southern Utah, clogged an irrigation ditch and sent flood waters into the business district. Wet snow proved a boon to the dry range lands in southwestern Utah and drought affected parts of Wyoming.

Six inches of snow covered the western section of Nebraska and five were deposited in western Kansas. Up to four inches of snow whitened most of Iowa.

Traffic Delayed
A light snow fell in the Texas panhandle. A sharp drop in temperature after a fall of wet snow made highways treacherous in New Mexico. Fog and low clouds interrupted air traffic.

Fog and rain in Ohio forced down five planes being ferried from Pennsylvania to Minneapolis. Two airlines cancelled westbound flights through Ohio. Heavy rainfall was reported in Indiana, the precipitation measuring 1.29 inches at Indianapolis.

State Police Eye Mystery Report Car Recovered

SALEM, Dec. 13 (P)—State police investigated today to learn how a pick-up order on a stolen car was cancelled before the car was recovered.

Lee Bown, deputy superintendent of state police, said a car owned by W. M. Simpson of Bend was stolen at Bend on November 24, and a larceny warrant was issued against Robert Oliver Currie, 17, Bend, who was captured Wednesday in a chase by state police near Roseburg. Currie was driving Simpson's car when apprehended.

On November 30, Bend police advised state police the car had been recovered, and on the following day, Currie obtained transfer of title to the car at the secretary of state's office here, Bown said.

Duke on Mystery Trip in U. S. Navy Plane From Miami

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 13 (P)—The Duke of Windsor flew away from Miami in a naval plane today for an undisclosed destination, amid spreading reports that he would confer with President Roosevelt and might become British ambassador to the United States.

"I am sorry I am unable to make any statement," he told newsmen before shoving off in the launch that took him to the four-engined navy patrol plane, "but I am in the hands of the navy for the day and I'm sure they'll take good care of me."

Speculation on the possibility that the former king might represent his nation officially at Washington was stirred afresh early today when the duke's aide de camp, Captain Vyvyan Drury, disclosed through a press representative that Windsor was flying in a naval plane today to "an undisclosed destination on an important official business." It was added that the state department wished all details withheld at present.

BRITISH SUBMARINE SINKS GERMAN SHIP

LONDON, Dec. 13 (P)—The British submarine Sunfish has sunk a German supply ship of about 4000 tons off the Norwegian coast, the admiralty announced today.

The submarine also was reported to have hit and damaged a German oil tanker of about the same tonnage.

"H. M. submarine Sunfish (Lieut. G. R. Colvin, R. N.) while operating close to the Norwegian coast has torpedoed and sunk a German supply ship of about 4000 tons. The enemy ship was deeply laden and it is probable that she was carrying a large cargo of ore to Germany."

"Two torpedoes from H. M. S. Sunfish were seen to hit and the enemy ship broke up and sank immediately."

LAW EXPERT HELD ON ASSAULT COUNT

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 13 (UP)—Ralph C. Burnett, 59, Pasadena, author of several volumes on civil law, was held in county jail Thursday night on charges of assaulting the woman who had won a judgment against him in a justice court civil case.

Bennett identified himself to deputy sheriffs as a former assistant state's attorney in Chicago, a former professor at the University of Oregon in 1914-15, a former lecturer in law at the University of Southern California, a Yale graduate, and a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

The assault, deputies said, took place just outside the El Monte justice court, where the judge had overruled Bennett's motion to set aside a \$150 default judgment in favor of Mrs. Helen Chivers, 52, Baldwin Park sanitarium owner.

When a process server tried to present further legal papers, officers said, Bennett struck at him with a hammer he carried wrapped in a paper. Then he struck Mrs. Chivers on the side of her head with the hammer, deputies said, before they were able to intercede. The deputies signed the complaint against Bennett, charging him with assault with a deadly weapon.

Jugoslavia, Hungary Sign Friendship Pact

BELGRADE, Dec. 13 (UP)—Jugoslavia and Hungary have signed a pact of "eternal friendship" binding them to enter into consultation before either takes action likely to affect their mutual interests in the Balkans, it was announced.

The pact was signed by Yugoslav Foreign Minister Alexander Cincar-Markovic, and Hungarian Foreign Minister Count Stephen Csaky, here on a state visit. The treaty provides Jugoslavia and Hungary are to maintain "permanent peace" and obligate themselves to discuss all questions affecting their mutual interests.

FBI Says Spies Well in Hand

NEW YORK, Dec. 13 (P)—The nation's leading industrialists were told today by Edward A. Tamm, assistant director of the federal bureau of investigation, that the FBI has the question of sabotage and espionage well in hand.

"Today," said Tamm, "the FBI knows the identities of the leaders of foreign espionage in the United States. True, there have been relatively few arrests and prosecutions. Flushing the quarry now would not make America more secure. On the other hand, it would render ineffective the advances that have been made."

SIAMESE TWINS LEAVE HOSPITAL

TOMAH, Wis., Dec. 13 (P)—Daisy Hilton having recovered from an attack of appendicitis, the Hilton sisters, Siamese twins, planned to leave today for Chicago.

Daisy was stricken here two weeks ago and was taken to a Tomah hotel for treatment. Perforce, Violet, her married sister, accompanied her.

DOCTOR'S DEATH CALLED SUICIDE

PORTLAND, Dec. 13 (P)—Gideon Snook, deputy coroner, pronounced the death of Dr. Edwin P. Fagan, 38, suicide yesterday.

Dr. Fagan, who suffered a nervous breakdown recently, was found in his home with a rifle wound in his head. The rifle lay beside his body. Four children survive.

LIQUOR BOARD STICKS TO RULE

PORTLAND, Dec. 13 (P)—A move to modify a state liquor commission ruling against ornaments and "prizes" on wine bottles failed yesterday.

The commission objected that such objects as tassels and drinking glasses constituted rebates and would open the way for price wars.

Ford Rejects Request for NLRB Election

DETROIT, Dec. 13 (UP)—The Ford Motor company today flatly rejected a request of the United Automobile Workers (CIO) for a consent national labor relations board election.

The rejection was in a statement by I. A. Capizzi, counsel for Ford, who charged the union's attempt to organize 100,000 Ford employees was motivated by the "greed of these (union) leaders to take over a million dollars a year in dues from Ford workers."

The UAW-CIO had requested Henry Ford's consent to an NLRB election to eliminate prolonged hearings that normally would follow the petition by one side only for balloting. The labor board could order an election without the consent of either party.

HOT CHASE ENDS IN CAPTURE BY BEND SHERIFF

BEND, Dec. 13 (P)—Sheriff Herbert Hamilton arrested two youths after a 90-mile-an-hour chase over the Santiam pass during which he opened fire on the fleeing pair yesterday.

The bullets forced Donald H. Rood of Iowa and Everett Aelton Yarwood of Wisconsin to halt. The sheriff said the youths, both armed, were wanted on charges of robbing an Albany service station.

The chase began after officers saw the pair driving an automobile reported missing from Salem.
