

HUSKERS, BOSTON COLLEGE EYED FOR ROSE BOWL

Talk about your Cinderella team.

Saturday's Coast conference and eastern collegiate football games may settle the nation's bowl bids and wind up regular 1940 play, but even the most surprising upset in the country could scarcely detract from the story-book proportions of Friday night's 16-13 victory for the Pacific Luthers over Gonzaga.

The Luthers stepped out of their class Friday night to take on the Gonzagas, mightiest of the northwest independents.

Earlier in the year, Gonzaga defeated Detroit and before that Detroit had trounced formidable Texas Christian.

The Lutes stepped out of their class with a perfect record—seven straight victories—to preserve, and preserved it with a last-minute win that came on a herculean field goal from the toe of big Marvel Harshman, signal-calling fullback.

Without a practice field to work on, with no goal posts and not even a tackling dummy, the Luthers had built up their perfect season's mark.

Standing at a difficult angle on the 29-yard line, big Marv booted the winning field goal so hard and high that it took five minutes to retrieve the ball from the rocky slope that runs down to Puget sound from the open end of the Stadium high school bowl.

Campus Talk Swings Away From Others

No "Inside Dope" Yet Available; Question Thrown Into Uproar

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30 (AP)—Nebraska and Boston college—strange words in the Palo Alto language—were sneaking into campus conversation at Rose bowl-conscious Stanford today.

Reluctantly the conversation has drifted away from the true loves—Michigan, Minnesota and Cornell. The affection and sentimental ties are there but the content is lacking.

Before going further, however, one thing should be made clear: There is no inside dope on what team Stanford will ask to bowl, assuming Stanford herself bowl, assuming Stanford herself will be asked. There is no definite trend toward one team or another.

In fact, the only "confidential" information available is that all is confusion. Cornell's defeat by Pennsylvania, Texas Aggies' defeat by Texas and conference or self-imposed restrictions on Minnesota, Michigan and Pennsylvania have thrown the whole question into an uproar. The team doesn't know who it wants. The coaches won't talk.

So far, no Tennessee or Fordham booms have started except on the typewriters of a few sports writers.

The Nebraska talk is growing, but an invitation to the Cornhuskers as of today seems improbable despite their splendid season's record against strong midwestern teams. The principal drawback against undefeated Boston college, unofficial champion in the east, appears to be the lack of "big names" on its schedule and the fact that it is an utter stranger to western football fans.

University of Texas student newspaper telegraphed the Stanford university newspaper urging Stanford not to take too seriously the Aggies' defeat Thursday.

"Tradition-inspired Texas team defeated Aggies today," read the telegram. "Urge you don't overweigh defeat of Southwest's powerhouse in choosing Rose bowl opponent. Aggies are still number one in nation in our book."

A bid to the Aggies is still possible, although the agitation against inviting a southern or southwest team to the Rose bowl is developing steadily. According to good sources, Stanford and Pasadena both want an eastern team—Stanford because it wants to lick the best the east has to offer, and Pasadena because of the reaction in publicity, winter tourist trade and the Rose bowl itself would benefit.

Waite Eleven Defeats Grant By 20-12 Count

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 30 (AP)—A versatile Waite high school, Toledo, Ohio, football team defeated Grant high of Portland, 20 to 12, in an intersectional game here Friday night.

The Toledo city champions, sparked by Fullback Louis Sharkey, pushed across two touchdowns in the final period to overcome a 7 to 12 deficit.

Halfback Bob Morrison put Grant, co-champions of Portland, in the lead early in the second period with a 42-yard touchdown gallop but within a few minutes Sharkey passed 27 yards to End Herbert Snider for a Waite score. Waite converted and led, 7-6.

Grant scored in the third period and held the lead until early in the fourth when Waite, alternating straight-ahead power with passes, marched 63 yards to a touchdown, which Sharkey scored.

Sharkey paved the way for Waite's third touchdown by intercepting a pass deep in Grant territory. Four plays later he plunged to a score.

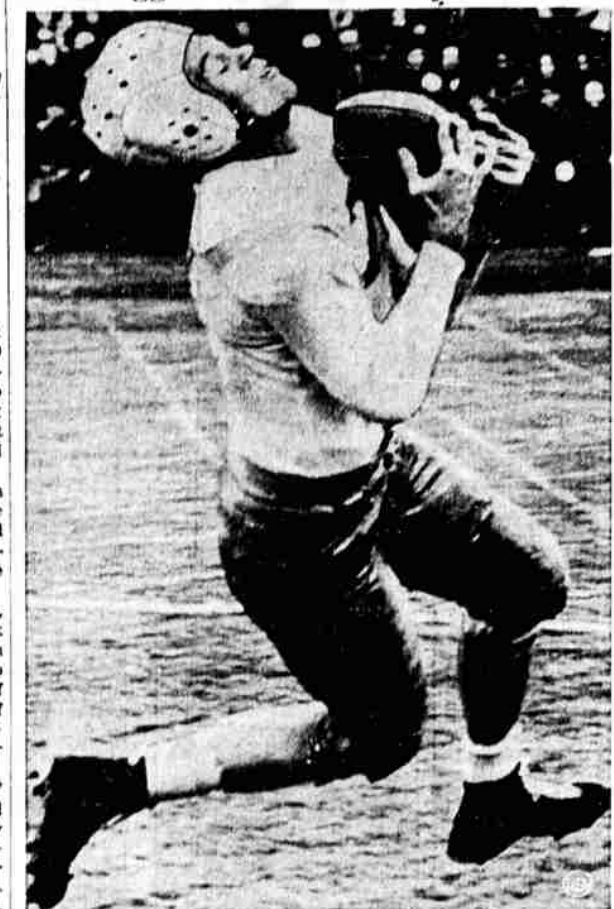
A crowd estimated at 10,000 persons watched the game.

Pacific Lutheran Upsets Zags, 16-13

Bulldogs Dumped By 27-Yard Field Goal in Final Seconds

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 30 (UP)—A field goal in the last 15 seconds of play Friday night gave the doughty Pacific Lutheran college "aerial circus" an upset 16-13 triumph over Gonzaga university in a post-season football contest.

Marv Tommervik, sensational passing star of the undefeated and untied Luthers, kicked the field goal from a difficult angle on the 27-yard line.

The climactic finish was a shock since the Bulldogs this year had beaten Detroit, which in turn thumped Texas Christian.

Gonzaga scored twice in the first half and held the Luthers in check despite a pass from Tommervik to end Earl Platt which travelled 55 yards in the air.

Pacific Lutheran scored late in the second period when Tommervik passed to Quarterback Blair Taylor who lateraled to Fullback Marv Harshman. The play gained 54 yards and a touchdown. Harshman converted.

Another desperate thrust in the third period produced the second PLC score. Tommervik completed five passes in succession, starting from the PLC 24. The last pass was taken by End Sig Sigurdson in the end zone.

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Conn Whips Lee Savold

Pittsburgh Slugger Out-Points Iowan in Dull Bout

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (UP)—Billy Conn, campaigning for a heavyweight title shot, used Lee Savold of Des Moines as a punching bag Friday night for 12 rounds and won the unanimous decision with ease before 13,000 fans at Madison Square garden.

Conn, who already holds the light-heavyweight crown, got blood-smeared considerably in the later going, although at no time was he in serious trouble. The fight was so dull that the fans were booing for action during many of the rounds.

Savold, advertised as a knock-out artist, failed to use his "deadly" right throughout the bout, and the only damage he inflicted on fast-stepping Billy was with a left hook that opened a gash beneath the light-heavy king's right eye in the eighth round and had Billy's nose bleeding profusely in the last three sessions.

Conn's 175-pound crown was not at stake because Savold scaled 186½ pounds, 12½ more than Conn, who registered 174½.

The United Press score sheet gave Billy 10 rounds and only the 10th and 12th to blond Savold.

The Des Moines battler made his best showing in the 10th when he landed several hard left hooks to Billy's head, and caused his nose to bleed freely. The 12th round was given to Savold by Referee Arthur Donovan because of Conn's low left hook to the groin which was called a foul by Donovan.

Savold's performance was extremely disappointing to the fans who had seen him fight in New York but once before. That was last January when he knocked out Big Jim Robinson in impressive fashion. At that time Savold looked like a fast, dangerous puncher with either hand. But tonight, he appeared to be glued to the floor. He seemed unable to evade the left hooks that Conn rained to the head, and he used his right only for futile protective purposes. The only thing that prevented Savold from being kayoed was Conn's complete lack of a punch.

SAN JOSE, Calif., Nov. 30 (UP)—San Jose State college won its 11th consecutive football victory Friday night, defeating University of Nevada 30 to 7 in a game that ended with fog so thick that spectators could scarcely see the playing field.

The San Jose combined power, deception and an effective passing attack to squelch an aggressive Nevada outfit that threatened to score twice.

Capt. Ken Cook, playing his last game for San Jose, scored three placekick conversions and a field goal tonight to bring his season's total of points from kicks to 31.

Signal Oilers Spoil Oregon Opening 45-41

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 30 (AP)—Signal Oil of Portland spoiled the University of Oregon's 1940-1941 basketball opening Friday night by turning back the Webfoots, 45 to 41.

Lanky Chuck Patterson, a former Webfoot, led the assault on his alma mater by scoring 21 points. Vic Townsend was high man for the collegians with 11 points.

The Oilers, a team of former college stars, most of them of Oregon State, led 23-21 at halftime.
