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while artillery activity and local actions continued on land.

"Harbor installations, steamers in the harbor and objectives directly involved in the land operations were hit by our bombers," a communiqué said. The harbor was not identified.

"An enemy attack on one of our bases failed because of the

quick intervention of our pursuit planes," it added.

An Italian seaplane "effectively bombed an enemy submarine" in waters off the Libyan coast yesterday, the high command reported, adding that artillery actions and patrol activity continued on the north African land front.

The Italian air force, the daily communiqué said, was "intensely active," carrying out bombardments of front line base batteries, mechanized equipment and ships in harbor.

"Fighter planes engaged in combat with a large formation of Glosters (British warplanes)," the communiqué continued. "Three enemy planes were shot down. One of our planes failed to return."

Coast Guards Glad To Reach Shore

POINT ARENA, Calif., Dec. 27 (AP)—Ten coast guardsmen who were lost at sea for 48 hours on a mission of mercy, began completing their own rescue through a heavy surf today after they were picked up from their open boats by a coast guard cutter.

Roy Herling, 21, first of the lost seamen to reach shore, scrambled up a battered pier from a motorized surfboat onto solid ground with the comment, "Oh boy, does this solid stuff feel good."

He was followed almost immediately by Ronald Hieber, 23, whose blackened and nearly closed eye attested to the pummeling the coast guardsmen took from heavy seas which nearly wrecked their small open boats. Hieber, who was welcomed by the open arms of his wife, Dolores, explained the black eye—"A bulkhead just up and struck me."

Lieutenant Colonel Elmer V. Wooton, state director of selective service, said the 351 men will report during the week of January 20 to the induction station in Portland, from where they probably will be sent either to Fort Lewis, Wash., or to Camp Clatsop.

Oregon has 134,257 registrants, and for the year ending next June 30, its quota is 2808 men. With the January call, it will have sent 433 draftees into the army, leaving 2373 to be called into service between the end of January and the end of June.

A total of 82 men, all volunteers, were inducted into the army from Oregon's draft list during November.

ers hammered at targets in the "invasion port" of Bordeaux, German-occupied France, last night and attacked several air-dromes in daylight yesterday, it was announced officially today.

BERLIN, Dec. 27 (AP)—Authorized German sources charged today that the Royal Air force bombed Bordeaux, in Nazi-occupied France, last night in a way "that had no military or practical meaning."

"While the German air force undertook no war operations against the British Isles on the second Christmas holiday (December 26), British planes on that day and in the following night bombed airports, port facilities and towns in occupied France," the high command said.

Several French civilians were reported killed and some were wounded.

German anti-aircraft fire, these sources said, drove the raiders away immediately and some bombers were reported to have been hit by anti-aircraft fire.

Hungary-Rumania Train Service To Be Suspended

BUDAPEST, Dec. 27 (AP)—All passenger train service between Hungary and Rumania will be suspended Dec. 29 until Jan. 15, it was reported reliably today.

This was interpreted here as connected with the drastic curtailment of Hungarian domestic service to permit nearly 40 German military trains to pass daily through Hungary en route to Rumania.

Germany is shifting nearly 300,000 soldiers along with considerable quantities of equipment to Rumania before January 1, diplomatic sources reported here previously.

DEMURRERS FILED IN THREE CASES

Demurrers were filed Friday against the indictments in the three major criminal cases coming from the last session of the county grand jury.

J. C. O'Neill, attorney in all three cases moved against the indictments charging Joe Kirk with murder, Ralph Atcheson Hatfield with involuntary manslaughter, and Robert Wilcox Rhodes with involuntary manslaughter.

The demurrers generally were based on the contention that the indictments do not substantially conform with the penal code and the facts stated therein do not constitute a crime.

In the cases, it was also alleged that the indictments charge more than one crime.

TRAIN DISRUPTIONS REPORTED CLEARING

Storms in northern California which disrupted Christmas travel on Southern Pacific lines are clearing, it was reported Friday were still arriving late but no delays were as lengthy as the disruption which held up traffic on Christmas.
