration was being given to expanding assistance. When he was informed there had been some discussion of extending credit to Britain—a move which would require a change in the Johnson act forbidding loans to nations in default on World war debt payments—Mr. Roosevelt said there had been no discussion of this in the government.

Confidence High
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"Confidence in ultimate victory is high," Lord Lothian said. "The people have not the slightest doubt that they are going to win, and the bombings have intensified national unity. The people feel that they are not going to be done in by Hitler, but that they are going to do Hitler instead."

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Lord Lothian said the first half of 1940 was considered a Hitler year but the English "stopped him completely and he got nowhere."

"This does not mean the end of the war, however," he added. "Next year will be a tough and difficult year, and the more material we get from the United States, the better."

No Men Needed
At no point in the discussion of finances did he indicate that Britain would seek aid from the United States. What his country planned in the financial field was not explained.

He was explicit, however, in stating that England "definitely does not need men" as part of the war aid extended by this country.

Greek successes against Italy, he continued, had made the British "thoroughly enthusiastic."

"We think it is very good for Mussolini that the Greeks are winning," he said with a smile.

RUMANIA PUTS SIGNATURE ON HITLER TREATY

which would carry German troops toward the Dardanelles. However, the consent of Rumania would not signify that Turkey did not mean to defend herself with all her might."

Italians Flee
Greek spokesmen said at least 72,000 Italians fled westward after giving up their base of Koriza and abandoning stores of supplies and quantities of armaments.

Captured Italian equipment, the Greeks said, included 80 small and heavy guns, 55 anti-tank guns, twenty tanks, more than 1500 motorcycles and bicycles, 250 automobiles, in 25 days of war.

Axis raiders striking at London just after dawn sent crowds scurrying to shelter, but the alarm was brief. During the night the German air force renewed its attacks on Birmingham, German sources reported.

Returning pilots said huge new fires were started in the city, and that aircraft manufacturing centers were subjected to dive-bomber attacks.

London dispatches confirmed that widespread attacks on the industrial midlands occurred, but censored identity of the most of the raided cities. The Liverpool area was admitted to have been one of the targets of Nazi airmen.

China Regime
Japan was reported to have abandoned hope of making peace with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's Chungking government. Japanese sources said, instead, Japan would recognize the Tokyo-dominated regime of President Wang Ching-Wei at Nanjing as the "national government of China" within a few days. The Nanking government already claimed that title for itself a few days after it was set up last March as the "central Chinese government."

Effective Tool
Antonescu, in signing the pact with Germany, said the axis powers already have victory over Britain in their hands and said Rumania inwardly had joined the axis long ago.

"An effective tool for the reorganization of Europe and the world has been created by the three-power pact," Antonescu declared.

Hitler did not attend the ceremony. Rumania, a World war ally of Britain, was strongly pro-British until last summer. But she lost Transylvania to Hungary, Bessarabia to Russia and South Dobruja to Bulgaria and came more and more within the Nazi sphere.

King Carol abdicated Sept. 6 and fled. German troops moved into the country Oct. 12 ostensibly to train Rumania's army and protect her oilfields.

French Prisoners Released By Nazis

BERLIN, Nov. 23 (AP)—Authorized sources said tonight "several tens of thousands" French war prisoners are to be released to their families under a German-French agreement. Only scant details of the agreement were made known here tonight, but the Nazi informants said an undetermined number of the thousands of prisoners who are the fathers of families of four or more minors would be released to return to homes in occupied France.

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KLAMATH TO HAVE IWA CONVENTION

Making a report on his tour, Dyer said, "the IWA is taking every advantage of present day conditions. The organizing tempo will be increased until we can count every woodworker a union member."
