

STOCK MARKET IN DIFFICULTY AS RISE TRIED

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (AP)—Rallying difficulties continued in today's stock market although selected issues managed to climb back on the rising van.

Steels led an early forward swing when plus marks of fractions to a point or so were fairly well distributed. Buying then tapered off but, at the close, prices for favorites were at or near the best.

Volume was relatively small throughout the brief proceedings. Transfers were around 350,000 shares. A sizeable portion of the turnover was accounted for by Commonwealth & Southern which came out in blocks of 6000 to 20,000 shares, unchanged at 1/2.

Among stocks drawing support were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, Sears Roebuck, Woolworth, American Telephone, Du Pont, Westinghouse, Anaconda, International Paper, common and preferred, and Great Northern.

Oils, aircrafts and utilities, for the most part, were unable to make much progress. Laggards included Standard Oil of N. J., Boeing, Phelps Dodge and North American.

Bonds and commodities shifted over a narrow terrain.

WHEAT PRICE UP CENT PER BUSHEL

CHICAGO, Nov. 30 (AP)—The wheat market scored gains ranging up to almost a cent today, being strengthened by an upturn in securities and scattered buying attributed to mills.

Traders expressed belief little wheat would be delivered on December contracts early in the month and this also helped to strengthen the market. Offsetting factors were favorable winter wheat crop reports and weakness of corn, which sagged about a cent at times reflecting 1/2 to 1 cent declines in the spot market.

Wheat closed 1/2c higher than yesterday, December 89 1/2c, May 87 1/2c, corn 1c lower to 1c higher, December 62 1/2c, May 61 1/2c, oats 1c off to 1c up.

The fathers were twin brothers, the mothers, the former Ethel and Edith Hair, twin sis-

ters. The courtships were simultaneous, the wedding, two years ago, a double ceremony.

Housekeeping began in the same apartment house. It was disclosed last spring that babies would arrive about the same

time. And of course everybody expected twins.

But Patricia May, daughter of Theo and Edith, arrived un-escorted, Sept. 13 and a month later Myra, daughter of Cleo and Ethel, put in her appearance solo.
