

RIGHT-OF-WAY
LAND DEEDED

Klamath county court Wednesday deeded 2.33 acres of land on Rabbit flat, north of town, to the state of Oregon for use as right-of-way for a state highway.

The land will be used in the re-alignment of The Dalles-California highway across the flat. Bids have been called for December 18 for a contract on the first unit of this re-location job.

SET-BACK ON
MAIN STREET
JOB SOUGHT

Directors of the chamber of commerce Wednesday voted a resolution asking the Union Oil company to set back proposed construction at Eleventh and Main streets to conform to other property set-back on Main street in that sector.

It was reported the company plans to construct a new building for its service station at the Eleventh street corner. The chamber resolution will be sent to local officials of the company, as well as Portland headquarters, and to the city council which has been asked for a construction permit.

Questions of set-backs of buildings on business property have come increasingly to the attention of the city planning commission and council in recent months, it was pointed out at the meeting. More than a year ago the Standard Oil company was induced to set back its new service station at Twelfth and Main streets.

The Elk hotel and Moeller's flower shop building were set back in this block.

George Myers, chairman of the civic affairs committee of the chamber, read an outline of the committee's program for the year. Heading the list is a survey of the needs for additions to the federal building here. The program was approved by the directors.

Secretary Earl Reynolds read a letter from a California highway official setting June 17, 1941, as the probable date for completion of the new approach to the Weed-Klamath Falls highway at Weed.

It was reported that an important joint meeting of the Union high school and grade school boards will be held Monday evening. Representatives of the chamber civic affairs and legislative committees will be present.

cents more an hour and a week's vacation.

Although the agreement covered only 18 of the approximately 40 lumber operations closed down in the widespread controversy virtually all the others were expected by observers to fall in line with the Tacoma and Everett decisions. Most of them were closed in support of the Tacoma and Everett strikers or by pickets from the closed plants in the two cities. About 12,000 workmen are involved in the closed plants.

The conciliator's announcement came only a day after Acting Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal had appealed for "an uninterrupted flow of lumber for national defense needs." Lumber operators have had huge orders for building of military camps in the northwest and in Alaska and for shipyard building.

The announcement came at the end of a day which saw the controversy close a fourth mill in Oregon after a jump across the state line and close two more in the Tacoma district to bring the total in that area to 22.

INNOCENT PLEA

MEDFORD, Dec. 11 (AP)—Ira Chambers, 52, of Sprague River, Ore., charged with the sale of liquor to an Indian in Klamath Falls on November 10, entered a plea of innocence in federal court Tuesday. The Huff woman also claimed Hicks struck her several times, whereupon she procured a secreted pistol, and ordered him from the house.

Further testimony showed that Hicks went to a nearby house, and procured a butcher knife. He returned and knocked at the back door of the Huff house. When Miller opened the door he was stabbed. Hicks then went to the house of a woman named Beatrice, where he went to sleep. The next day he went to Modoc Point lookout, where he hid in the brush until arrested by the Klamath county sheriff, Lloyd Low.

NOVEMBER BREAKS
OREGON JOB MARK

SALEM, Dec. 11—Oregon's 22 public employment offices broke all records for November placements, registering a gain of 136.6 per cent over the same month last year, according to State Director L. C. Stoll. New jobs for the month just past totaled 14,741 against 6230 reported in November, 1939.

Supplementary farm work, mainly in the late potato and sugar beet fields, accounted for 8797 placements. Ontario's irrigated beet and lettuce area led with 5955 jobs, while Klamath's potato diggers accounted for 1898 placements.

AUTO LARCENY
CASE DROPPED

The case against Clayburn Pogue, negro, charged with larceny of an automobile, was dismissed in circuit court Wednesday on motion of the state. It was explained the prosecuting witness could not be located.

sacrifice many of their independent rights and they must feel genuinely moved to work together to create a better life for their citizens.

Go Beyond

"It is not enough to abolish tariff walls and competitive armaments. These things are merely negations of evil. We need to go beyond them and find positive means to good."

Morrison envisioned a post-war world in which "class privilege will be indefensible and intolerable" and monopolies will be revised and adapted to the public good.

"I see no reasonable hope of freedom from horrors of war until we can achieve the conscious and deliberate mobilization of our economic resources under a cooperative international plan," Morrison said.

"If this spirit of sacrifice is not carried forward from war into peace I am thoroughly convinced that the whole of our civilized social order will be endangered and that the whole world will stagger blindly into new wars or civil commotion at home and abroad."

"There must be no private monopoly if monopolies there be. They must serve the state. We must look forward to a society that is rid of the twin pests of extreme riches and extreme poverty."

Judge Predicts
Logrolling Probe

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 11 (UP)—In a circular released Tuesday Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan predicted the Marion county Grand Jury would investigate logrolling and vote trading by candidates in the recent race for posts in the state legislature. Judge McMahan pointed out that "logrolling" constitutes an indictable crime and recommended a Marion county Grand Jury investigation.

In particular he referred to vote trading.

McMahan denounced the practice of representatives who have promised votes either to William H. McCallister, Medford, or Robert S. Farrell, Jr., Portland,

who have conducted a race for the speakership of the State House of Representatives. McMahan said this practice was unconstitutional.
