WILLARD PEYTON PASSES TUESDAY

Willard Peyton, for the past 20 years a resident of Klamath Falls, died at the family home, 944 Eldorado, at 2 o'clock Tuesday morning. Mr. Peyton had been in ill health for several months.

Mr. Peyton came to this city with members of his family and affiliated himself with his brother, Oscar Peyton, in the Peyton company, wood dealers. Until his recent illness he was actively interested in the business. Mr. Peyton was a native of Pinckneyville, Ill., and at the time of his death was 66 years of age. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Alice K. Peyton of this city; three daughters, Mrs. Prince E. Helfrich of Vida, Ore.; Mrs. Howard Dixon of Tulelake, and Patricia, of Klamath Falls. Two brothers also survive, Oscar of this city, and Lucy of Benton, Ill.

For a good many years Mr. Peyton was an active member of Klamath Falls lodge No. 177, AF&AM, and also of the Modern Woodmen of America. The remains are at the Earl Whitlock Funeral home where funeral announcements will be made later.

"Enlistment for patriotic service."

That is the term used by Mrs. Fred Heilbroner, national defense chairman of Klamath Falls unit of the American Legion auxiliary, to describe enrollment in the auxiliary for 1941.

"Hundreds of thousands of women throughout the country are now enrolling in the auxiliary because that is the place where they can enlist for patriotic service," she said.

Pointing to the many fields of activity in which the women of the auxiliary serve for the country, Mrs. Heilbroner declared that every woman eligible should be in the organization this year giving her active support to its efforts to make America secure. She stressed the importance of continued activity by women in support of adequate national defense, saying:

"The nation is now awake to the necessity for armed defenses strong enough to guarantee our peace and security. Years of effort by the Legion and auxiliary, and clamorous wars raging both to the east and west of us were necessary to bring that awakening. Now the great vigor is arming itself with Great V.

"But suppose the war situation changes so that the threat to our peace is not so apparent to everyone. Will our defense efforts be permitted to slacken? Will we again listen to pacifist propaganda coming from foreign sources and reduce our national defense to a point where we would be easy prey for a surprise aggressor? American women have a responsibility to see that the defenses of their country and homes are strengthened to meet the present emergency with all possible speed, and that they are maintained at a high point of efficiency against future dangers.

"Every woman who enrolls in the auxiliary now strengthens the auxiliary's voice as it calls for national security in the present and in the future."

Commander Angus W. Newton of the American Legion recently received an interesting letter from Eugene E. Caulk, company E, 28th Quartermaster corp, Fort Warren, Wyo. Young Caulk was one of the draftees sent from Klamath Falls and on his departure was presented with gifts from Mr. and Mrs. Newton. Following is Caulk's letter written from Fort Lewis, Wash.:

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Newton: We all trust you will forgive our lateness in writing our

thanks for your kindness to us. As we have been in quarantine until today (December 6) and in doubt as to our future address, we have awaited our placement or orders. The boys are being sent to various points, Portland, Fort Stephens, San Francisco or Monterey. Personally, I will leave for Fort Warren, Wyoming with the quartermaster corps. I regret leaving the Klamath Falls crowd. Although we have been confined to a rather small area here our quarters have been excellent, food coarse but wholesome. All have suffered some from typhoid shots and cold. Generally we have all fared very well.

The candy and cake was deeply appreciated, the latter being saved for Thanksgiving night. We shared the candy with less fortunate barracks mates who also send their thanks.

Now that we have been placed we are more at ease as knowing our future has concerned us a lot. Again I want to express my appreciation to you both for your kindness to us. Sincerely yours, Eugene E. Caulk.

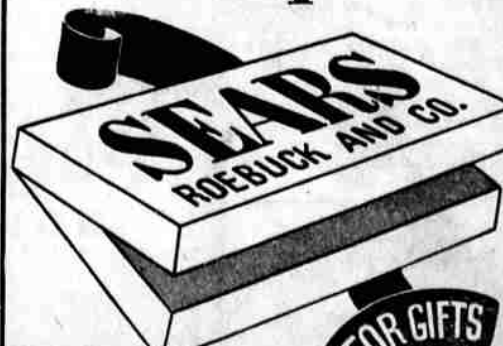
