

PEERESS GIVES FIGHTING TALK TO U. S. FLIERS

LONDON, Dec. 5 (AP)—In a fighting speech to the Eagle squadron of American volunteers in the royal air force, American-born Lady Astor declared today that the "British Empire, backed by the United States cannot fail."

She predicted that the same 30 American volunteers now training for active service alongside British fliers would be followed by "thousands of others."

"America should know that this is really the greatest hour of trial in the history of the English speaking people," said Lady Astor, a native of Virginia, her eyes flashing. "They may not know it, but it's their turn next."

Turning to the young Americans, organized into a volunteer air force by Colonel Charles Sweeney, Lady Astor exclaimed: "I knew they would come. Thousands of young Americans are longing to get into this war. It is right that they should."

"As Sherman said, 'war is hell,' she said, 'but it is more terrible than the civilization we think is based on Christianity should fail.'"

Lady Astor said the British would never submit under aerial bombardment.

"The most extraordinary thing is the stupidity of the German mentality," she said. "You can kill us, but you can never scare us."

She declared that the British people "enormously appreciate" the help coming from America through the Red Cross, the ambulance units and other relief organizations.

"I don't suppose there ever has been a country in the world more generous than America has been to Great Britain."

She expressed the belief that world peace could be maintained after this war by the collaboration of Britain and the United States.

Just as the American Civil war brought about federation of the new world, she said, it is quite likely that this "great war will bring about federation of these two great empires."

Captain H. H. Balfour, parliamentary undersecretary for air, also spoke to the volunteers at a luncheon, saying, "We hope your squadron will be followed by the formation of other squadrons impelled by the same motives and imbued with the same ideals."

Turning to the battle of Britain, Balfour said: "We are facing a new phase of the war in the concentrated attacks night after night on munition and industrial centers. . . . We must face the fact that front line war for the factory is here. We must and do accept the challenge which is entailed."

"The enemy will damage, destroy and kill, but just as his indiscriminate bombing raids failed so will the effects from this present form of attack be countered."

Balfour added that "while in the air we work for measures to oppose the night raider, in the factory we will mend, patch, replace and rebuild."

HOLC PORTLAND OFFICE CLOSING

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 5 (UP)—Acting state manager of the Home Owners Loan corporation, Alfred W. Isom Wednesday announced Oregonians who make payments on HOLC mortgage loans must make them henceforth by check, money order or draft to the regional office in San Francisco.

Isom stated the HOLC office here will close down permanently after Dec. 18. Fifteen employees will be retained in Oregon to handle the business of some 8100 accounts but no new accounts will be handled from here.

Livestock Experts Assert Varied Meat Dish Available To Limited Food Budgets

CHICAGO, Dec. 5 (UP)—Even a housewife with a limited food budget should be ashamed of trying to economize by serving pork chops three times a week and inexpensive cubed steaks every other day, the experts said Tuesday.

Take the word of the national livestock and meat board for it, if you're an average housewife you don't know anything about the inexpensive cuts of meat that come from 47 per cent of the carcasses of the world's best livestock. If you did, you could serve a different meat dish every day for four months and still not exhaust the possibilities.

Mrs. Inez Wilson, home economist of the meat board, proved it Tuesday at the board's exhibit at the 41st annual livestock exposition. Have you ever served a triangle pot roast, flank steak fillets, boneless neck or short ribs? Well, these are some of the less expensive cuts of beef which come from that 47 per cent of the steer carcass you probably never heard about.

If it's pork you want to serve, Mrs. Wilson suggests economizing with shoulder steaks, Boston butt, cushion shoulder, pork hocks, butterfly ham slices or smoked cottage roll. And among the less demanded cuts of lamb she recommends rolled breast, arm and blade chops, neck slices or lamb riblets and chops.

In the meat board kitchens, Mrs. Wilson has compiled menus to prove that a family of five can be fed well and often on as little as \$11.69 per week. The budget for such economy would be divided to spend \$3.98 for meat; \$1.02 for cereals and bread; \$2.27 for dairy products; \$2.18 for vegetables; \$1.42 for fruits and 62 cents for the miscellany that gives meals the final touch—sugar, tea, salad dressing and condiments.

Among the meats which can be purchased for the \$3.98 all-

lotted in the budget are four pounds of pork shoulder, a 41 pound blade pot roast, 10 lamb kidneys, a stuffed lamb breast and 31 pounds of lamb shanks. The old standbys of the pinch-penny housewife—salt pork, ground pork and frankfurters are included in the list, too, but you need not have them more than once a week.

STATE LIQUOR MONOPOLY SHOWS REVENUE INCREASE

PORTLAND, Dec. 5 (UP)—A marked increase in revenue from the Oregon liquor monopoly was reported Wednesday by the state liquor commission.

The commission report for the year ending June 30, 1940 showed gross revenue of \$10,235,543 compared with \$9,545,944 for the previous 12 months. The funds go to relief. There are 26 state liquor stores and 150 liquor agencies.

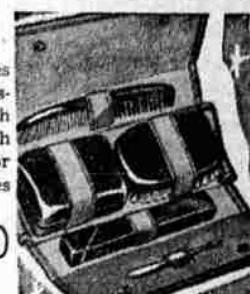
