

20-30 LEADER SCHEDULED TO TALK IN CITY

V. G. "Skip" Wolfe, national president of 20-30, will be the honored guest of the local 20-30 club on the occasion of its 10th anniversary, which is scheduled for Wednesday evening, December 4, at the Willard hotel.

"Skip," as Wolfe is called by the thousands of Twenty-Thirties throughout the country, is the originator of "Safety-Sally," a lifelike figure of a little girl made of metal, which is seen at school crossings throughout the country. He is thirty years old and is a charter member of the 20-30 club of Orange, Calif. Wolfe has held all the offices in his local club and has been both a deputy and district governor of 20-30. In 1938 he was appointed to the national board of trustees and was elected vice president of the association of 20-30 clubs.

At the San Diego national convention held last summer, he was unanimously elected to the national presidency.

The local 20-30 club deems it an unusual privilege to be honored with a visit by "Skip" at the time of our anniversary, said Tony Manno, local president and member of the national board of trustees for 20-30. Plans for the birthday celebration call for an interesting evening of entertainment, initiation of candidates for membership and attendance by men prominent in local service club circles, which include Mayor-elect John H. LUMBER FIRM BACK WAGE PLAN IS RECOMMENDED

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 27 (UP)—A plan which would permit the Carlisle Lumber company of Washington to pay 148 reinstated workers back wages on the installment plan was recommended to the US circuit court of appeals Monday by Special Master Estes Snedecor of Portland, Ore.

The company was ordered to reinstate the workers and pay them back wages amounting to approximately \$150,000 following a labor dispute.

Company attorneys said the back wages would "bankrupt" the firm if they were paid in a lump sum. Paid on the installment plan over a period of five years, the company could continue its lumbering operations and strengthen its financial position, the attorneys said.

WESTERN PACIFIC REPORTS OCTOBER REVENUE INCREASE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 27 (UP)—The Western Pacific Railroad company Monday reported an increase of railway operating revenue and of total income during October, 1940, as compared with October, 1939.

Operating revenue last month was \$2,229,468.48 compared with \$2,079,096 for the same month last year. Total income in October, 1940, was \$781,587.77 compared with \$695,618.80 in October, 1939.

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 27 (UP)—John (The Great Lover) Barrymore Tuesday shed his fourth wife, the pouty-lipped Elaine, and resumed with a Scotch highball in hand his search for the perfect mate.

While Elaine Barrie recited her troubles to the judge, the great Barrymore lolled in the best leather chair of his lawyer a few blocks away, and talked of love as he had known it.

When the flash came from court, announcing his six years of strife with the sultry-eyed Elaine had come to an official end, Barrymore poured another drink into the great profile and announced:

"I am greatly relieved that my divorce is all over and that I am free to resume my search for the perfect mate."

The screen's most persistent lover was married in succession to the Misses Katherine Harris, Blanche Oelrichs, Dolores Costello and Elaine and he once said he learned about women from them all.

Before she was appearing in a movie entitled "How to Undress Before Your Husband," Barrymore spent a small fortune buying up the prints of that one, and for several years insisted she act in his pictures. She did, but invariably she was the face on the cutting room floor.

They fought—and kissed and made up—across the country and back again. They nearly were divorced twice. The final split came in Hollywood about two months ago.

He was earning \$5000 a week, but a referee in bankruptcy kept \$4000 of it to pay his debts, mostly lawyer's bills.

COUNTERFEIT COIN CATCHES CULPRITS

TACOMA, Nov. 27 (AP)—Two young negroes were in jail under robbery charges here today, all because Detective George L. Burgeson saw a counterfeit half-dollar and caught it in mid-air.

Burgeson and Detective Harry Nelson received a report Saturday night that two negroes had stolen \$84, plus a counterfeit 50-cent piece, from the cleaning shop operated by Mrs. Jorati Mori. The detectives cruised lower Broadway hunting the pair.

In a dark stairway, they caught a rear view of two dim figures. As they approached, the two men, kneeling on one step,

counted out money on a step above them. "We still," said one after an equal division had been made, "got a half-dollar left." "Heads," said the other. "Tails," said the first. The half-dollar slipped into the air. Burgeson caught it, found it counterfeit. Charles Martin, 25, of Toledo, Ohio, and Leonard Love, 25, of Monroe, La., were jailed. The detectives recovered \$84 besides the phony fifty-cent piece.

NEW PROCEDURE FOR UNEMPLOYED FILINGS STARTED

SALEM, Nov. 27—A new procedure by the state unemployment permit compensation commission will permit unemployed workers to file claims for 1941 benefits the first week in December although the first waiting week may not be served until the week beginning December 9, it was announced Wednesday by Administrator Silas Gaiser.

As three waiting weeks must be served before insurance is paid, the earliest possible compensable week for the new year will end January 4, 1941.
