

"Christmas Carol" On Library Program

Mr. Walter David to Read Charles Dickens' Beautiful Story at Monday Afternoon Meet

The Klamath Falls Woman's Library club is taking part in holiday affairs in this city and for the December program, to be heard next Monday afternoon at two o'clock in the library auditorium, arranged for the presentation of Mr. Walter David of Los Angeles, nationally famous impersonator, in his presentation of Charles Dickens' beloved, "Christmas Carol."

The entire program will carry the Yuletide atmosphere, and Mrs. Don J. Zumwalt, music chairman, will present Mr. Charles Stanfield, director of music in Klamath Union high school, and his capella choir. The groups will sing old Christmas carols including "God Rest You Merry Gentlemen," "Good King Wenceslaus," and a special arrangement of Franz Gruber's lovely carol, "Silent Night."

Hostesses for the afternoon will be Mrs. Warren Hunt and Mrs. Alfred Collier. Decorations are under the direction of Mrs. Frederick W. Hamilton assisted by Mrs. J. F. King.

Twenty speaking parts are heard in unfolding the tale of "Old Scrooge" and all the other quaint characters Dickens created. Mr. David uses no scenery, make-up or costumes, and yet every character stands out clearly before the eyes of his audience. One sees them all as if they had stepped from the pages of Dickens' into real life.

Walter David has this to say about being introduced to an audience, and he might be considered an authority, for few men have been introduced to more audiences than he. "There is nothing I dread more than the introductory remarks of the program chairman. They mean well, of course, but are sometimes rather embarrassing. I think the best introduction I ever had was in a little town in my native state of Maine. The chairman, a typical Yankee, got up and said: 'Friends and neighbors: We have with us tonight Mr. Walter David of New York. I dunno whether he's any good or not but you'll know pretty soon. Go ahead, Mr. David.'"

For those not familiar with the purpose and ideals of the organization, Bundles for Britain, Mrs. Dinsmore has outlined a few interesting points. Here they are: Bundles for Britain is an organization formed to help meet the immediate needs of Great Britain's soldiers, sailors and airmen, by interested and sympathetic American men and women. It is inspired by the belief that everything that America has stood for is being fought and defended by Great Britain.

It is our desire to give help where help is most needed. So far the work has been confined to the urgent appeal for knitted garments for the actual fighting forces. However, now as the war is reaching the very heart of England, it becomes apparent that we must also be prepared to help the civilian population. Needed now are surgical instruments, hospital and medical supplies, clothing for women and children, and mobile feeding units.

Donations of any size are accepted gladly. One cent buys a quinine tablet, one dollar buys fifty yards of gauze, \$5 buys the wool needed to knit socks, mittens, wristlets, a sweater, scarf and helmet for one man; \$50 buys a blood transfusion apparatus, \$150 buys a portable surgical kit; \$500 buys a portable X-ray machine; \$5000 buys an X-ray machine for a base hospital, and \$50,000 equips a base hospital.

Those wishing to knit may come to the headquarters at Fourth street and Klamath avenue and volunteer their services. Wool may be obtained at cost and instructions for making sweaters, socks, Balclava helmets and other articles, may be obtained at
