WRECK DRIVER ARRAIGNED FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Another involuntary manslaughter charge as a result of an automobile accident—the third now pending here—was disclosed Monday when Q. A. Bailey, a lumber mill worker, was arrested on a secret indictment returned last week by the county grand jury.

Bailey was indicted in connection with the automobile death of James Irving Breshears, on the Greensprings highway near the Weyerhaeuser junction. The indictment charges that Bailey, the operator of one of three cars in the crash, was careless and negligent. Breshears was riding in a car operated by Louis K. Richardson, according to the indictment.

The accident occurred on November 3.

Taken into court for arraignment Monday, Bailey indicated he was undecided what he wanted to do about an attorney. His bail was reduced by Circuit Judge E. B. Ashurst from \$2000 to \$1000. The plea was set for Friday.

TO MAKE A SMOKING FIREPLACE DRAW
Another Service of the House of Seagram
OFTEN a fireplace will smoke excessively when a fire is first lighted. This can usually be corrected by thrusting the burning end of a twisted newspaper through the throat opening to start the draft. Puffs of smoke and back drafts may be caused by a chimney that is too low. The top of a chimney should be at least two feet higher than the highest point of a peak roof, and higher still with a flat roof (or if there are tall buildings or trees nearby).
There will be persistent smoking if the fireplace opening is too high for its width. The opening can be made lower by placing a strip of sheet metal across the top.
Another method is to raise the floor of the fireplace—by covering it with one or even two layers of firebricks.
