Jewelers Drop Lost River, 28-15

Midland Beaten, 43-21;
Saints Attack Wallops
DeMolay Quinter, 30-11

Church league casaba teams of the Klamath basketball conference opened their 1940-1941 hoop season last night at the Klamath armory court as the Lutherans and the Latter Day Saints posted lopsided wins over Midland and DeMolay, their respective opponents, by scores of 43-21 and 30-11.

Two Commercial league quintets helped the four clubs of the six-team church setup initiate their winter pennant race by playing the middle encounter of the tripleheader program. Rickys Jewelers dumped the Lost River Dairy five into the defeat column for the first time in league play and climbed into top spot along with First National bank by stopping the Dairymen, 28-15.

The Lutherans, generally considered to be a much better ball club than their Thursday night rivals, had trouble with the Midland crew during the first half. However, Swan Swanson, big center, and Jalmar Johnson, lanky forward, finally found the hoop midway through the period and were largely instrumental in achieving a 14-11 lead for the Lutherans at the intermission.

Latter Day Saints walloped the DeMolay quintet with ease in last night's final game, 30-11. The LDS five was leading 16-0 and 15 minutes had elapsed on the tither's watch before the DeMolays finally hit the iron ring for a score. Score at the rest period favored the Saints, 18-4.

In marking up its second consecutive win of the year, Rickys hoopers encountered some stiff competition from the Lost River Dairy youngsters in the early stages of the fracas. Diminutive Jimmy Aiello, smallest man in the Jeweler lineup, swished in five points in the first couple of minutes of the battle to put his team mates in the lead which they never relinquished.

Tonight's slate finds Bly and Tik Tok meeting in the opener, Baptists and Junior Pelicans clashing in the middle affair and Merrill opposing Knights of Columbus in the finale.

In Semi-Final Tussle

Otis Clingman Friday was signed by Promoter Mack Lillard as the opponent for the brocoli king from Oswego, Bob Kruse, in the semi-final wrestling match next Tuesday night at the armory.

The bout will be the second main event of a four-way card which brings the coast tournament into the quarter finals and winds up mat competition at the armory for 1940.

Quarter finals will get underway early in January for the climax of the coastwide competition.

Bagby Goes To Indians In Shuffle

Seven-Man Trade Boosts
Cleveland Pennant Hope
As Jim Replaces 'Sarge'

CLEVELAND, Dec. 13 (AP)—A seven-player shuffle in the American league set Cleveland Indians fans jabbering gleefully today about "Bagby" and "pennant"—which mean the same hereabouts.

The Cleveland-Boston-Washington trade, announced by the Indians' management, brings Jim Bagby Jr., to the mound where his father, the immortal "Old Sarge" Bagby, hurled Cleveland to world championship in 1920.

Unscrambled, the three-cornered deal goes thus:

The Boston Red Sox sent Outfielder Roger Cramer to the Washington Senators in trade for Outfielder Gerald Walker.

That set the stage for Boston to send Bagby, Walker and Catcher Gene Desautels to Cleveland in return for Catcher Frankie Pytlak, Infielder Odell Hale and Pitcher Joe Dobson.

The Indians' belief in Santa Claus was clinched by receipt of the hard-hitting Walker, for the opinion was almost unanimous that such an outfielder could have made them a present of the pennant this year.

Walker has averaged exactly 100 runs batted in for five consecutive years.

To boot—the name, and maybe the game, of a Bagby. What a glow of memory—and hope—that name conjures up in these parts.

Old Sarge turned in 31 victories in that 1920 season. Then he hit a three-run homer in the historic fifth game of the world series with Brooklyn, in which Bill Wamby made his unassisted triple play and Elmer Smith cracked the first four-run homer in series annals.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13 (AP)—This being Friday the 13th makes it an auspicious occasion to announce that the country's sports editors, having checked back over a year full of customary year's surprises, have chosen Dartmouth's "fifth-down" defeat of Cornell as the most surprising of all.

The football game the Ithacans won by 7-3 and then gave back to the Indians by a 3-0 score when they found they hadn't won it after all got the first-place votes of 14 out of 78 voters in the Associated Press poll and the second-place votes of a similar number to become upset No. 1 with 72 points.

However, the unexpected termination of Cornell's 18-game unbeaten streak was only a little more startling to the experts than Detroit's victory in the American league pennant race.

Duck Season Nears Close

1940 Shooting Officially Ends Saturday at 4 P. M.

Bright, freezing weather prevailed Friday on the eve of the last day of shooting in the migratory waterfowl season. The season officially closes at 4 p. m. Saturday.

Most shallow water has frozen solid in the past few days as temperatures dropped a few scant degrees above the zero mark, causing most waterfowl to take to Klamath river and other flowing water.

The final morning of the 1940 hunt promised to dawn bright and cold Saturday, offering a challenge to early risers with record low temperature for the year.

Old-timers, surveying the season, agreed that shooting this year has been more meagre than for several seasons, although local ducks have been in good shape.

It is believed that the usual large number of northern birds failed to arrive this year. Klamath birds, however, were well nourished and provided good shooting before a large part of them left with the arrival of cold weather.

Attention of the Oregon state game commission is being focused on distribution of 1941 hunting and fishing licenses, with the sale opening December 15 at the commission's Portland office and the 600 agencies scattered throughout the state.

The sale will open early to allow purchase of tickets for Christmas gifts. Preparations are being made to furnish more than 200,000 sportsmen with the new licenses.

Phelan Rehired Sans Contract

SEATTLE, Dec. 13 (AP)—Athletic Director Ray Eckmann indicated today that Jimmy Phelan, Washington football coach, would be reemployed for 1941 without a contract.

Eckmann said "There has been no meeting of the minds" on the renewal of Phelan's services but confirmed the report of his retention without a contract as "That may be about what we have in mind."

Phelan has been on a year-to-year basis and the absence of a contract conforms to faculty procedure.

Ten others equalled par 70, among them Jimmy Demaret, of Houston, Texas, who was second to Hogan in purse earnings going into this final tournament. Ky Laffoon of Miami, Okla., and Horton Smith of Oak Park, Ill., were the other "name" golfers in the 70 bracket.

Ben Hogan, Loving Lead Miami Open

Dudley and Heafner in Hot Pursuit as Meet Enters Second Bracket

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 13 (AP)—A couple of guys named Ben paced the field into the second round of the \$10,000 Miami open golf tournament Friday—each with a three-under-par 67.

One of them—Ben Hogan of White Plains, N. Y.—tightened his grip on the year's money-winning title. The other—Ben Loving of Springfield, Mass.—began his strongest bid for a tournament victory after years of campaigning.

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
