They sat down and dangled their feet against the ground and as the truck entered the street the jolt from the curb apparently threw Jackie under the wheels as Jimmy jumped off.

The truck rolled over the little boy's body leaving marks from the left shoulder to the hip. The child's head was also injured. Unnoticed

Padgett continued on his way and turned left on Elm avenue and knew nothing of the accident until his return.

Virgil Deal, 1900 Lancaster street, truck driver, told officers he stepped out of the Peyton office about 11:45 and saw Jimmy standing over his brother weeping bitterly. Investigating Deal found the injured child and called police. Upon arrival of the officers the child was found dead. The body was removed to the Earl Whitlock Funeral home.

TRAINLOAD OF ARMY MEN PASSES THROUGH KLAMATH

Eleven carloads of soldiers arrived at the Klamath Falls depot at 2:20 Saturday afternoon en route south on a special United States army section of the south-bound Oregonian.

The train is en route to Camp Ord, Calif., carrying army men from South Dakota.

Advance word was sent to the Klamath Southern Pacific depot that one of the men, suffering from an attack of appendicitis, needed immediate medical attention here.

Arrangements were made with Dr. R. Wayne Esperson to meet the train and make an examination, with the possibility that the stricken man would be removed to a local hospital.

TWO JURY CASES CANCELED MONDAY

Two jury cases, which had been scheduled for Monday and Tuesday in circuit court, were called off Saturday and Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst announced the jurors would not be expected to come in as previously called.

One case was eliminated when P. G. Rowan, charged with obtaining money by false pretenses, entered a plea of guilty. Rowan had been slated for trial after previously denying his guilt. Circuit Judge Ashurst sentenced him to two years in prison and paroled him with the understanding he will pay costs and make good bad checks.

The other case, a civil case, was adjusted out of court.

STRIKE IN LUMBER SPREADS TO OREGON

predicted that other CIO mills would be struck here Monday or Tuesday.

SEATTLE, Dec. 7 (AP)—Two score lumber operations in western Washington were closed today by labor strife which affected national defense expansions and threatened to spread into Oregon.

Contractors at Camp Murray, big northwest army base, indicated a lumber shortage was already being felt and might delay completion of barracks there.

12,000 Men Out
Ten plants were closed in Seattle yesterday and the 19th closure at Tacoma brought complete paralysis to that lumber capital's sawmill operations. Six mills were closed at Everett, one each at two smaller communities, and five logging operations were listed as closed. Close to 12,000 workers are involved.

The AFL's Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union has brought the closures in its demand for a pay increase from a minimum of 62 cents hourly to 70 cents, with a week's vacation with pay.

Seattle Hit
The Seattle mills were closed without the employees striking. They refused to pass picket lines set up by union members from Everett and Tacoma, who contended the Seattle mills were getting business that would be going to the other plants if they were not struck. The big Seattle local of the AFL union recently signed a contract for a five cent an hour wage increase, and have been criticized sharply by the other members of the Puget sound council for not sticking adamantly to the 7 1/2 cent increase demand.

Union spokesmen, in announcing the turning of their guns on Seattle, said Oregon would be next in line. Operators offered a 5-cent increase at Portland.

Agreement
Members of the rival CIO union, the International Woodworkers of America, have empowered their negotiating committee to call a strike "if necessary." In Washington, where most 1940 CIO union contracts still are in force, union leaders have indicated an intention of sticking to a demand for \$1 a day increase in new contracts.

One break in the stalemate came last night at Portland where an agreement was announced between the B. F. Johnson Lumber company and an AFL committee for a 5-cent pay increase with a week's vacation with pay. It involves 95 employees. The union membership will vote on the agreement.

Leo Johnson, company president, described the vacation as "experimental in the sawmill industry," and equivalent to a 1 1/2 cent pay increase in his company.

The state lumber industry's important role in national defense has been for badly needed buildings for troops at Fort Lewis, Camp Murray and in Alaska.

WARD STRIKE
PORTLAND, Dec. 7 (AP)—AFL unions at the Portland Montgomery Ward & Co., store went on strike today. The office workers, warehousemen, and retail clerks unions called the strike following a breakdown of negotiations for a new working agreement. The teamsters union refused to pass picket lines.

FLIGHT TRAINING SET FOR MONDAY

Recovered from an attack of the "flu," Flight Instructor Chet Stinson announced Saturday at the Klamath airport that members of the local CAA class will start their flight training Monday.

Each of the 10 who passed the CAA ground school examination with highest grades will be given a half hour of flight per day, with students flying at regular hours.

Start of the class was delayed one week, while Instructor Stinson recovered from the sickness which has swept the county in a mild epidemic.

He said that speed with which the course is completed will depend upon the weather. If weather permits students will fly steadily six days per week and possibly on Sundays.

After about eight hours' dual, students are expected to take solo flights then will continue with solo and dual instruction until requirements are passed for private licenses.

were sick, the civilian and military health authorities there were not alarmed and said there was no epidemic.

At Camp Murray, where national guardsmen from six northern states are in training, Col. Harry H. Towler, 41st division medical officer, said only 113 men were in the tent hospitals, with 1000 confined to their quarters.

"The men who are confined to their quarters aren't really ill," Colonel Towler stated. "They have coughs or sore throats and they don't feel well, but if they were at home they would probably be going about their daily work."

Washington schools closed are at Mount Vernon, Ellensburg, Thorp and Kennewick. Seattle schools remained open.

Oregon health authorities had no report of additional cases, although influenza previously had been reported at the University of Oregon and a few scattered schools were closed. A fourth of the pupils in Salem schools were absent. Sixteen per cent of the Portland high school students were home with what Superintendent Ralph Dugdale called colds.
