Mrs. Lamm Is Speaker at Club's Final Luncheon For Year of 1940

At a beautifully decorated table prepared by Mrs. Gwen-dolyn Wright, the Soroptimists sat down to their last 1940 luncheon on Thursday, December the twenty-sixth, at the Willard hotel. Confetti and colored paper streamers, with paper hats and whistles, imparted more of a New Year's atmosphere than that of Christmas, although the holiday spirit was carried out in the program. Speaker of the day was Mrs. Alice Lamm who gave an interesting account of her visit with the San Francisco club and her attendance at a banquet given in honor of the director of the southwest region.

Guest artist for the event was Miss Winifred Lamm who delighted the club with her beautiful voice as she sang the lovely old carol, "Holy Night," followed by the Aria from "Pirates of Penzance."
