ENGINEER SAYS TANK SETTLING IS NOT SERIOUS

TULELAKE—Settling of the foundation under the 100,000 gallon surface water tank, installed recently for the city's water supply, is to be expected according to Edward K. Hussey, Oakland engineer for the city, who, when advised of the list to the high structure, advised the city council that there was no need for concern.

The shift to the east is believed to have thrown the tank, which rests on a concrete foundation, four or five inches out of line and measures will be

taken at once to straighten it up. The council in session the first of the week set a charge of \$4.50 per month on all one-inch meters, \$1 of the total to apply on installed meters until paid for. The charge covers a minimum delivery of 1000 cubic feet of water.

On one and one-half inch meters, the rate will be \$9.00 per month, \$1.50 to be applied on the equipment with a minimum delivery of 4000 cubic feet of water. Meters are expected to pay out in approximately two and one-half years and following payment of original cost and installation, patrons of the water department will pay only the flat rate.

The council was advised that the members would be guests of honor at the "water party" planned by the chamber of commerce for January 18.

She gets chummy with the salesmen who want to do business with her firm, until she finds it hard to get rid of a caller without a long chat.

She encourages her friends to stop by the office and see her whenever they are in the neighborhood.

THESE MISTAKES ARE UNNECESSARY

She never goes in for tailored, neat, clothes, but goes right on wearing the kind of clothes she used to wear to bridge parties and to church on Sunday.
