STATE LAND BOARD NAMES RANGE HEAD

The state land board, at its meeting Monday, appointed Marvin Klemme, of Burns, Oregon, as supervisor for the blocking of range land, as proposed by the state land board.

Klemme, a graduate of the University of Washington, and Yale School of Forestry, served as regional forester for Oregon with the United States government for four years. After severing his connection with the United States government, he traveled abroad, studying land and grazing problems in the countries of Europe, Africa, and Asia. Klemme is author of the recent publication, "An American Grazer Goes Abroad," which is an interesting compilation of grazing facts and problems.

Klemme will open an office at Burns, Oregon, and, under the direction of the state land board, will proceed with the blocking of state lands. This blocking involves the blocking of approximately 700,000 acres of school land, all within the six grazing districts of southeastern Oregon. This school land is a portion of the assets of the irreducible school fund, and the rentals therefrom are apportioned once each year to help support the common schools of the state.

CHARGES READ IN CHILOQUIN BATTLE

Robert J. Nealy, Klamath youth, was arraigned in justice court Tuesday on two charges growing out of the billiard cue tussle in Chilquin last week in which Chester Jessup suffered a severe brain concussion.

Nealy was alleged to have wielded the cue which struck Jessup and was charged with assault armed with a dangerous weapon on that count. He waived preliminary hearing and his bond was set at \$2500 cash or \$5000 property. He was lodged in the county jail.

The second charge was lodged as a result of the looting of Cliff's Service station at Shady Pine on November 19. The complaint was filed by the station's operator and it was believed Nealy was identified by the owner. Bond was set at \$2000 cash or \$4000 property. Nealy also waived hearing on the second charge.
