

THREE FREED OF NUISANCE CHARGE HERE

On a motion by District Attorney L. Orth Sisemore, Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst Thursday dismissed charges against Harry Mazier, Keith Childreth and Charles Harold Stone. The trio had been scheduled for trial on a count of maintaining a nuisance.

The motion for dismissal was made when it was deemed that insufficient evidence existed to obtain a conviction. Mazier, former owner of the Logger's club on The Dalles-California highway at Wocus, was found not guilty Wednesday night on a charge of illegal sale of liquor. A jury of nine men and three women returned the verdict at 9 o'clock after 25 minutes consideration.

E. E. Driscoll and U. S. Balentine, defense counsel, produced two witnesses in support of their case, while District Attorney Sisemore questioned three for the state.

Mazier's dismissal on the nuisance charge and acquittal on the

charge of illegal sale disposes of the second and third of a series of six indictments brought last spring after several raids on night clubs of the Klamath Falls district.

Carl Walters, owner of the Clover club, Monday was found guilty of illegal sale of liquor. The case of state versus Walters, Maizie Walters and Judith Michelle, all charged with maintaining a nuisance, is scheduled Friday.

A Greek government spokesman said the Greek counter-offensive into Albania had taken the initiative generally and now was driving ahead "with the same speed which has marked the attack of recent days."

In the aerial siege of England, the Germans reported that more than 100 nazi raiders pounded the southwest port of Plymouth, dropping 110 tons of bombs, and also attacked London again to set a new series of fires.

The British said between 150 and 200 German planes raided "a southwest town"—evidently Plymouth—from dusk until 2:30 a. m., scattering incendiary bombs and high explosives which left "barely any scars," according to the official account. Unofficial reports told of 11 deaths in the Plymouth area.

RAF warplanes carried out a "heavy and successful" attack on Cologne, in the German Rhineland, the British said, and renewed forays against the nazi "invasion" ports of Le Havre, Boulogne and Antwerp.

Du Pont Plant at Tacoma Explodes

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 28 (AP)—A black powder storage building at the DuPont Powder plant exploded mysteriously today but company officials said no one was injured.

A building, 30 by 40 feet, was blown to bits.

Company officials said it was isolated from the rest of the powder company by earthworks and that it was used entirely for storage purposes and that no one was inside it.

A company official, who declined use of his name, said "we have no reason to believe the explosion was caused by sabotage."

At the time of the Pine Ridge disaster, it was stated, the national spent \$2400 on this work in addition to what was contributed locally.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Attorney General Jackson announced today that the federal bureau of investigation had made a 2500-page report on its inquiry into the activities of Harry Bridges, west coast CIO leader.

The report was confidential and purely factual and made no recommendations, Jackson said. It will be studied by justice department officials to determine whether institution of deportation proceedings is warranted, he added.

SKIING POOR AT CRATER LAKE PARK

General rain over most of the mountain passes of southern Oregon and northern California, with melting snows in the higher sections, was the report compiled Thursday by the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

Rain was reported at Crater lake national park, with skiing conditions very poor. There was 32 inches of snow at park headquarters and 42 maximum at the rim. Chains are not required but should be taken in the car. Roads are slightly slick, but well sanded.

No snow or ice covered The Dalles-California highway to Bend, although 10 inches of snow was reported at Sun Mountain summit.

Rain has cleared snow from the roads at Willamette pass, and on The Dalles-California highway south to Dunsmuir. The same conditions existed on the Greenspring summit and the highway to Lakeview.

Raid Reported In West Indies

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—The New York World-Telegram says a German landing party from a raider operating in the Caribbean was repulsed by British forces at Curacao, Dutch West Indies, when the nazis attempted to destroy valuable oil refineries there.

The paper, quoting an unidentified witness, says the Germans invaded Curacao the night of July 28 and that British land forces and shots from two armed tankers in the harbor killed or wounded 35 Germans.

This informant says strict censorship kept the invasion a secret because England has insisted she is supreme in the West Indies and also because of suspicion that residents of the Dutch colony had aided the raiders.

Finn President Resigns Post

HELSINKI, Finland, Nov. 28 (AP)—Kyosti Kallio, Finland's 67-year-old president, has resigned because of continued poor health, the government information bureau announced today.

Kallio suffered a heart attack August 29 and since then Premier Risto Ryti has been acting president.

(In September the German official news agency, DNB, published an erroneous report that Kallio was dead, but this was quickly denied in Helsinki, where his condition was reported improving.)

Bill Introduced To End Strikes In Defense Work

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Representative Smith (D-Va.) introduced a bill today intended to prevent strikes and stoppages of work at plants having defense contracts.

Smith said the legislation would provide heavy penalties for sabotage, would make it unlawful for employees to strike without thirty days notice, would forbid employers to conduct a lock out and would make it unlawful to coerce a prospective worker in such plants with regard to membership in a labor organization.

Smith said that in case of a lock out or strike the secretary of labor would be required to offer mediation. If that was unsuccessful, arbitration would be proposed and if either party should reject it, the facts would be given to the president who would make public such reports.

DIES RELEASES NEW 'RED BOOK'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (UP)

The Dies committee last night issued a 1000-page "Red Book" purporting to refute the United States communist party's claims that it had taken steps to disassociate itself from the communist Internationale.

The committee said the "red book" is intended to serve as a guide in anti-communist work. The document was to have been released during the weekend but the date was changed because of premature publication.

The committee issued the book without comment upon the contents which consisted entirely of excerpts from the writings and speeches of Lenin, Stalin and other communist leaders, and party pamphlets and manifestos.

It was the second of a series of documents aimed at alleged subversive movements. A white paper on purported nazi propaganda activities was issued last week. A third paper, detailing the activities of fascist sympathizers, has been prepared in New York and will be released soon.

Dubinsky Revives Labor Peace Move

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 28 (AP)—The issue of peace between the AFL and the CIO was revived in the closing sessions today of the American Federation of Labor convention, by an impassioned plea for unity in labor

rankings made by David Dubinsky, a former member of the CIO.

Speaking from the floor prior to the afternoon election of officers, Dubinsky, president of the International Ladies Garment Workers union, declared on this subject which has been practically consigned to the files, "I do not believe that even today peace should not be accepted."
