Reverend's Draft Address Brings Portland Challenge

SEATTLE, Jan. 3 (AP)—The Rev. Dr. J. Warren Hastings, pastor of the University Christian church, described himself as a conscientious objector and expressed his opposition to the draft before a group of educators recently, a stand immediately sharply challenged by other speakers.

"To me, to draft men and to create a war psychology is questionable," Dr. Hastings, who served in the navy in the World war, said.

"I think to draft men is wrong. We have upon us today a war psychology and a war hysteria. Frankly, I think we literally are being shoved into war and are not thinking enough about it."

His address was before the seventh annual conference of the department of administration and supervision of the Washington Education association, meeting at the University of Washington.

Tillman Peterson, superintendent of the Bremerton schools, said:

"I disagree with Dr. Hastings. I hope against war but the draft and our preparedness program are insurance against war."

Robert Farnsworth, principal of Everett high school, also took exceptions to Dr. Hastings' remarks and Mrs. Violet Reed, Walla Walla county school superintendent, saying she had a boy of draft age, asked Dr. Hastings what her attitude should be toward his being drafted.

It was at this point that Dr. Hastings said he was a conscientious objector and he added:

"And believe you me, sister, there are lots of conscientious objectors right here at the University of Washington."

Explaining his views, Dr. Hastings said "I still think the teachings of Christ were the teachings of peace. He who takes the sword will perish by the sword."

Of the present war, he said he believed it is a "revolution of the masses" and that if a little wealthy clique in France, Germany and England would "give in to the masses," it would end.
