centered on having congress do what it has done three before—order continuation of the investigation of un-American activities for another year. Dies already has announced he would seek such action.

Any "sabotage of this investigation," he said last night, would constitute a victory for the fifth column.

Voice of People

"You the people of America," he went on, "have the means at hand to confound your enemies and defeat their deceitful strategy. You have only, to let your voices be heard in the halls of congress and you may rest assured that those who derive their authority from you will not fail to do your will."

Dies based his speech on the thesis that counter-espionage alone would not eliminate subversive elements. He said that European countries had learned that saboteurs usually pursue legal activities "until the arrival of the zero hour."

"Lesson of Europe"

"It is not enough to sit around and wait for the commission of an overt and illegal act of sabotage," he said. "We must expose the fifth column in all the stages of its activity which are preparatory to the commission of wholesale acts of treason."

"The lesson of Europe is that we must destroy the legal apparatus of the fifth column and not simply wait to prosecute the enemies of our country after they have become lawbreakers."

"Our committee is the only agency of the government which has the powers necessary to deal with the legal apparatus of the saboteurs."

AFL AGAINST MILL STRIKE FOR KLAMATH

Strike action over wages by mill and timber workers of the Klamath basin, similar to the action taken Monday by workmen of several lumbering sections of Washington, would be "extremely unfortunate," in the opinion of a local international representative of the American Federation of Labor.

When asked if there is any probability of the labor trouble in the north giving rise to unrest and possible strikes on the part of local workers, Joe Boyd, AFL organizer, said that he hoped there would be no "spontaneous reaction" here.

"Men down here are not disciplined to strike action," he declared. "Strikes take place only when collective bargaining breaks down. A spontaneous strike in the basin, without the proper leadership, would be extremely unfortunate."

Workers of the Klamath country are "more of one mind" than for years, Boyd asserted. Every night the AFL is holding meetings in various basin lumber concerns.

"The men are coming to us, seeking organization," he said. "The local union of the International Woodworkers of America, CIO affiliate, is also conducting meetings nightly, at various lumber operations."

"The northern areas where the strikes have been called are old, established lumber centers, properly organized and schooled in committee relationships," Boyd said. "Those relationships must be set up before strike action can be properly conducted."

Boyd asserted that all decisions here on wages and hours are solely in the hands of the operators.

"Employers here refuse to recognize any collective bargaining except through the NLRB, which is purely a delaying program," he said.

ground forces in the search for Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Walbert missing Medford fliers. Reports from the rugged South Umpqua area where the search is being centered following reports of smoke signals in the mountains north of Tiller, indicated poor conditions for the aerial search, with canyons still filled with low hanging fog.

Through the co-operation of officials of the Umpqua national forest and Douglas Forest Protective association, the searching planes were hastily equipped this morning with portable two-way radio sets.

takeoff in North America to landing in Britain.

The planes take off from an airport in "British North America," Hutchinson said, each carrying a pilot, co-pilot and a radio operator. He said about 60 pilots and 30 radio operators, including Americans, Canadians and Britons, were participating.

Successful Trip

On the first flight the seven bombers started away in formation, led by a British officer, but after 51 hours bad weather and severe icing conditions forced them to separate. Although scattered the rest of the way, the pilot said, all of the planes landed within an hour at a pre-designated British airport.

Since then, he added, mass deliveries have been made on a regular schedule.

Hutchinson, interviewed during a brief visit here with his family, said the crews were paid monthly salaries and made about one flight a month. They return by boat, with a round-trip thus requiring about two weeks.

Special equipment for the hazardous flights includes oxygen tanks, extra fuel tanks and flotation gear in the event of a forced landing. Hutchinson said the pilots fly according to strict instructions—which included the action to be taken in case of attacks by German aircraft.
