## COUNTY OFFICES SWITCHED AROUND

Several office changes at the county courthouse will take place this weekend.

The law library will be moved from its present quarters in the room in the northwest corner of the second floor of the building. The library will be located in its old quarters in the center of the south side of the second floor, a room at one time used by state police.

Mrs. Isabelle Brixner, county school rural supervisor, will move from the old state police room to the law library room. This will place the county school offices together as a unit, and a door may be cut between the corner office and the present main offices of the county school district.

Mrs. Ethel Wilson, the county juvenile officer, will move from the basement to the small office on the second floor adjoining the deputy district attorney's office and the present law library room.

Lloyd Seeley, county attendance officer, who has occupied space in the juvenile offices on the second floor, will have a desk in the new quarters of the county rural supervisor.

The draft (selective service registration) boards will move from their present basement quarters to the adjoining room now occupied by the juvenile offices. The draft boards will have sufficient room in the new quarters to set up two separate offices.

Sheriff Lloyd L. Low will take over the basement room now used by the draft boards, and will use it for the sale of temporary automobile licenses.

## Negro Chauffeur Grilled on Triple Assault Charge

**GREENWICH, Conn., Dec. 13 (AP)**—A negro chauffeur-butler, who, Assistant Prosecutor Archibald H. Tunick said, confessed thrice assaulting a comely Greenwich society matron and later hurling her into a lonely reservoir, faced further grilling today after arraignment on a rape charge.

The man, Joseph Spell, 31, was arraigned before Judge Lewis E. Sisson in town court. The judge set bail at \$15,000 and continued the case until Saturday. Spell remained passive during the brief hearing.

Tunick had announced he wanted a continuance to check all angles of the case, including one of possible kidnaping which brought FBI agents into the investigation.

Detective Sergeant Martin H. Nee, after visiting Mrs. John K. Strubing Jr., 32, at a White Plains, N. Y., hospital, said she accused Spell of forcing her to write a \$5000 "ransom note," in addition to attacking her three times in her mansion Tuesday night, and several hours later throwing her with her feet bound into Kinsco reservoir, nine miles away in Westchester county, New York.

Mrs. Strubing, Nee reported, related that Spell, threatening her with a knife, first attacked her in her bedroom after she emerged scantily clad from a shower bath.

## Duke Found in Excellent Health

**MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Dec. 13 (AP)**—While his wife continued her satisfactory recuperation today from a serious tooth extraction, the Duke of Windsor took the opportunity to undergo a physical examination and came through with flying colors.

Physicians reported the former king, at 46, in excellent general health and physical condition. Their report confirmed the impression of his youthful, almost boyish appearance.

## CONGRESSMAN RAPS ACTIVITIES OF CIO

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)**—Representative Leland M. Ford (R-Calif.) charged on the house floor yesterday that the CIO had "done everything they possibly could to disturb, disrupt and destroy the national defense program."

In a sharp denunciation of the labor organization, Ford—to a cry by Representative Voorhis (D-Calif.) that he was making "wild statements"—charged:

"In their attempt to destroy airplane production, they called a strike at Vultee; they stopped delivery of planes that are necessary to our army for training our men."

"They are striking against the shipbuilding operators. There have been jurisdictional strikes that have slowed down and interfered with our national defense program."

"They are advocating and putting into effect strikes in the forests, interfering with our lumber industry."

"They have made the statement that they are going to take over all industry, including air plants, automobile plants, shipbuilding, steel plants, lumber industry, and shipping, and I understand the substance of a remark made by Mr. Sidney Hillman was that 'industry had better get aboard or take the consequences.'"

(Hillman, a member of the defense commission, is also an official of the CIO.)

"Does it seem possible, in

what has been called 'free America,' that, through the leadership of the CIO and Sidney Hillman, this program can be stopped, our national defense program sabotaged, and this country not only left defenseless, but eventually turned over to the communists?" Ford asked.
