movements followed closely the news that German, Russian, Italian and Rumanian experts who had been negotiating in Bucharest two months had departed for home after failing to agree on which nation or group of nations should control the Danube delta.

Informal sources said the Russians had insisted flatly they should control the area. There were reports in Bucharest that the red army was preparing to seize the mouths of the Danube by force, if necessary.

Christmas Truce
Britain and Germany were free from bomb attacks over Christmas, but the Greek island of Corfu in the Ionian sea was said by the Greek high command to have been bombed by Italian fighters Christmas day. Fifteen persons were reported killed. One German airplane was shot down over the Orkney islands.

During the Christmas lull in the air war over Britain, King George VI broadcast an encouraging message to his people, declaring "our feet are planted on the road to victory, and with the help of God we shall make our way to justice and to peace."

Intense cold curtailed action in the war in Albania, but a Greek army bulletin said several Italian fortified positions along the northern front had been captured.

The Italians reported digging in about 15 miles south of Valona, important Albanian port, to meet a threatened Greek drive up the Adriatic coast.

On the north African front, the siege of Bardia entered its 10th day with the Italian garrison facing steadily-increasing pressure from British forces encircling it by land and sea.

Indo-China has become the immediate field for Japan's surge to the south, which history may record as one of its greatest imperialist movements. A land larger than Texas and more populous than Spain apparently is in process of changing masters. The United States has declared its interest in this process. Last Sept. 7 Secretary of State Hull said that Japan's acquisition of bases in French Indo-China—then in prospect, now a fact—would have an "unfortunate" effect on public opinion in the United States.

To this admonition Japan paid no apparent heed. Her troops now are garrisoned in Hanoi, the capital, and Haiphong, chief port of the north; and several bases along the northern border, adjoining China, have been taken over by the Japanese air force. Japan's army and air forces in Indo-China are more numerous and far better armed than those of the nominal French masters. Within the last few days dispatches from Hanoi have reported the Japanese rapidly enlarging their air bases, bringing in formidable new squadrons of bombers and other types of aircraft.

Trustworthy figures on this concentration of military power are lacking, but it is reported sufficient to impose Tokyo's will on the enfeebled French administration at any time force seems called for, and it is building bases from which still further advances into the rich colonial lands of the south may be launched.

Few experienced observers in that part of the world believe that Japan's foothold in Indo-China is anything but a beginning.

EUGENE, Dec. 26 (AP)—Snow was falling heavily in the Cascades east of here today while the valley areas were drenched with night and day-long rains.

The McKenzie pass was covered with 12 inches of new snow, and motorists were warned by the local office of the Oregon State Motor association to carry chains with them. Although the storm is continuing unabated, the mile-high route to Bend is still open. A lesser storm was also reported on the Willamette pass and road conditions were reported safe. This highway, just opened this summer, will be kept clear all winter, but the McKenzie pass route, as usual, will soon be blizzard-blocked.

PORTLAND, Dec. 26 (AP)—Heavy seas continued to bombard Oregon's coastline today, increasing unusually high tides, but no serious flooding was reported up to noon.

Otherwise the state got nothing worse than heavy rains which ranged from 1.80 inches at some coastal points to mere traces at eastern Oregon communities. Snow was reported in the mountains.

At the mouth of the Columbia river it was reported that the bar had quieted somewhat and several heavy draft freighters were able to get in and out after being barbound for as much as 48 hours.

Highways through the mountains were open, the Oregon State Motor association said, although motorists were warned to equip themselves with chains for the Mount Hood-Wapinitia crossing. Eighteen inches of snow were reported at Hogg pass on the North and South Santiam highways. Plows kept the roads open. There were 10 inches of new snow on the McKenzie pass, also being kept open with plows. Ten to 12 inches of snow were reported from Salt creek summit of the new Willamette highway to the junction with the Dalles-California road but the road was open.

DEATH TAKES DANIEL FROHMAN, DEAN OF STAGE

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gave fell due on the theatre studio in which Frohman, at that time, made his home, the aged producer was saved from ejection by the intervention of a friendly banker, who said Frohman could remain in the apartment as long as he lived.

Worked for Greeley

Once a copy boy for the old New York Tribune, when Horace Greeley was editor of the paper, Frohman traced the beginning of his interest in the theatre to a visit to the P. T. Barnum museum in New York shortly after the Civil war.

Frohman was born in Sandusky, O., the son of a stage-struck German-Jewish peddler. He came to New York in 1879 after an adventurous career as an advance man for a one-night stand troupe that played the cow-towns of the west in the frontier days.

In the old Lyceum theatre, he founded the Daniel Frohman stock company in 1885—a company that became known as "The Star Factory."

Many names which became famous in the theatre first were discovered by Frohman. Maude Adams, E. H. Sothern, Minnie Maddern Fiske, Alison Skipworth, Edith Wynne and Margaret Illington were a few who found fame under his guidance.

He married Miss Illington in 1903, but the marriage ended in a divorce six years later.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—A White House secretary said today that President Roosevelt would be "very specific" about war aid to Britain in his nationwide radio address Sunday night, but would give no figures on any phase that might be helpful to any other nation.

Stephen Early, press secretary, told reporters: "I think the president will be very specific about what he says on aid to Britain."

The address, first from the White House in many months, will be broadcast over three national radio chains from 6:30 to 7 p. m. EST.

Early indicated the speech would also deal rather comprehensively with administration efforts to speed up domestic production of war materials.

Depends on Engine
They were last seen at 10:25 a. m. Christmas day when mountainous seas forced them to sea again after they attempted to put back into the Point Arena cove.

"If their engine held up, they had a reasonable chance to stay safely at sea or perhaps make a small cove," the coast guard headquarters here said. "But if the engine quit, those seas would put them on the beach like matchsticks and there might not be much trace of them."

The motor lifeboat, regarded as practically unsinkable because of air tanks and self-bailing devices, was towing a small surf boat. It carried no radio transmitter.

Of the two coast guard cutters searching for the missing men, the Shawnee put out from Eureka and the Ariadne from San Francisco. A coast guardmen's leg was fractured and four small boats were smashed on the Stanwood Christmas eve.

The schooner Stanwood, carrying a crew of 22 and commanded by Captain C. Clensenson, was reported kept afloat only by its deckload of lumber.

Kidnaper Tries to Commit Suicide At San Quentin

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Calif., Dec. 26 (AP)—Wilhelm Jakob Muhlenbroich, serving a life term for the kidnaping of 3-year-old Marc De Tristan, attempted suicide in his cell but failed because he fainted in the effort, Warden Clinton Duffy said today.

"I'm sorry I didn't finish it," was the only comment from the 40-year-old convict when he was treated for a lacerated wrist in the prison hospital.

The warden said the first indication of the attempt came when Muhlenbroich appeared to almost collapse while working at his loom in the prison jute mill. He was rushed to the prison hospital, where Dr. L. L. Stanley said his wound was not serious and that he was in no danger.

421 Killed in Holiday Accidents

At least 421 persons died by violence or in auto accidents during the nation's observance of Christmas.

A holiday toll of traffic accidents accounted for 307 fatalities from Christmas even through today. There were 114 violent deaths of other kinds throughout the country. A total of 678 lost their lives last year during the three-day Christmas week-end.

Of the 48 states and the District of Columbia, Ohio led with 44 deaths, New York, 41, California 30.
