Classic May Turn Out As 'T' for Two

Jones Drills Nebraskans On Famous Indian Formation; Squad Hit by Flu

INDIAN DOUBLEHEADER?
Stanford's Indians may make it a doubleheader this year, argue Cardinal boosters, what with Shaughnessy's men coming to grips with Nebraska in the Rose bowl and the Indian basketball quintet showing surprising power in early season tilt.

It took last year's national collegiate champs, Indiana, an overtime period to down Stanford in the hoop sport last week, indicating the Indian basketball may be the class of the southern division this season.

Stanford may come to bat against the strong Oregon Webfoots for the coast crown, the Hobsonites demonstrating far better form on their return from the eastern junket than when they started the barnstorm.

But what of other potential casaba "greats" this season?

INDIANA FAVORED
With 11 lettermen back, Coach Branch McCracken's Indiana squad is favored to capture the Big Ten championship from Purdue.

The Hoosiers are demonstrating plenty of offensive drive on the Pacific visit.

Notre Dame, Toledo and Bradley rank as strong contenders in the Big Ten race, but Purdue, lacking defensive strength and height, will have trouble retaining the crown.

DARTMOUTH STRONG
Four of last year's eastern leaders are back virtually intact — Dartmouth, Rhode Island State, Duquesne and Long Island U.

These teams, lacking the height of midwest and far west squads, depend chiefly on passing finesse, screening and fast breaks. They'll give western quints plenty to worry about when final competition rolls around. Witness Oregon's unsuccessful eastern tour.

Lead by Captain Gus Broberg, Dartmouth's five seems to hold an edge over other eastern leaders and is pointed toward its fourth consecutive championship of the Eastern Intercollegiate loop.

KANSAS MAY REPEAT
Kansas is favored to recapture the Big Six title, with three senior veterans back, but will get stiff opposition from Oklahoma. The Aggies should repeat as champs of the Missouri Valley conference.

In other leagues, where national champs are less apt to be produced, Rice looms in the Southwest as a possible title contender and Kentucky is again rated tops in the South.

Out in the Rocky Mountain conference, invaded successfully by the Oregon State Beavers, Utah and Wyoming shape up as the major threats to Colorado's Big Seven title.

Skate Frolics Set for Monday
Everything will be on ice Monday at the Klamath armory when the Ice Frolics, surprise sensation of the 1940 Golden Gate International exposition, is staged by Lost River Dairy.

Klamath ice fans will see for the first time in this city a complete chemical ice show featuring the world's leading skate entertainers. The stars of the original chemical ice show presented at Treasure Island will be on hand.

Two shows will be presented, the matinee at 4:15 being offered free to students who bring five Royal Crown Cola or Par-T-Pak bottle caps. A small charge is asked for the evening performance at 8:15.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 28 (AP) — Nebraska's Cornhuskers, drilled so exhaustively on Stanford's famed "T" formation that they could use it themselves, wound up an eight-day training stay in Arizona Friday and departed for the west coast and a New Year's day football date with the Indians.

An afternoon workout was held, then the husky Nebraskans quit their resort hotel headquarters and entrained for Los Angeles.

All this week, Maj. Lawrence (Bill) Jones, Nebraska head coach, has worked his players on the tricky formation which Coach Clark Shaughnessy used so successfully on the west coast during the regular season.

Some members of the Nebraska party speculated as to whether Jones was planning to throw the "T" formation right back at Stanford, but the Major and his assistants remained tight-lipped, as usual.

"It may turn out to be 'T' for two," cracked a Nebraska follower.

Using opponents' plays against them is a favorite trick of Jones', observers recalled. He employed Minnesota plays, picked up by scouts, against the Gophers this year and later used Pittsburgh tactics against the Panthers.

Influenza hit the Nebraska squad last night for the second time this week when Halfback Herman Rohrig was ordered to bed with a mild case. He was expected to be ready for action in another day or two, however.

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 28 (AP) — Stanford's football squad headed into another lively workout Friday for the clash with Nebraska in the Rose bowl, and once again Coach Clark Shaughnessy intimated he would stress his aerial offense.

Aerial drills have dominated the Stanford preparations since they reached Pasadena, with Southpaw Frankie Albert, the Indians' all-American quarterback, and Thor Peterson doing the tossing.

Stanford boasts several pass receivers, but Fred Meyer, right end; Clam Tomerlin, spindly-legged reserve wingman, and Hugh Galliarneau, halfback star, stand out in this department. Meyer is generally rated the best.

Milt Vuclnich, second string fullback, continued to avoid drills because of his injured knee, and the belief is growing that he will not see action at all New Year's day. Rod Parker, a senior, weighing 188 pounds, may replace Norm (Big Chief) Standlee, if his trick ankle gives way in the game. Parker is a hard line plunger, but has seen little service this fall.

The Stanford will rest Sunday, taking a busman's holiday by attending the professional football game in Los Angeles between the Chicago Bears and the National League All-Stars.

Pitcher Idle at Bat in New Plan
WICHITA, Kas., Dec. 28 (AP) — Elimination of the pitcher as a batter will receive its first test in the 48 state semipro baseball tournaments next summer.

J. G. Taylor Spink, advocate of the idea and publisher of the Sporting News, national baseball weekly, said today Ray Dumont, president of the semipro congress, had promised the innovation would be tried out with another athlete taking the hurler's turn at the plate.

The publisher stopped here on his way to Los Angeles.

RUGBY APPROVED
VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 28 (AP) — A program of six games between an all-star English rugby squad from British Columbia and California teams in aid of the British war relief fund was tentatively approved at a meeting of the British Columbia Rugby union here.

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Led by Jean Gosselin, famous one-legged skier, Quebec's junior champions Marc Fortier and Eddie Dion swoop off the summit of Mount St. Castin at Lac Beauport, forming a spectacular picture against the frozen Canadian landscape.

Monday Hoop Tilts Called

Three games in the Klamath Basin league originally scheduled for Monday night, December 30, at the Klamath armory have been scratched to make way for the Ice Frolics, it was announced.

The tilts—Midland versus Latter Day Saints, Ricky's versus Knights of Columbus and Lutherans versus Junior Pelicans will be postponed until the end of the first half of the schedule.

Next games at the armory will be January 2.

Ducks Defeat Cats 46 to 33 in Late Rally
SALEM, Dec. 28 (AP) — University of Oregon's towering basketball team raced down the "home stretch" to defeat Willamette university, 46 to 33, Friday night.

The Webfoots, never in front in the initial half, managed to knot the count at 13-13 as the half ended.

Center Hank Anderson sank a field goal at the start of the final period to put Oregon in the lead. After that the traveling Webfoots were never headed.

Eberly of Willamette was the game's high scorer with 11 points, while Anderson and Sidesinger each scored 9 for Oregon.

Indians Down Husker Quint
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28 (AP) — Stanford university defeated University of Nebraska 57 to 46 Friday night in a hard fought basketball game in Civic auditorium.

The lead changed hands several times in the first two periods with the Stanfordites holding a 26 to 21 margin at half time. Early in the third period the Cornhuskers tied the score at 26 to 26 but their threat was ended with that burst.

Don Williams, Stanford forward, starred for the Indians with 24 points. Sid Held, Nebraska guard, paced his team with 12 points scored.

Despite rough play no men were disqualified for fouls. Stanford play in the first two periods showed early season raggedness.

Boston Ups Stock; Ace End Okay

Gene Goodreault Will Enter Sugar Bowl Tilt; Neyland Drills Eleven

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 28 (AP) — Boston College's Sugar Bowl stock boomed Saturday as word spread that Gene Goodreault, injured end, would be in shape to start in the classic game with Tennessee here New Year's day.

Boston College was in training at nearby Bay St. Louis, Miss., on the gulf coast. Also on the coast was the Tennessee team, where Coach Bob Neyland was drumming to his men the importance of team play.

"A so-called 'star' is not my ideal of a football player," Neyland said, in emphasizing synchronized performance of a team as a whole.

He listed these requirements for the "ideal":
"He must have his heart in the game, love it like nothing else and be able to translate his love of football into knowledge."

"He must have sufficient speed, weight and endurance to learn to perform the normal jobs assigned him."
"He must be loyal, industrious and self-effacing and possess good habits and be a good leader."

Meanwhile, there was happiness in the Boston College camp as Goodreault got into his first tough scrimmage session in six weeks.

"It will make a tremendous difference if Goodreault is in there next Wednesday," Coach Frank Leahy declared.

Meanwhile, Bobby Riggs set out Saturday to break the "champion never repeats" jinx in the annual Sugar Bowl tennis tournament.

Riggs won the title here in 1937, beating Joe Hunt in the finals, but lost to Don McNeill last year.

Heavy Snows Blanket Ski Area at Lake

Sixty-five inches of new snow, bringing the total depth to a record for the year of 93 inches, blanketed the Crater lake ski area Saturday and clear skies indicated excellent snow conditions Sunday unless a sudden weather change occurs.

According to Saturday morning's radio report from park headquarters temperature at 8 a. m. was 14 degrees, with a light wind from the southeast.

Snow depth was 85 inches at headquarters and 93 at the rim, the 65 inches of new snow having fallen since last Saturday.

The new snow was described as soft and medium-dry, good for skiing where packed underneath.

Roads were icy and covered with packed snow. Chains were needed.

NCAA Meet Draws Many

Athletic Heads Swarm To New York for Confab
NEW YORK, Dec. 28 (AP) — Three floors of one of this city's largest hotels have been swept out and made ready for the annual meeting of the National Collegiate Athletic association and various allied bodies beginning Sunday.

They began arriving last night —football coaches, track coaches and teachers of gymnastics; basketball mentors, athletic directors and even several presidents of universities, who will participate in the oratory attending three solid days of meetings.

The convention program calls for the NCAA council meeting Sunday night to start the ball rolling. The NCAA holds its annual joint meeting with the Football Coaches association on Monday.

On Tuesday the NCAA will hold its general meeting, starting in the morning and continuing probably until 1941. The football coaches will devote the whole three days to the formulation of constructive legislation, no doubt.

A half-dozen athletic directors will take advantage of the opportunity to shop around for new football coaches, with L. W. St. John of Ohio State having the juiciest job to hand out. Other schools needing new character builders include Dartmouth, Colorado, Tulsa, Maine, Massachusetts State, Springfield and Marquette.
