TROOPS SENT AS INSURANCE MOVE, BELIEF

mands in France, these sources said.

They asserted that Hitler was prepared to make full peace settlement with France, with only the provinces of Alsace and Lorraine changing hands, if Italy collapses.

Petain was understood to have told the nazis that in case the German terms were "unreasonable" he would cut north Africa loose, with General Maxime Weygand taking a large colonial army into the ranks of General Charles de Gaulle's "free French" forces, moving against Italian Libya from Tunisia in coordination with the current British action from Egypt.

Insurance Measure
Mass movements of German troops and war materials to Rumania, which is estimated by observers, will give the nazis nearly half a million men there by the end of January, were designed chiefly as an insurance measure, it was reported here.

Concentration of nazi troops in southwestern Rumania was expected in some quarters to put great pressure on Yugoslavia, possibly aimed at forcing the Belgrade government to accede to German wishes.

These troop concentrations also were said to be designed as a brake on reported soviet Russian designs to occupy Moldavia and the mouths of the Danube, as well as giving Turkey reason to think twice about fulfilling her treaty with Britain or increasing her help to Greece.

The soviets were reported to have moved 30 crack divisions into Bessarabia on the Rumanian frontier.

It was said authoritatively that King Boris III of Bulgaria informed Hitler during the monarch's recent visit to Germany that he would abdicate rather than sanction the passage of German troops across Bulgaria toward Greece or Turkey.

mas present. She was warmly dressed, wearing Mrs. Burns' galoshes, a warm coat, wool dress, mittens and cap. The Burns last saw her when she walked away from their car through the snow. The machine was two miles off the main highway.

When the Burns car, which had become stalled in mud, was able to reach Pinehurst the girl had not appeared and it was not until late Friday afternoon that it was learned she had reached the Lippert camp—not without a series of incidents.

Found Cabin

The camp was much further from the road than Alice had realized, friends reported. She walked through the gathering dusk and finally came upon a deserted cabin known as the Bartlett place on Loon prairie. She entered the dwelling, found matches and a few old papers, and gathering bits of dry wood she built a fire. Alice also told her family she found a small amount of tea in the cabin and brewed a pot to refresh herself. She was exhausted and her clothing covered with snow when she came upon the shack.

An old rocker was also in the cabin and the girl fell asleep by the fire, she told her parents. She slept so soundly she was not aware of her good coat burning as she nestled close to the old stove.

Stumbled Into Camp
Early Thursday morning, presumably still lost, Alice picked up the trail into the woods and wandered about until 4 o'clock when she stumbled into the camp about three miles east of the Bartlett place.

Miss Sims was given warm clothing and food and put to bed. Early Friday, Burns started out looking for the girl, joining the 14 members of a sheriff's posse which had searched since Thursday through the forests. He made his way to the camp where he found Alice, and upon his return here said she was well although exhausted from her long trek. The girl had recently had influenza and friends felt for her safety because of her weakened condition. Alice told possmen she had been forced to crawl across icy streams on her hands and knees for fear of being swept from her feet by the rushing waters.

Alice is expected to return here Monday, Burns said, to resume her position at the Burr-O-N where she is employed as a waitress.

"balance sheet" now is under way.

That detailed analysis, made to determine as precisely as possible British capacity to pay for purchases here, and the probable calendar date on which British cash would be exhausted.

The treasury's study also will provide answers to the questions President Roosevelt and Secretary Morgenthau expect to be asked when congress considers the problem of aid to Britain.

Present Orders Covered

The British government now is paying for war supplies with gold shipped from London, payments for British goods, and receipts from the sale here of British owned dollar securities.

Well informed sources said that the British treasury's balance sheet, made available to the US treasury experts, showed that Britain would be able to pay cash for all ships, planes and other war implements and supplies now on order, but could not pay cash for the tremendous future orders which Britain wants to place immediately.
