INDIAN OFFICIAL MAY VISIT TRIBE

Senator Elmer Thomas of Oklahoma, chairman of the senate committee on Indian affairs, may visit the Klamath Indian reservation next week.

Senator Thomas so informed B. G. Courtwright, Klamath agency superintendent, when Courtwright was in Washington earlier this month. The senator said he plans to visit Bonanza and Grand Coulee dams, and on his way to San Francisco will stop off here. Courtwright expressed a desire to look over lumber mills in this district.

KLAMATH MASONS TO FETE MASTERS

Klamath Lodge No. 77 A. F. & A. M. will pay special tribute Monday night to the past masters of Klamath lodge, and to all visiting past masters in this community who are in attendance. The past masters have at this meeting the privilege of exemplifying the work as they did it in years past.

Klamath lodge received its charter from the grand lodge June 15, 1880, and under the competent leadership of their first master, Alex. McCarten the lodge has continued to grow from a membership of seven members to nearly four hundred. In the early days it was often found necessary for one of the members to saddle his horse and go out and round up enough members to open the lodge. The early records of the lodge as well as the charter were lost when the building in which the lodge held its meetings was destroyed along with many others by a fire which swept the small community of Linkville. Klamath lodge has made rapid growth and in 1934 purchased their present home from the Loyal Order of Moose.

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WORKMEN RUSH TO FINISH NEW MOVIE THEATRE

With just one week left before the opening of Klamath Falls' new \$150,000 theatre, The Esquire, workmen, artists, and skilled craftsmen are working rapidly to have the attractive building ready for the big invitational preview slated for Friday evening, November 29. Invitations to the opening may be obtained from The Herald and News office, chamber of commerce, Hickman's Coffee shop, Louie Polin's, Parks Grocery on South Sixth, and in Chilquien at the Chilquien Review office, the Klamath Free Press office in Bonanza, and at the Tulelake Reporter in Tulelake, according to Al Fourmet, manager of the new showhouse.

At the formal opening scheduled for Saturday, with a continuous performance starting at 1 o'clock until 11:30 p. m., one of the hits of 1940 will be thrown on the new screen, Gary Cooper in "The Westerner," supported by an all-star cast including Walter Brennan, Fred Stone, Doris Davenport, and others.

Among the features is one which has never been available in this city before, namely, acousticon earphones for the hard of hearing. The phones are loaned to persons who request them at the box office. Fourmet stated the use of acousticon earphones is a great boon to those persons who, in the past, have not had the full enjoyment from "talkies."

Decorators put the finishing touch to the interior of The Esquire this week, and now all that remains is the small amount of work on the exterior and the removal of the scaffolding which has embraced the building since the first concrete was poured into the huge forms of the building.

A local staff has been hired by Fourmet who came to this city from Eureka, Calif., where he was manager of the Humboldt county string of theatres for George Mann, owner of Redwood Theatres, Inc.

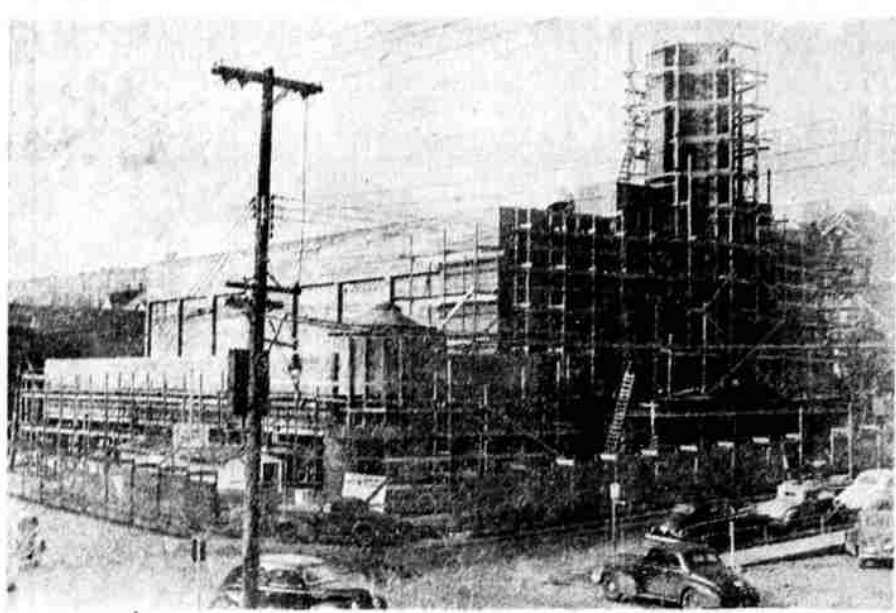
