

WPA MAY ASSIST IN AIRPORT WORK

Supplemental WPA work on the Klamath airport may be expected, as well as the CAA funds of \$254,000 authorized in Washington Thursday, City Engineer E. A. Thomas said Friday.

Thomas said the WPA may dig ditches for drains, ditches for the lighting cables, and similar work in connection with the airport development. A WPA official was here about a month ago to look the airport over and lay out tentative plans for work, the engineer stated.

Thomas said that full information on the proposed program is awaited, but that it is his belief the WPA work will be in addition to the \$254,000 provided through the CAA.

The city engineer some time ago prepared a "master plan" for development of the municipal port, and it was submitted to the CAA. It is presumed the proposed development will follow this plan.

For the present, Thomas said, the improvements will be located on the airport site as it now stands without the addition of more land.

'Prop Wash'

A description of progress made by one of the 10 students enrolled in the Klamath Falls civilian pilot training program.

Lesson No. 4
This time we played—it sounds silly—ring-around-the-rosie with a hay field.

Picking out a nice square one, somewhere between the airport and Olene gap, we descended to 500 feet and traveled around and around the field, turning corners that were as nearly square as possible.

It sounds simple, but playing this game with an airplane is much harder than the nursery rhyme version.

Before going aloft Instructor Stinson explained the principal on the blackboard. First, we determined the wind direction and approximate velocity, then he diagrammed the problem. The idea is to fly parallel to the fences, just outside the field, dropping the inside wingtip over the fence corner for every turn and holding it there during the bank, always keeping the plane the same distance from the fence.

The exercise develops precision flying, in this manner: While traveling east we were heading almost directly into the wind, slowing our groundspeed. When we turned north, we counteracted drift by heading the plane into the wind, keeping the plane's track parallel to the fence. Turning west, we flew before a tailwind, with greatly increased groundspeed, necessitating a much steeper bank when we turned from that course around the next fence corner and headed south. On this last leg, we also had to head the plane into the wind to counteract drift, but this time to the left instead of right.

When you can do that exercise perfectly, Chet said, you can fly an airplane anywhere.

We took up something new

which for the first time put a thrill into the course — stalls. They were mild ones at first, to acquaint me with the principal more than anything else and to let me know how the plane feels when it reaches the stalling speed — 35 miles per hour.

With the nose pointed into the sky and throttle retarded, the plane quickly loses speed, controls become sloppy and the "HLL" is reduced to almost nothing. The idea in preventing stalls is to push the nose down and regain speed in a dive before the stalling point is reached.

This first time, I didn't attempt to come too close.
