the national defense program." McCarty said the United States government estimates that 4.5 persons are dependent economically upon every man employed in the lumber industry. Applying this average to the Klamath basin, he said that a very large proportion of the population here is directly dependent upon lumber workers' wages for their livelihood.

He asserted that wages in the Klamath basin are too low in the higher brackets and that only through contractual adjustment could this situation be remedied.

Other visiting officials at the convention include Ilmar Koi-vunen, international IWA vice president; William Baker, president of the Plywood district council; Howard Dyer, Susanville, Calif., president of the Klamath basin district council; Jerome Ward of Bend, vice president, and E. 'Prop Wash'

A description of progress made by one of the 10 students enrolled in the Klamath Falls civilian pilot training program.

Lesson No. 5

There's a new runway at the Klamath airport.

It isn't very long or straight, but it's nicely cleared.

Engineers who go to work on the CAA development program will probably disregard it, however, for it was laid out entirely too much by chance. It's the zig-zag course off through the "rough" that I described in my initial take off attempt, luckily getting myself and Instructor Chet Stinson into the air without any more damage than a lot of tumbleweeds jammed into the tail assembly.

Steering a plane on the ground is much harder than steering it in the air, I found, and when I threw open the throttle for that first takeoff I gave the ship entirely too much left rudder. With a roar and a lunge we headed off through the "brush," and not knowing exactly how to get back on the runway safely I let 'er go.

The tail came up all right and we climbed into the air. "We got off, anyway!" yelled Chet (obviously relieved).

Our lesson this time consisted of a review of straight and level flying, climbing and gliding turns, flying a "square" course, and takeoffs and landings. My first landing attempt was surprisingly more successful than the takeoff, but I have the instructor to thank for that.

We approached from a 90 degree angle, gliding in with the motor cut. I banked the plane sharply to the left and headed for the runway, wondering all the time just how high we were. The altimeter isn't much help that close to the ground and judging distance is hard.

I tried to make the first landing 50 feet in the air. Chet admonished me in time, however, and we got the nose down into another glide.

When we finally came to earth we landed much more easily than I expected and bounced less than a foot. That must have been beginner's luck.
