Ford Believes In Double Navy

DETROIT, Nov. 27 (AP)—Henry Ford believes "two oceans with an adequate navy in each" presents the greatest security for the United States. He said so in an interview today after announcing completion of plans for the establishment of a branch of the Great Lakes naval training station at his Rouge plant.

"This is the best thing I know of that I could do to help the national defense," he said. "My interest in the navy is based on the conviction that it is the most vital arm of our national defense. Our protection is the navy's job. We have two oceans. What we need now is a good navy in each of them, including as many airplane carriers as possible."
