High Goal

There was talk of a goal of \$10,000,000,000 in revenues for the next fiscal year—about \$3,000,000,000 more than the most liberal estimate of the amount likely to be raised during the current year. Against this, expenditures are expected to exceed \$13,000,000,000 this year and may be even higher in 1941.

Circuit Court Jobs

Houston takes over as mayor on the sixth of January, first Monday in the new year. Of all new public officials taking office here at that time,

Houston has the most appointive positions at his command. Circuit Judge-elect D. R. Vandenberg will appoint a court reporter, bailiff and county juvenile officer. Holding these positions at present are Garnet Hall, reporter; Robert Graham, bailiff, and Mrs. Ethel Wilson, juvenile officer.

There is a current report that Al Brandt, former circuit court reporter, will be restored in that job by Judge-elect Vandenberg. Brandt was court reporter for Circuit Judge W. M. Duncan until the election of Judge Edward B. Ashurst, who replaced Brandt and banished him from the courtroom area inside the bar. Brandt has served as reporter for Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay of Lake county.

GOP Majority

John Reber's induction as a member of the county court will give the republicans a majority on the court for the first time since 1932. What effect, if any, this will have on appointments within the power of the court, is not certain at this time.

Frank Z. Howard, county surveyor by election and engineer by appointment, is expected to continue in the engineer's job.

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UNION LEADERS CRITICIZE PAY INCREASE HERE

Wage scale raises of 24 cents per hour announced this week by several large Klamath lumber concerns, to go into effect December 1, were criticized Saturday as an "appeasement" by local officials of the AFL and the CIO.

Assertions that the raise is "inadequate" were made by representatives of both labor unions on the grounds that the increase fails to correspond to increased profits for lumber operators brought about by the national defense program. This contrasts with a statement at the time of the raise announcement that the price of lumber now is lower than it was in June, 1937, when the last raise was made.

Officials of the two unions asserted the raise fails to offset a rapidly rising standard of living. "The raise is just a bribe," Joe Boyd, organizer for the AFL, declared. "We feel on a basis of the facts that the time has come for a much higher general raise. Operators are using unorganized territories like the Klamath basin to lower the standards of the industry, and the unorganized worker is forced to accept. We feel that this increase has been offered to offset, indirectly, our organizational program. As a result of the inadequacy of the increase, there is widespread dissatisfaction among all lumber and timber workers of the basin."

The Klamath basin organizing staff of the International Woodworkers of America, CIO affiliate, issued a statement offering similar criticism. The staff consists of John Wheeler, Arthur A. Oyler, Harold Arrowsmith and Howard Dyer, president of the IWA Klamath basin district council.

"Why have Klamath workmen received this 24-cent 'appeasement' raise?" their statement asked. "Can it be that the employer expected the worker to be able to pay the additional cost of living, which is up 15 to 25 per cent from last year? He must be giving this appeasement to try to deaden the workers' demands for a justifiable raise."

"Employers use a national emergency to make profit," the statement charged. "They use a national emergency as an excuse to defeat labor."

The AFL is asking a raise of 74 cents per hour, with one week's vacation per year with pay, as a standard for the industry, Boyd said.

A jury was completed just before noon Saturday and testimony was taken in the afternoon session.

The communists' explanation, he said, was that as soon as they saw policemen they ceased fire.
