

HITLER SAYS NAZIS CANNOT BE DEFEATED

But now we are conducting war as they wanted it."

He taunted the British with the fact that he had just long enough ahead to climb aboard before the British. Wherever the German soldier stands, nobody else can get."

Hitler got a round of applause from his audience when he said "the time for the final struggle is determined by us. I am always careful. . . . We can afford to wait. The German people will appreciate it more if I wait and thereby save lives."

No power on earth can remove the German armed forces from Norway, The Netherlands, Belgium or France against their will, he thundered to his cheering audience.

"The struggle is one between two worlds."

"I want first to discuss western Europe."

"Here we find 85,000,000 Germans, 46,000,000 English, 45,000,000 Italians and 37,000,000 French."

"Forty-six million Englishmen control 40,000,000 square kilometers, the French only 10,000,000, the Italians one-half million, while 85,000,000 Germans have as foundation for living only 600,000 square kilometers."

Hitler then traced German history from the thirty years war onward, stressing what he called dynastic selfishness and other factors which made necessary the bending of all energies toward internal affairs in Germany.

Meanwhile, he said, "Britain put together a tremendous empire by force."

TAXABLE U. S. BONDS ASKED BY TREASURY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (UP)—Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., last night revealed he will ask the new congress to authorize issuance of wholly taxable government bonds in an effort to tap "slack" money under the multi-billion dollar defense program.

He reiterated he also will ask the lawmakers to raise the national debt limit enough to care for money already appropriated.

Has Authority

Calling for a "draft of money as well as men," Morgenthau said the \$500,000,000 in national defense notes which the treasury will issue Wednesday would be subject to state and federal taxes. Treasury officials said this would be the first such issue in the nation's history.

Morgenthau explained he has authority to issue wholly taxable notes, but this power does not include government bonds. He conceded the government would have to pay "a little more interest" on its borrowings, if the issues are not tax exempt, but insisted it was worth while.

Bill Pending

He communicated his plans to the house ways and means committee and to the senate finance committee and said tonight he anticipated a "favorable reception" by congress.

A bill is pending in congress which would authorize reciprocal taxation of tax exempt securities issued by state and federal governments. Attempts to push such a program in the past has met with militant opposition from a small group of legislators who charge it is an unconstitutional violation of States rights.

These opponents insist a constitutional amendment would be necessitated to solve the problem.

Morgenthau estimated there are 2,500,000 persons holding United States savings bonds, and said "we would like to double or triple that number." Recalling savings stamps were sold to finance America's participation in the World war, he said:

"I would not turn down 25 cents if I thought I could get it under those circumstances."

Broken Romance Blamed for Double Shooting

BUTTE, Mont., Dec. 10 (UP)—Ed. Jelich, 26, and Barbara Welter, 23, whose romance, police said, was blighted by family and religious difficulties, were near death of wounds at a hospital here today.

Jelich, a Butte miner, followed Miss Welter for 12 blocks in his automobile this morning. Detective Bart Riley said, before he drew a gun and shot her through the head.

Jelich then fired three bullets into his head.

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California CIO Plans Drive on Aircraft Plants

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10—(UP)—The CIO California State Industrial Union council today plans to raise additional funds to organize workers in aircraft plants in a drive to obtain "decent wages and conditions in one of the most vital sections of war industry."

Plans for the organizational drive in the aircraft industry centering in southern California were outlined at a meeting of the council's executive board attended by Harry Bridges, California CIO director; Philip Connelly, state CIO president; Wyndham Mortimer, director of Aircraft organization; Lou Michener, United Auto Workers representative and Louis Goldblatt, secretary of the state CIO. "Aircraft manufacturers," said Goldblatt, "are taking advantage of the unorganized state of the industry to pay less than living wages in one of the most vital sections of war industry."

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DANISH NAZIS HELD IN RIOTS

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 10 (UP)

Several leaders of the Danish nazis, stripped of their uniforms and weapons, were under arrest today in an outbreak of the worst rioting and anti-nazi demonstrations since the German occupation of Denmark.

From midnight until 4 a. m. Monday several thousand Danes gathered outside the Haderslev jail, jeering about 350 of the nazis being questioned by police after rioting in which 10 policemen were among the injured.

350 Nazis Released

The demonstrating, uniformed nazis belonging to Fritz Clausen's Danish national socialist party were subdued by police, after tear gas bombs and fire hoses had been used against them, and were charged with attacking the police, disturbing the peace and violating a law prohibiting the wearing of uniforms.

Most of the 350 nazis were released, after being stripped of their paraphernalia including steel helmets and their uniforms, and only the leaders and most aggressive ones remained in jail today.

WOMAN INJURED IN CRASH AT MT. LAKE

Mrs. Howard was brought to Klamath Falls by two passing motorists, Leo Ritchy and Richard Fleming.

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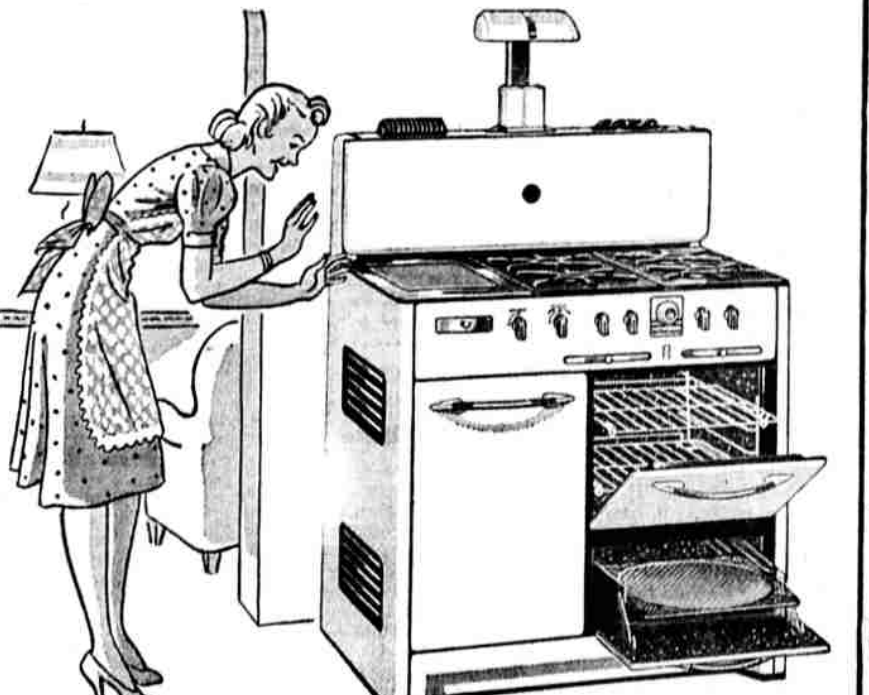
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
